I emailed Sarah Fanet on 24/04 requesting attendance at the seminar which the Sea Wilding project were running — but did not receive an invitation to join the Teams session so disappointingly could not join! However, I made a visit to Loch Craignish (where Sea Wilding are based) and made contact with members of the team — and subsequently had a useful discussion with one of the lead members, Philip Price. I have some background to the project having worked for SAMS who is a project partner.

Sea Wilding report form DG

The project, beyond the current sea grass and native oyster reestablishment in Loch Craignish, looks to encourage and facilitate other projects of a similar nature on the Scottish coasts through community involvement.

As regards sea grass, the key requirement is the local environment – the benthic make up, seabed and coastal topography and wave and wind exposure. On native oysters, it is benthic make up and crucially, evidence of either past oyster beds (eg old shells on the inter-tidal zone) or traces of existing native oysters.

The first step in assessing an area of coast and adjacent seabed, is a desk study and the Sea Wilding web site www.seawidling.org provides a guide on this process. If the study indicates promise, the nest step is ground truthing.

In my view, our immediate FRCC coast/seabed is not a natural habitat for sea grass – rocky seabed and relatively exposed and I have seen no evidence of there being or having been native oyster beds. That said, it is certainly worth focused examination. Additionally, it may well be there are

other flora/fauna species which could be looked at with a view to engagement in a sea wilding project. This would be a great project to engage the schools and enthusiastic volunteers I suggest we look to a community project to complete both a desk study and intertidal zone survey identifying flora/fauna as a step towards possible engagement on this or associated initiatives to rewild – and it would make sense to work on this with the other Black Isle coastal CCs ... who may well be thinking the same and may have attended the meeting DG on 25/04. Rosemarkie

1. In an effort to prevent construction traffic entering Rosemarkie, an agreement has been

reached with the adjacent Landowner to occupy his land for the purpose of the site

establishment and storage areas. This will restrict the volume of construction traffic entering

Rosemarkie and therefore create a safer environment for members of the public minimal

disruption to Rosemarkie itself.

2. The duration of the development was expected to be two years, and the access established for

the full duration.

On completion of the works, the land will be top soiled and planted to make the approach to

Rosemarkie visually acceptable.

3. The amendments as outlined above do not increase or reduce parking, increase housing

density or diminish the vernacular architecture as previously presented and approved.

Under Planning Permission 19/04065/FUL Pat Munro Homes make application under Section 42 to

amend Condition No.1 of the Planning Permission by way of amendment to the cessation date of

30.06.2022 by a further two years.

The extension of time is due to the timelines taken to complete both the Archaeological works (one

year) on commencement of site operations and in seeking amendment to Planning Approval

15/03033/FUL by way of Planning Approval 21/01332/FUL (9 months).

The only issues could be the length of time proposed and the assurance the access will not be left in situ for further development on the works site once the development is completed.

10.6	Gulls- report DG	
	1. Gulls Project	
	We now have over 60 requests for help with gulls from across the two villages. This has been fed back to the contractor, North East Pest Management NEPM, with whom we have engaged (who is currently employed by Marine House for placing nesting deterrents and removal of nests) – and at this number, they would certainly be able to provide a service. The bottle neck is the licensing process on nest removal with each household requiring to apply to nature.scot (formally Natural History Scotland) – which NEPM would undertake on behalf of the residents. The next step will be to quickly map the households in each village to establish distribution patterns and provide NEPM with finalised household numbers for confirmation of service advised and costs. They can then take forward engaging directly with households. In advance of this and now needing immediate follow through, we must make further contact with all those who have requested help and advise the position.	
	It should be noted that we are still receiving requests and this would	

suggest that some households did not receive the mail drop (some will be on 'no junk mail' service with Royal Mail), others may have put aside and forgotten and there may be spread of word and nudging with the build up a gulls starting to pair up and nest. On signage, we have ordered 10 x aluminium and 10 x rigid plastic 'Do not feed the gulls' signs for placement in key positions in each village. It is intended these signs will be permanent and they need to be fully weatherproof and durable. Alongside this, we will use a selected 10 posters (reproduced and laminated) from the schools' poster competition initiative which has been a great success with over 70 posters being drawn by pupils from Avoch Primary. The content and design of these posters clearly show that teachers have explained the reasons for not feeding gulls - the effect on gull health, behaviour etc. - and will be of real value in getting the message across to younger age groups and through parents. 5 of the posters were short listed for the winning design with one taking DG BL JP the winner prize and a further 5 posters have been selected for use on the poster campaign. 10.7 **Community Garden and Tree Planting** 5 Rowan trees have been donated to Rosemarkie. We hope to plant a LT suitable tree in memory of DM in the cathedral grounds for a future Christmas tree. LT to contact HES.
