

A year of Celebrating 100 years of growing is almost at its end and a New Year and a new Centenary for Halls of Heddon is about to begin. It was in 1921 that our grandfather, William Nicholson Hall, first sowed the seeds of what has now become one of the most respected Dahlia specialists in the country and even worldwide. We are not just about Dahlias though. As many of you know, we grow and supply a wide range of garden plants at both of our

Little did we know how gardening would suddenly create a whole new crop of budding horticulturists eager to connect with nature and look towards more food security. People turned to the hobby as a way of getting through the periods of lockdown and came to appreciate the benefits to health and mental wellbeing that working with plants and being outdoors gives. Thanks to every one's support over those months we went on to have one of our most successful years as people looked to shop with and support local businesses. It meant that we could look forward to this year, our Centenary year, with a lot more positivity. But how to celebrate 100 years in Covid?

That became the difficult one. In danger of the year flying by without doing anything, we focussed our efforts on making our Display fields somewhere special to visit. We knew from last year how much people enjoyed the spectacle of seeing over 15000 Dahlias and Chrysanthemums in full

bloom. To many, it was an eyeopener, never realising that such a spectacular sight was right on their doorstep. We ourselves often take it for granted but seeing the joy and smiles on people's faces as they took in the kaleidoscope of colour for the first time was something I won't forget.

Our efforts this year entailed planting more. 400 plants were added to a mixed border I'd started a few years ago. Perimeters were levelled, reseeded, and mowed, whilst old pallets were made into seating which we dotted around the fields for people to relax and enjoy.

There is something special about Harrogate Autumn Flower Show and it was good to be back with the organisers very eager to help and support us in putting on an additional celebratory display. Their press release focussed very much on our long-standing involvement and our Centenary year, which resulted in us getting coverage on Tyne Tees news- the aerial footage was superb! We were obviously pleased as punch to be awarded a Premier Gold Medal for our main traditional stand, but the additional Premier Gold and the President of the North of England Horticultural Society's Award for our Centenary Display was the icing on the cake. More importantly though were the comments of appreciation from so many people at the show and back at the Nursery. The unquantifiable amount of pleasure that our Flowers and plants have given to so many is celebration enough of 100 Years of Growing.

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EVOLUTION AT ST ANDREW'S

A lot has happened at St Andrew's church over the pandemic and its restrictions. In August 2020 we said farewell to The Reverend Audrey McCartan who after 14 years' Ministry with us has moved to Longhorsley. Despite the restrictions we managed an excellent turn out for her last Service with us and made a presentation to show our gratitude for the huge amount she did for us which was well in excess of what a House for Duty Priest is expected to contribute.

During Audrey's time with us Lay Led involvement in worship developed. We took this to the next stage during the Vacancy. Four members of the congregation received some training, advice and trust from the Area Dean to lead Worship when no visiting Priest could be assigned to us. Three of these people then undertook a fuller course and are now Authorized Lay Ministers.

On Easter Sunday it was announced that The Reverend Rachel Scheffer, the Priest in Charge at Stamfordham and Matfen with Ryal, would additionally be the Priest in Charge at Heddon St Andrew. The Reverend Tom Birch, Vicar of Wylam and Ovingham, would additionally be the Associate Priest at Heddon St Andrew.

Although not licensed until September we started to act as if these appointments had been formally made. This was a brilliant way of getting to know each other and the worshipping community in all the other parishes with whom we now share 2 priests.

This is not about doing the same thing with less, but doing things differently. For example, our rhythm of Sunday worship at 10am follows this pattern:

1st Sunday of the month: Lay Led Worship. This is not Holy Communion but familiar prayers, Bible readings and hymns. The service usually lasts for about half an hour.

2nd Sunday of the month: Holy Communion led by either Fr. Tom or retired Priest.

3rd Sunday of the month: Holy Communion led by a Fr. Tom or retired Priest.

4th Sunday of the month: Holy Communion led by Reverend Rachel Scheffer.

In a month that has a 5th Sunday all 5 parishes gather at one location for collective worship. This will usually include the option of a walk or lunch together.



November – December 2021

Most people living within or around the village, will be aware that the Community Library has recently re-opened and, for a trial period, has increased the days it is open to 4 per week.

Because the library is run entirely by volunteers on behalf of the Parish Council, we are limited to the hours we can open, so we are trying the following pattern:

Friday	13.00 pm - 16.00 pm



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Heddon's Coal & Bricks

Many locals on their walks around Heddon will of seen light coloured bricks with the word Heddon stamped on them. Here Andy Curtis gives us a fascinating insight into the history of Heddon Colliery & Brick Works

The last deep coal-mine to be worked in Heddon was the Margaret Pit. It was situated about one kilometre to the south-east of the village in the valley bottom, along Station Road. This was originally owned by the family of Northumberland historian, Cadwallader J Bates who lived at Heddon Hall. It supplied coal to the village and also coal and clay to the 'Heddon Colliery and Fire Brick Works' which had offices on Newcastle's Quayside. The Margaret Pit was both a deep mine and a drift mine, with drift workings going back into the hillside. In 1855, Barras & Co. were firebrick manufacturers at Heddon Brick Works, managed by John Brown. In 1886, Fenwick Charlton was the Pit Engineer, and a man called Heddon Robert was brick maker at the associated brick works.

The Ordnance Survey map of 1897 shows two parallel tramways which used rope-haulage to move coal from the colliery to depots high up on Station Road where it could be distributed for local use. The two lines are still reflected by the boundary fences of the fields. The later coal-depot, situated nearer to the village, is today occupied by a bungalow but the site of the earlier depot is still clearly visible further down Station Road nearer the Hall.

The completion of the Scotswood - Heddon - Wylam railway line gave access to outside markets. A link line connected the Colliery and the Brick Works with the main railway line. In 1902, the pit was sold to the Throckley Coal Company. Access allowed them improved control over water ingress in the Throckley pits. In 1906, Throckley merged with the brickmakers, William Stephenson & Sons and sank a third mine at Throckley, the Maria. They continued to work Heddon Colliery until the early 1930's, when it closed, and the remaining coal reserves accessed from the Throckley Isabella pit.

A book published in New York in 1906 (*From Pit to Palace: A Romantic Autobiography* by James J Lawler) apparently tells the story of someone called James Raymond but facts and fiction are hard to unentangle. His first job was described as a trapper boy in Wylam pit in 1863 (possibly aged 7). An underground explosion of a steam boiler killed three miners and ended his brief coal mining career. This was certainly a real event and took place on 27th October 1865.

Leaving employment at the Wylam pit after the explosion, James Raymond goes to work at Bates' Fire Brick and Terra-cotta Works, near Heddon. Coal for the works is mined from a drift situated close to the factory which was supervised by a Mr Baxter. Sally Baxter, his daughter, is the love interest in the story and was said to have many admirers among the young men of the neighbourhood.

In the book, James Raymond rises to become a factor at the Works, then assistant superintendent, eventually getting his father a job at the factory and moving to Heddon on the Wall.

We can find the Baxter family in the 1871 Census in Heddon on the Wall. Head of the household, Thomas Baxter (born 1823, Hartley) is described as Colliery Overman. His daughter, Sarah Baxter was born in 1855 and may have been the 'Sally Baxter' of the book. Thomas' eldest son, William Blackett Baxter (born 1851), described as a coal miner in 1871, is said in the book to have been put in charge of the coal works as superintendent.

St Andrew's churchyard has a gravestone for Thomas Baxter inscribed:

Erected by Thomas Bates esqr., Heddon Banks in memory of his agent Thomas Baxter who died May 26th 1879 aged 56 years manager of Heddon Colliery for 17 years. Also Margaret wife of the above who died June 8th 1894 aged 67 years. Thomas son of the above Thomas Baxter died April 18th 1899 aged 42 years.

In the book, Robert Maxwell, studying to be a minister of the church, could be Michael Heron Maxwell who was vicar of St Andrews Church 1850-1873. James Raymond wins over and marries Sally Baxter in *'Hedden'* village church with Squire Bates as his best man and wedding celebration in the elaborately decorated (but inaccurately illustrated) surroundings of *'Hedden Hall'*. Despite all these clues, I can find no records of either James Lawler or James Raymond in either Wylam or Heddon at that time. Sarah Baxter disappears from the record after the 1871 census where she is 16, and I can find no record of any subsequent marriage.

The 1900 US Census shows that the book's author, James J Lawler, born in England in 1854, was living in Mt. Vernon City near New York. His parents were Irish. The immigration year is given as 1863 and shows that in 1900 he had been married to Fannie I Lawler (born in New York, 1870) for eight years, and had one child. In the States, James Lawler wrote several books on plumbing and took out patents on inventions for heating equipment.


During the period of the second World War the old workshops at Heddon Colliery yard were taken over by Kemsleys as an emergency printing works for the Newcastle Journal and Evening Chronicle. Until 1949 the site was used for light engineering and for the storage of paper.

A tilery, making concrete roof tiles, was opened on the site of the pit by a Major Johnson. The plant was sabotaged by a disgruntled employee, who lived at Blayney Row - he was sent to prison for it. The tilery had hardly opened before he ruined the plant which closed down shortly after.

Since then, there was a series of planning applications made for use of the site. All were refused until 1976 when an application by the Northumberland County Small-bore Rifle Association for the development of an outdoor small-bore rifle range was approved on appeal.

The shooting range, then operated by the Tyne Valley Gun Club, closed some years ago and now woodland and undergrowth largely hides the remains of the old colliery and brick works buildings, disused railway lines and the old pit heap.

Curved Heddon bricks from the old brick-works




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Ad Murum Singers.

Aircraft Noise Action Group (ANAG) – Update

Heddon residents were clearly given some respite during the height of the Covid-19 lockdown period, when flights from Newcastle International Airport (NIA) were drastically curtailed. However, as aircraft flights over Heddon are slowly beginning to resume their pre-Covid frequency, the intrusive noise of jet and turboprop engines has now awoken ANAG from its slumber!

From ANAG's longstanding engagement with the Airport's management, we have realised that it has little interest in addressing the aircraft noise problem that Heddon suffers. This is exacerbated by the strictly designated Satnav flightpath which directs aircraft directly over the village, instead of having a spread of routes distributed over a wider area. Despite this, ANAG will continue to challenge this matter with NIA and the National authorities who control aircraft flightpaths.

With the recent COP26 conference decisions still fresh in our minds and the world's justifiable focus on the Climate Emergency, the major contribution to CO2 emissions that aircraft make is also of much concern to ANAG. Accordingly, ANAG has decided to affiliate itself with the campaign group '*Stay Grounded*'. This group is rooted in fostering sustainable transport and also campaigns against controversial climate strategies.

Once again, can I stress that ANAG in no way downplays Newcastle Airport's contribution to the infrastructure and economy of the NE area, but it believes that it should respect its local community and also act responsibly towards the planet.

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Heddon pays respect to the fallen of the parish

Remembrance Sunday was marked by a short service conducted by The Reverend Rachel Scheffer Priest in Charge at Heddon St Andrew's and Reverend Colin Barrick of the Methodist Church. A two minute silence was observed on the eleventh hour commemorating the signing of the Armistice which brought an end to the First World War.

Personnel from the 3rd Regiment Royal Horse Artillery, stationed at Albemarle Barracks, joined veterans, local residents, the Rainbows and Brownies in paying their respect to the fallen, who made the sacrifice on our behalf in past and present conflicts.

There were wreaths laid from different local groups, the 3rd Regiment Royal Horse Artillery as well as a special wreath to commemorate the animals that served and lost their lives.

Resident David White also gave a moving address to a would be uncle and those that fought and lost their lives at Kohima, Northern India during World War II.

> "Attached to the memorial to the 2nd Division of the British Army in India, at Kohima Military Cemetery is a plaque. The memorial is a brick pedestal topped by a rough-hewn stone pillar and commemorates the 1,400 men who lost their live in the battle for Kohima and the Imphal Road. This was the battle which denied the Japanese Army any further advance into

> > India.

125 of those men were from the 2nd Battalion of The Durham Light Infantry, among them was 24 year old private Albert Sergison who, had he lived, would have been my Uncle.

The words engraved on the plaque are an entreaty to all readers to take home a message; Lest we forget.

When you go home tell them of us and say for your tomorrow, we gave our today."



Canadian John McCrae poem *In Flanders Fields* inspired the use of the poppy as a symbol of Remembrance.

> In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie, In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.
