# **Grass cutting mess!**

Residents of Heddon have made their feelings known on social media about the grass cutting or lack of it in certain parts of the village. It looks like different contactors cut different parts of the village.

Parts of the village this spring have frequently been cut, however the grass on Centurion Way, parts of Calvus Drive and Marius Avenue were left until mid May.

The grass had grown to over six inches by the time the contractors had come to cut the grass and when they finished they had left an utter mess - half cut grass, grass cuttings left to rot.

Some of the comments left on Heddon Matters: "Yesterdays cut in Calvus is a disgrace. Cuttings left all over the place... operator doing figure 8's where grass was longest. Unable to speak to anyone on customer service line still... 3 days trying"


It will take place on Friday 3rd

# ST ANDREW'S CHURCH, HEDDON-ON-THE-WALL

We hope that those of you who were able to join us for our Easter services enjoyed them as much as we did. Easter is undoubtedly the most significant time of the year for Christians and the variety of services, the sadness and the joy throughout Holy Week culminating in the Resurrection are inspirational, thought provoking and comforting.

We have almost finished our planning and preparations for leaving the church open several days each week during the summer months.

We hope that members of the community and tourists in the area will feel free to spend some time in this historic building to admire its features, spend some time in prayer or simply enjoy the quiet atmosphere.

#### Sunday worship every week at 10am follows this pattern:

**1st Sunday of the month:** Lay Led Worship. This is not Holy Communion but familiar prayers, Bible readings and hymns. The service usually lasts for about forty minutes.

**2nd Sunday of the month:** Holy Communion or Lay Lead Worship.

3rd Sunday of the month: Holy Communion.4th Sunday of the month: Holy Communion.

\*When there is a 5th Sunday in the month we all gather in one of the 5 parishes sharing 2 priests. Details will be shown on the various notice boards and via social media.

#### SUMMER EVENTS IN HEDDON ST ANDREW'S CHURCH

**Sun 22 May:** As part of our 10 am Worship, we will discuss our Mission Action Plan in which we seek to reach out to the wider community. This will include the Everyone Project where we hope a pompom will be made to represent everyone in the parish, this is approximately 1,700 pompoms. They will then be displayed in St. Andrew's Church.

It is hoped that we can carry on making more pompoms until we have a total of 1,900. These will then be displayed around the village during the celebrations for the Hadrian's Wall 1900 Festival.

The pompoms are all made from leftover balls of wool and after all the celebrations are finished, will be used to create a variety of items such as wall hangings, rugs, wreaths and decorations which, once sold, will raise funds for Charity and St Andrew's Church.

**\*Sun 29 May:** It is the turn of St Andrew's to host a joint service for all the churches in our group. There will be a service of Holy Communion led by Revd. Tom Birch at 10 am followed by a pie and pea lunch from Cafe Aroma which we will serve in the WI Hall in Heddon from 11.45am.







#### Tree replacement scheme update

We've been overwhelmed by the generosity of our community and can't thank you enough for this. We launched the scheme in the last edition of the Heddon Gossip and since that time have secured donations for 13 memorial trees which will be planted in both the Memorial Park and the Welfare Field. We've raised funds through a group community funding project all of which totalled £2174. This will now be matched by the Parish Council bringing a total investment into our community of £4348. Work is now underway to ensure best value for money as we procure the trees and we will share further details of when these will be planted. Not only has this been a great demonstration of the community working together, it is also great for the look of our village and supporting our commitment to the environment and climate change.







# **New Village Project**

The Roman herb garden project on Heddon Common is currently being developed as part of the Hadrians Wall 1900 celebrations.

Funded by the Parish Council. The Childrens Roman Herb Garden is for

children under the age of 11 yrs who attend Heddon St Andrew primary school. The aim of the project is to create and maintain a garden consisting of herbs that the Romans introduced to the UK


Each year group from St Andrew's Primary School will be assigned a raised bed for which they will plant and research the

History/Geography/Culinary aspect of the herbs that they plant

It is the aim that each year the pupils will rotate to a new bed of herbs thereby creating a sustainable project hopefully for years to come.

As you leave Heddon you will see two lines of hedges going straight down the valley **A** and **B** these hedges follow the route of the old tramways that hauled coal up the valley to the old coal depot **2** from Heddon Margaret Pit. Continue down Station Road passing Heddon Hall **3** and as the road levels out wood on the right is where the brick/tile works and Heddon Margaret pit were situated. **4** 

Follow the road through Heddon Haughs farm steading which can be muddy in wet weather until you reach the waggonway and where Heddon Station use to stand (only part of the station that still stands is the station masters house) turn left and head along the waggonway for 200 metres until you come to a finger post pointing to the river Tyne. Carefully step down the side of the waggonway and take the path along the side of the field until you come to the river path.

Turn right and head west along the narrow river bank path towards Wylam. Lining the riverbank and poking out of the path 6 underfoot you will see shiny 'black stones'. These 'stones' is iron slag from Spencers Iron Works at Newburn which was used to strengthen the river bank



Heddon station opened in July 1881 by the Scotswood, Newburn and Wylam Railway. It was situated where Station Road (southeast of Heddon village) meets the National Cycle Route. The station closed to both passengers and goods traffic on 15 September 1958.

Plantation of from the railway to the river was for the river-bank improvements made by Tyne Improvement Commissioners.

Just before you reach Cathouse Plantation on your right partly hidden is the Tide Stone. The 1 metre high 'Tide Stone' marks the old limit of navigation before the river was dredged. On the stone are three castles,

the Arms of Newcastle upon Tyne and the date 1783.

from erosion. The track through Cathouse

Continue on the riverside path that runs alongside the field. As you walk the bend you get great views up and down the river. At the bend this time of year you will be given a display of sandmartins on the wing skimming the water surface catching insects before disappearing into their nest holes in the sandy bank. 

Also look out for Cormorants flying at speed up and down the river.

Follow the path onto the waggonway for 100 metres before going through the gate on the left and into the Close House Riverside nature reserve. If you are quiet and observant you might get a brief glimpse of a Red Squirrels. • Keep walking along the path which takes a fork at the end of the pine trees - the choice is yours - bottom path takes you along the edge of the river where you will find a great variety of plants.

On the grassy bank near the west end of the park if you look carefully you will see a plant with tiny white flowers - the rare alpine pennycress, and other plants influenced by heavy metal contamination.

Go through the gate at the end of Riverside Park and turn right onto the Waggonway and Stephenson's Cottage (National Trust).

Heading back towards Newburn at end of the row of houses turn left through the gate onto the golf course. Keep to the waymarked path and GIVE WAY to golfers following the hedge keeping it to your left. Through the trees might get glimpses of Close House, built in 1779 for the private use of the Bewicke family on the site of an earlier monastic house. Reaching the West Wood turn right following the way marked signs bearing left onto a rough track. Just before the track turns right you will see a door which is the entrance to the old icehouse. Through the track to the old icehouse. The track to the first moon landing were kept. Keep

following the path you will come upon wooded carvings - a seat with horse heads **3** and a carved bookcase. Passing the pond you will come upon a full size driftwood horse standing on its back feet. On the left is a pillar of stone from Skelton Park ironstone mine in Cleveland.

Follow the uphill path through the trees passing the club house on the right until you come to tarmacked path/road cross this path and follow the path through the pine trees until you come to the driving range and cafe (You are welcome to pop in for a cuppa).

Head up the drive until you come to the way marker near the top. Turn right and cross the golf course taking care and giving way to the golfers. Head through the small copse keeping a eye out for golfers driving

of from the tee box to the left and above. Follow the path across the rough grassland and through the kissing gate. Cross the field and climb the stone stile onto Heddon Banks. Follow the road passing the houses on the right until you come to a bridge under which runs a stream out of Close Lea Quarry known to locals as 'the Bottom Quarry'. Heddon quarries supplied sandstone for many buildings of Newcastle including, Grey's Monument and the Central Station. The stone was also shipped further afield to London where it was used at several locations in London.


The Evening Chronicle of 19<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>nd</sup> September 1973 recorded the demolition of the 100 foot chimney at Close Lea Quarry. The chimney is said to have carried a stone inscribed with 1878, the year when operations commenced. On the left hand side of the bridge is the Pipeline of Throckley Aqueduct.

To the south side of the bridge following the line of trees ran the quarry 'Mineral Railway (disused)'. This track ran to the east of the golf course pond, curving across the sports field in the bottom to join the main railway.

Keep following the road up Heddon Banks climbing steeply passing the entrance to the Bainbridge Estate. Turn right at the traffic Island passing the Swan and the Jubilee Tree planted for Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee on 22 June 1897 back to the start.

For a alternative end of route follow the path up through Heddon Common passing the Butterfly Garden onto the top common until you come to Heddon Welfare field.

# Jubilee and Coronation celebrated in Heddon

In June 2022 Her Majesty the Queen will become the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee after 70 years of service.

In Heddon on the Wall, a *'Jubilee Tree'* was planted for Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee on 22 June 1897 celebrating the 60th anniversary of the Queen's accession in 1837. It was the first Diamond Jubilee celebration of any British monarch in history. The tree still stands and is 125 years old this year.

In an old photographic postcard of Towne Gate, the newly planted tree can be seen in the centre of the view protected by metal railings set into a curving stone base. Part of this base is still visible below the tree, on the grass below the new library, the railings probably removed during the Second World War. The old Hearse House on the left is now within the walled garden of Church House. The two storey semi-detached 'Jubilee Houses' (to the left of the Methodist Church) have been demolished as have the single storey cottages that formed part of Blue Row in the distance.

The 'Jubilee Tree' at its best in spring. Although we locally know it as a 'Golden Maple', it is probably more likely to be a cultivar of the Common Sycamore, *Acer pseudoplatanus 'Worley'*, the *Golden-Leaved Sycamore Tree*.

Compared to the surrounding trees, its early spring leaf colour is a bright yellow-green. The pale green colour is maintained in summer although much less distinctive. The variety is said to have been developed in Germany around 1879, but is now usurped by variegated and more colourful forms.

King Edward VII became king at the age of 60 on the death of Queen Victoria on 22 January 1901. The coronation was held on 9<sup>th</sup> August 1902. It had originally been scheduled for 26 June, but two days before, Edward was diagnosed with appendicitis, and the ceremony was delayed.

Heddon celebrated the coronation by the planting of another tree.

The inscription on the spade handle reads: Presented to Fenwick Charlton Esq. on the occasion of planting The Coronation Tree at Heddon on the Wall 26<sup>th</sup> June 1902.

The newly planted 'Jubilee Tree' planted for Queen Victoria can be seen in the protected by metal railings set into a curving stone base.

The location of the tree is on the old Heddon Village Green just above Station Road where there is an oak tree growing. However, the tree here has probably been replaced, maybe twice, since the original was planted. The one shown below doesn't look 120 years old.

Fenwick Charlton was the engineer for the Throckley Coal Company at Margaret Pit in Heddon. He was born on  $17^{\rm th}$  April 1850 and died  $26^{\rm th}$  December 1913. He is buried in St Andrew's Churchyard along with his wife and three children. The family lived for a time in the Old Schoolhouse, Houghton.


On the same day the tree was planted, Heddon on the Wall also celebrated the Coronation with an impressive bonfire high up on Heddon Common above the quarry - an event unencumbered by Health & Safety.



#### **Nature Notes**

Encouraging Prickly Visitors - Ruth Oatway

As I sit down to write this article I've recently seen house martins back in the village, joining the swallows which arrived a little earlier, though their numbers seem low so I hope more are on their way!



Sadly hedgehogs are another once-common species thought to have been declining since the 1950s and 60s. Research by the People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) and The British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) showed that hedgehogs have undergone a long historic decline, but that there are now big differences between urban and rural populations. Loss of habitat (particularly hedgerows and field margins) and increased pesticide use are thought to be key factors. Hedgehogs are declining faster in rural than urban areas and there is some evidence that urban populations have stabilized and even begun to recover in recent years, so parks and gardens may be important refuges. On a positive note there seems to be a good population here in Heddon. Returning from a walk at dusk recently I saw one crossing Trajan Walk and another a little further along the road, so do keep an eye out when driving at night. There are several other ways to give these charming little mammals a helping hand:

- Make sure your garden is connected so hedgehogs can move between green spaces. Leaving a 'hedgehog highway' gap of 13x13cm in a fence or wall can help.
- · Leave some areas of your garden "wild".
- Check hedges and undergrowth before strimming or clipping, and check log piles before lighting a bonfire.
- Make sure any ponds or pits such as cattle grids have a shallow slope for safe exit if a hedgehog should fall in, and dispose of litter carefully as hedgehogs can become trapped or entangled.



- Hedgehogs are mainly insect-eaters and can help to control garden pests such as slugs, snails and caterpillars. It is best to avoid using pesticides, especially slug pellets. Try organic control methods instead.
- Leave out a shallow dish of fresh water, especially in dry weather. This will benefit lots of wildlife, not just hedgehogs.
- A little supplementary food can help them, especially in spring when they have just

emerged from hibernation or in autumn when they are putting on weight to survive the winter. Suitable foods include meaty cat or dog food or cat biscuits, though biscuits designed for hedgehogs can also be purchased. Hedgehogs are lactose intolerant so should not be fed milk. A Feeding station can prevent the food being eaten by cats or other animals.

Hedgehog houses can be made or bought to provide a safe place of shelter.

I'm hoping I'll see hedgehogs in the garden several times over the summer, and I'd particularly love to see the young, known as hoglets so I'm keeping my fingers crossed. More information including tips on making houses and feeding stations can be found at:

Ponteland Red Squirrels and Wylam & District Red Squirrels are public groups which you can contact on Facebook to report sightings.



# Gardening tips & advice for -June/July

Summer in the garden is more about enjoyment than hard work and hopefully time spent on preparation, pruning, weeding and sowing seeds earlier in the season is now reaping its rewards. There are still plenty of jobs that need doing though to ensure that plants continue to put on a colourful display right through the summer. This is particularly important with plants grown in pots and containers and especially for bedding plants. The drier and warmer and sunnier (hopefully!) summer months means that careful watering and feeding is required to keep displays at there best. Water in the evening where possible adding a liquid feed once a week. Tomato feed is a good all round fertiliser for all flowering plants. Removing the dead flowers regularly will encourage new growth and a longer lasting display.

Plants in the garden can hopefully go longer periods without the need to water though the vegetable garden and bedding plants will certainly benefit if conditions get to dry. Help them by regular weeding and when watering, make sure the water penetrates through the soil. A good watering once a week is far

better than a dribble a night as this can bring the roots nearer the surface rather then deeper down. A good mulching of the soil surface once plants are well watered will help reduce the need for watering. Any plants recently put in will be in more need f regular watering than well established ones.

Roses in particular as well as a few other flowering shrubs and perennials will all benefit from a summer feeding. A Rose fertiliser is a good all-round choice for this as being high in potash it helps with flowering and makes the plant tougher and in theory more resistant to disease. Regular dead heading will encourage more blooms later in the season.

There is still time to plant up pots and baskets as June is the month when we have hopefully seen the last of all the frosts at least until the Autumn! June is the month that we will be planting all our Dahlias out- at least 6000 of them and there will be plenty for sale as well. The open centred varieties such as Pooh and our own range of Hadrian's varieties are becoming increasingly popular as they attract a wide range of pollinators and really come into their own when summer flowering perennials are staring to fade away.

So many other things to mention but I need to get my lawn cut (which we should never cut too short) and some weeding of my own done!

Happy gardening, and remember, we're only a short(ish) walk away for to come and enjoy the range of colourful plants we always have on display- and of course to come and ask for more gardening tips and advice!

#### Make Your Own Bee Hotel

Welcome bees into your garden by making these fun and easy to make bee hotels. Once finished simply hang the bee house in your garden and help in the conservation of our native bees.

- **Step 1:** Start by using a clean tin can or another cylinder, which is open at both ends. Thread through a length of thick garden string so that you can hang up your bee hotel.
- **Step 2:** Cut up lengths of hollow plant stems or bamboo canes the same length as the cylinder, inserting them long ways so the cylinder is filled up. You could also use paper or card, wrapping either round a pencil to make a tube. These will need to be shorter than the cylinder so they can be protected from the rain.
- **Step 4:** Add some twigs sticks or straw to offer a home for other insects too!
- **Step 5:** If you want to be creative you can decorate the tin can or cylinder with some bright colours to attract bees to their new home.
- **Step 6:** When finished simply find a location for your hotel, which should ideally be in an open sunny spot, and secure it so it doesn't move around in the wind.
