Heddon residents fight goes on !

After a long and successful fight last year by village residents, the Parish Council, and the County Council, they were dealt a kick in the teeth in early January when a letter from Northumberland County Council dropped through their letterbox's, informing them that the developers were appealing the refusal of planning permission.

Despite an online petition signed by over 60 people, and dozens of letters of objection, the planning application for a development of 4 two storey dwellings to the South of Centurion Way, will go to the Secretary of State for a decision. The appeal will be determined on the basis of written representations.

The developers, Hamilton Williss Land & Development, claim amongst other things, "That the site does not have local significance to the community as open space", that the views are often obscured by a hedgerow up to 2 metres high, that the views are not unique within the village and that there are other benches which take advantage of the view. That the specific view from Centurion Way does not have a wider regional or national significance and is not visited by tourists. They also claim that there was trespass and the hedge was vandalised during the application process (which seems strange when they flattened any remaining fences to gain access to the land for their machinery during surveying)

They say that the loss of view will mostly impact the private residents and the public views do not impact a significant amount of people. There will be "Viewing Corridors" and "Framed views" for people to see the valley.


The residents claim that it is not just the views that would be compromised but also the amount of traffic on Centurion Way, which was clearly not meant to accommodate this amount of vehicles. The extra pollution, damage to parked cars and danger to children playing, that a possible 16 extra vehicles would bring is concerning. The new proposals would also mean the loss of a much-needed parking space as they intend to shorten the parking bay and use it for their visitor parking.

The appeal commenced 4th January 2022 and all representations must be received within 5 weeks of this date by 8th February.





Killie Brigs and other field names Andy Curtis

Nearly all fields have a name, and these names can sometimes tell you about the history of the field and its use over the centuries. Old field names act as a memorial, telling the story of a place, connect you with the history of your area.

Nearly all fields have a name, and these names can sometimes tell you about the history of the field and its use over the centuries. Old field names act as a memorial, telling the story of a place, connect you with the history of your area.

The names originated in a very practical way to identify them for farm labourers who had to go out to work on them. It was clearly important that they did not go out and plough or build a dyke in the wrong field.

The Hexham historian and archaeologist, Stan Beckensall, published a book on Northumberland place-names and field-names in 2016.

A sense of place was fundamental in the days when virtually everybody lived on the land, and did not move far from where they were born. People worked small fields, often divided into strips for allocation so that all got an even share of good and not so good land.

Fields were named after individuals, natural features, their size, whether the land was fertile or not, animals and crops, and proximity to important locations like springs, roads or buildings.

You can see examples on the old plans of Heddon Banks Farm which extends south from the village to the River Tyne. Field-names are recorded on estate plans in 1789 and 1827. The land was shown as in the possession of Nathaniel & John Clayton in the Tithe Award Map of 1848.

Heddon Banks Farmhouse was built around 1850 although the farm was in operation much earlier. The farm has a gin-gang at the rear attached to a large barn, byres and a granary.

Crag Field had been sold by the 1960s as the site for building the Bainbridge Housing Estate (so called from the builders; to differentiate it from the Vallum Estate on the east side). *West and East Close*, near the farmhouse, were developed for Killiebrigs, and more recently, the new builds on Heddon Banks.

The Property of Street Street

Slack Whins below the uppermost Crag Field would later become Slacks Plantation, the site of Killiebrigs Quarry. Whins refers to an area of scrub, probably gorse growing on the thin soils where rock lies near the surface. Trees are shown there in 1827

Below the track to Close Lea, on the west boundary of Heddon township, two fields are recorded in 1789 as *High and Low Killay Bridge*. They are shown as *Killy Brig* on the plan dated 1827.

Bank Field south of the farmhouse would change name to Whinny Pasture in 1961. Below are Oak Tree Field and Bean Field. To the east lie, Bull Well Field, Long Bank and Fallin Pasture.

A curving body of water below Low Wood (which became Clayton's Wood on the first Ordnance Survey map) on the flood plain of the river (haughs) is named as The Lough. It looks very like an oxbow lake from a long lost meander of the River Tyne. The fields below the wood (North and South Haugh) were bought by Close House Estate to provide playing fields for use of the University and are now part

of Close House Golf Course, as now too is Low Killie Brig.

The triangular area shown as Rough Haugh (1789) or The Island (1827) between the Wylam Waggonway and River Tyne is no longer shown as part of the farm on the 1960s plans and is now farmed from Heddon Haughs at the bottom of Station Road.

All of the streets on the new Bainbridge estate were given Roman sounding names: Trajan Walk, Remus Avenue, Aquila Drive, Campus Martius, Mithras Gardens, Taberna Close. Similar names were used on the Vallum Estate and of course for Centurion Way that connects the two. Killiebrigs didn't follow the Roman naming but we can now see where the name came from. It was derived from the names of the two fields, High and Low Killy Brigs. What, however, could be the origin of the names given to the fields?

Brig clearly indicates a bridge. There is still today a very well-built stone bridge, just east of Close Lea, close to the location of these fields. It took the course of the quarry incline under the track from Heddon Banks to Close Lea. However, the field-name was in use well before the quarry was opened.

Killiebrigs sounds Scottish or Irish. Indeed, there is a town in County Donegal called

Killybegs. It is the largest fishing port on the island of Ireland. Its Irish name, Na Cealla Beaga, means 'little cells', a reference to early monastic

Gaelic cill (pronounced keel) originally meant 'cell, church' from Old Irish cell, and now usually means 'chapel, churchyard' in modern Gaelic. It is found in a large number of place-names, whose widespread distribution reflects the spread of the both Gaelic language and Celtic Christianity across Scotland. It is frequently used in combination with the name of the saint to whom the church is dedicated (e.g. Kilmartin, Kilmory, Kilpatrick).

Although no remains have been found, there was a chapel just west of the field of Low Killy Brig, west of the Heddon township boundary. It was first referred to in 1313 and pulled down in 1779 when Close House mansion was built. Could there have been a bridge somewhere in the vicinity of the fields, providing access to the Close House Chantry?

It seems perhaps much more likely that the origin of the field-name was rather more prosaic. Richard Oliver Heslop in Northumberland Words (1894) describes the term, Killy-couper, as an upset, heels over head. Killicoup, being a somerset or somersault.

He quotes the following from Jamieson's Scottish Dictionary (1808):

Killie is a plank or beam placed on a wall so that one end projects a good way further than the other. A child then places himself upon the long end, while two or three press down the short end, so as to cause him to mount."


This suggests that Killie Brig could be just a memory of a simple plank bridge, perhaps across a ditch or small stream and maybe one that was prone to accidental upending. It seems a little similar in this folk-lore origin to the name of Bays Leap Farm.

Aircraft Noise Action Group (ANAG) – Update

There is little to report about ANAG's activities over the last two months. because departure flights from Newcastle Airport over Heddon have been markedly fewer than they were before the Covid-19 pandemic. However, the Group remains active in watching for potential developments which may affect noise pollution levels over the village. With the Group's additional concern about the major contribution that aircraft make to CO2 emissions, it will continue to campaign with other groups on this important issue.

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Gardening Notes - February/March

It is a sure sign that Spring is just around the corner when Snowdrops poke their heads through the cold winter soil. Their white flowers dangle enchantingly announcing to the world to dust down your tools, pick up your gardening gloves and get out there and start gardening! It may still be cold outside but there is still plenty that could be done in readiness for the busy months ahead.

Roses

Roses can be pruned back in March to outward facing buds which keeps the centre of the plant open, aiding air circulation and helping prevent diseases. Be sure to clean up old leaves as these can still carry fungal spores. A good mulch of compost or farm manure will help smother any spores on the ground and also help improve soil conditions over time. A dressing of Toprose or other Rose Fertiliser will certainly help your roses, or any other flowering plants or shrubs, produce better displays throughout the summer months.

Vegetables

February and March are the months when we all should start thinking of starting off young vegetable plants from seed. There is nothing like the fresh taste of baby carrots pulled from the soil, or peas popped from the pods. These are both easy crops to get children growing. You don't necessarily have to have a vegetable garden. You could try growing a

few in pots when the weather warms up, or just filling in the odd bare spot in the flower garden. First Early Seed potatoes can be potted up and started in the greenhouse to give an early crop now. This brings about the age old argument whether to chit of not to chit- that is a question we are often asked. Trials that have been carried out remain relatively inconclusive although there is evidence that the yield of early varieties can be up to 50% more when they are chitted. The difference is negligible in maincrops.


Peat or Peat Free

With all the debate continuing to go on around the use of peat we ourselves are consciously aiming to move more towards peat free composts for all our growing but it will take time. We are having good success with Melcourt Peat Free Multipurpose Compost and finding that we are getting repeat sales from our customers which surely shows they are getting good results as well. It does tend to dry out a bit quicker so be wary of that. This is available in 50 litre bags which means they are not too heavy for carrying.



through gate following the path taking in the view south west across the Tyne Valley. Cross the March Burn 1 and onwards to Iron Sign Farm when reaching the fence the path turns sharply South along the fence then right along a narrow path until you come to the minor road.

Take the minor road North until you reach the crossroads **12** carefully cross the Military Road as the traffic can be travelling fast and head towards Whitchester. Reaching Pipers View, (13) spend a few minutes to take in the view in all directions. Continue past Pipers View until the road bends left, take a right hand turn **4** and follow the farm track up the side of the field. At **1** you can turn left a take the alternative route and follow the finger signs to Turpins Hill home to Barnacres Alpacas. Our route turns right at 15 along the side of the field following the track taking in another viewpoint **16** before heading downhill until you reach the Stamfordham Road **17**. Take care crossing the road and head down 'Green Lane' until you come to Heddon House and Halls of Heddon Nurseries **18**. Follow the road towards the A69 until you come to the finger post at **19**. take the path down into the small wood that goes alongside the dual carriageway until you come to a gate at 🔕 . Turn right and head towards Heddon going through the tunnel under the A69 and along the farm track (which can be very muddy and heavy underfoot when wet, as far as Bays Leap Farm) until you come to the junction of the B6138 and the B6528 21 at the Three Tuns. Cross the roads and back to the start.

The view south west before crossing the March Burn at 11



going through Heddon Common and returning via Bays Leap Farm.

The route can start from anywhere in Heddon - but for this walk we start at the shopping centre, head west turning right up the path through the Welfare Field 11 to the gate at the top of the field.

Go through the gate 2 at the top of the Welfare Field and follow the main path up through the top common. Follow the path alongside the quarry until it forks 3 take the right hand path to Hill Head 4 where you can enjoy the view west. Take the metalled road down to the B6528 (old A69) cross the road and head towards Houghton until you come to the farm track 5 that takes you to the Military Road 6. Cross the Military Road (B6318) and follow the path over the bypass, cross the road and climb over the stile to join Hadrians Wall Path 7.

Go through the kissing gate 8 down the steps and continue west. The path can become boggy for the first 100 metres in wet weather. Follow the path until Rudchester 9 cross the road and follow path passing Vindobala Roman Fort 10. Go

Wylam Waggonway - Temporary Closure

Resurfacing work on the Wylam Waggonway /Hadrian's Cycleway (NCN72) is planned to start on 17 January and last 7 weeks.

The path from Stephenson's Cottage to Blaney Row will be closed during the duration of this work.

Pedestrian access between Newburn and Wylam is along the unsurfaced riverside footpath.


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HEDDON Residents Association

Sadly as Heddon United celebrate their 5th birthday, Heddon St Andrews Football Club folded at the end of 2021 due to lack of players and interest.



A brief potted history of

Heddon A.F.C.

Founded in 1904 Heddon AFC morphed into various disguises over their 100 plus years history.

Over the years they were know as: Heddon A.F.C., Heddon Hibernian, Heddon Welfare, Heddon Institute before they amalgamated to P & G Heddon FC

Heddon played for many years at Houghton and in the 60s had two teams with the second team playing their home games on the show field opposite Heddon garage.

After Heddon moved up to Northern Alliance the pitch they had played on at Houghton was not up standard and had to move. They moved grounds several times: Blue Star Ground at the Wheatsheaf, Bullocksteads where they amalgamated with Proctor & Gamble Newcastle to form P & G Heddon FC in 2002. The club was renamed Heddon FC for the 2002/03 season, a season which concluding with promotion to the Northern Football Alliance Premier Division.

Finally they moved to Newburn Recreational where they remained until they sadly folded in 2017 due to running costs after being in existence in various forms for 114 year

Bryn Tailford reminiscing, recalled the story of Heddon's first game after the Second World War an away game at Haydon Bridge. The team travelled to and from the game in the back of local coal hauliers (Tulips) wagon.

On the way to the game the heavens opened and the players who were getting wet hid under the tarpaulin that was lying in the back of the wagon. When the players climbed out of the back of the wagon they were black with wet coal dust. Those were the days!
