This year, other unforeseen commitments permitting, we are very pleased to welcome James Naish MP to the meeting. James was elected to represent Rushcliffe in the 2024 General Election. He is the first Labour MP to represent Rushcliffe since 1966. He will update the meeting on local initiatives and is happy to take questions.

Born in Sheffield and raised on his family's farm in South Wheatley, Nottinghamshire, James is the youngest of three triplets.

Before his election as an MP, in 2019 James was elected to Bassetlaw District Council, Nottinghamshire and then elected Leader of the Council in September 2022.

Today he is a member of the International Development Committee, the House of Common's select committee responsible for scrutinising UK aid policy, and the expenditure of Official Development Assistance across UK government departments.

Update on selected issues

• Floods in the village

After the heavy rain experienced this year, floods in the village were, once again, a major problem. They were particularly bad around the bend by the church. However, after considerable work by Via to the drains and the gullies the situation is very much improved. Work is also in hand to reduce the volume of water coursing down the road from Normanton Lane.

Highways & signs

Bus stops on both sides of the road were installed near the Old School House. A new village sign was installed entering from Loughborough and an order has been placed for a replacement sign, in metal, for the carved wooden sign in the church car park. With the support of County Councillor Matt Barney, efforts continue to introduce a 50mph speed limit from the A6006 right through to the start of the 30mph limit in Stanford village, which has been requested to be extended to beyond the new bus stops.

Planning applications

Once again there have been numerous planning applications, most notable being the ones concerning the Five Oaks farm site. Details of all applications and responses, are on the Rushcliffe BC planning website.

Conservation Area

All residents were consulted regarding the creation of a Conservation Area for the village. The majority of the responses received were positive. However, after further consideration of resources of time and expertise required in putting the appraisal together, it was agreed this was not a viable option.

• Defibrillator installation

SSAFA, with the additional support of ± 300 from Rushcliffe Borough Council, has installed a defibrillator on the outside of Norton House for village use and training has been given.
