# Celebrating the Kings Coronation in Heddon

As we go to print plans are still being drawn up for events taking place in Heddon to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III on the 6th of May.

A Coronation afternoon tea is to be held at the Knott Hall, in a similar fashion to the Jubilee tea. To fall into line with the voluntary element of the Coronation, we would be undertaking two things.

- Those unable to attend through age or infirmity would get a boxed tea, this would be delivered by a volunteer prior to the event.
- 2. At the event there will be provision for food bank collection.

Plans are also being made for something for children after the afternoon tea.

Singer Josh Hodgson will being singing live at the Swan 8-30pm start.

King Charles III's Coronation will take place on Saturday 6th May 2023 at Westminster Abbey in London. During the ceremony, the King will be crowned alongside Camilla, the Queen Consort.

The Coronation is both the symbolic religious ceremony during which a sovereign is crowned and the physical act of placing a crown on a monarch's head.

It formalises the monarch's role as the head of the Church of England and marks the transfer of their title and powers.

## **HETT** - Heddon Education & Training Trust

The Heddon on the Wall Education & Training Trust (HETT) was set up by St. Andrew's Church in Heddon more than twenty years ago for the benefit of the people of the parish. Each year the Trust awards grants for the education and training of people in the village. One of the main beneficiaries is St. Andrews C of E Primary School, which benefits from contributions from the Trust in a variety of different ways. Two examples include:

- a) funding the cost of a Bible for every child in Year 3, which children are allowed to keep as their own once they leave the school;
- b) purchases such as a garden shed for use by the school's Gardening Club, Read Write online literacy support resources, as well as musical equipment.

In addition, awards are also granted to former pupils of the school, as well as current residents. One example is Amy Anderson, a former pupil of the

school who also grew up in the village. She successfully applied for a grant to cover the cost of the software, materials and trips that form a mandatory component of her degree course at university. This support enabled Amy to continue her education while defraying the cost of her course fees.

Anyone can submit a request to the Trust, as long as the request is directly related to current or imminent education and training needs, and as long as you meet one of the following criteria:

- a) you are a current pupil at St. Andrews C of E Primary School;
- b) you are a former pupil of St. Andrews C of E Primary School;
- c) you are a current resident of Heddon.

#### **Nature Notes** - Appreciating Ancient Trees

One of the things that first attracted me to Heddon-on-the-Wall was the beautiful woodland around the village. Heddon Common and Slack's Plantation are great for walks all year round to enjoy the changing seasons. We also have some lovely mature trees on the Village Green, and patches of woodland around Close House Golf Course and in the surrounding countryside. These woodlands provide habitat for a lot of the other wildlife we enjoy too. The older trees are particularly valuable as they tend to have more holes, nooks and crannies that can be used by other plants and animals.

It was sad to see so many trees damaged during the storms of winter 2021/22 but dead and decaying wood (both standing and fallen) is a very valuable habitat in its own right. It supports fungi, some of which soften the wood making it more suitable for insects (including some rare ones) which in turn support birds like woodpeckers, tree creepers, nuthatches and goldcrests, and many species of bats.

Veteran and ancient trees are more abundant in Britain than elsewhere in Northern Europe. This is largely due to our cultural heritage of wood-pasture and parkland landscapes, but there are no reliable statistics on the extent, nor on rates of loss of these habitats. My husband recently came across the Woodland Trust's Ancient Tree Inventory which aims to map the location and features of Britain's oldest and most characterful trees so they can be better understood and conserved in the future. The Woodland Trust points out that:

'Ancient trees are as much a part of our heritage as stately homes, cathedrals and works of art. But they don't get the same protection'

Anyone can contribute by submitting a record to be added to the map. We noticed that there were no records in the area immediately around Heddon but we'd seen trees on our local walks that would meet the criteria for recording as notable, veteran or ancient.

**Notable** trees are usually mature trees which may stand out in the local environment because they are large in comparison with other trees around them.

A **veteran** tree will have some of the features found on an ancient tree but won't have the great age.

A tree is defined as **ancient** if it is:

- In the third or final stage of its life (this stage can go on for decades or centuries).
- Old relative to others of the same species.
- Interesting biologically, aesthetically or culturally because of its great age.

We downloaded the recording form and information from the website and started recording a few of the trees that can be surveyed from public rights of way. The surveys were fairly easy and didn't take much time but made us look more closely at our local trees and notice how many other species they support. Trees can be recorded at any time of year but spring/early summer is good as it's easier to

identify the species once some leaves have opened but to view the whole tree before the canopy becomes too dense.

Next time you're out on a walk around Heddon or further afield, take a closer look at some of the most characterful trees and consider adding them to the Ancient Tree Inventory: https://ati.woodlandtrust.org.uk/

# Memories of life in Heddon by Elizabeth 'Betty' Cockburn

#### Part 2

Continued from last edition

My Mother's Mother lived at Crawcrook. We often walked from Hill Head to Crawcrook to see her. How weary our Mother must have been many a time before we got back home.

My Father's Mother lived at Whickham. Her name was Patterson having been married twice. She was blind. My Mother used to go and see her. She always took me and my smallest sister. We had to walk from Scotswood Bridge. I got the job of carrying the young one when we got to Whickham Bank, piggy-back. We used to sit down halfway for a rest. My heart used to ache for the horses that pulled loads up that hill.

There was a steep hill going to our house at Hill Head and the roadway got very bad for the horses and carts so it was decided to pen it with stones from the quarry. John Hunter and Jack Dunn did the job. I and George Laws pulled the barrow with the stones on.

We used to look forward to tattie picking time. That was the chance to earn a shilling if you were lucky to get set on. One farmer I knew was kind and gave you a few potatoes as well as your shilling. At another farm you got your shilling or a pail of potatoes. Those tatties were very welcome in our house and you forgot about your aching back next day.

When our Father worked at Heddon Pit there were two shifts, fore shift and back shift. Fore shift started at 12.30am and we used to creep about the house in case we made a noise and woke him. We must have been a real trial to our Mam as she tried to keep us quiet. The seams of coal were only eighteen inches high and he often came home with skin scraped from his back and legs.

With working at the pit Father got a load of coal every month. It was just duff and small stuff but it kept us warm. You could get three bucketfuls onto the back of our fire. We picked sticks out of the wood for kindling the fire. The fireplace was built of brick with a round oven and a set-pot to heat the water but we could never use that because it was cracked. Our Mother used to blacklead the whole fireplace till it shone.

Father continued working as a miner till Heddon pit closed. They used candles down the pit for light. He had a candle box in which he put five candles and he had a squib box. These were like yellow straws filled with powder and were used to fire the shots down the pit to loosen the coal. Our chimney at home often needed cleaning of soot and Father used to light one of these squibs and it used to shoot up the chimney and bring the soot down.

We had all the water to carry for the household. The well was down the field at the back of our cottage about three hundred yards. You had to lie on your stomach and reach down into the well with the bucket. After rain you had no trouble getting water because it used to run over, but in the Summer water got very scarce.

In the Winter there was always a proggy mat in the frames. All us children progged when we were big enough. Our prodders were made from clothes pegs and your finger ends did get sore pulling the clippings through the canvas. It was quite an occasion when the mat was finished and we cut it out of the frames.

Our cottage consisted of one big room and a pantry. My Father and Mother slept in a big double bed in the far corner of the living room. My sisters and I slept in a dess bed, which had to be folded up every morning. It had legs that folded back and these legs had to be straight when the bed was unfolded each night or else you landed on the floor, many a laugh we had when this happened.

Across the yard from our door was the midden. Everything went into it from three cottages. There was one dry closet for three families and this all ran into the midden. When the midden was full the men folk got the loan of a cart and horse from the farm at Houghton and cleaned it all away. It was awful in the Summer when we had to hang fly-catchers in our house because we lived nearest to the midden and there was swarms of flies.

Another treat we got once a year was a trip to Ryton Willows. Mother used to make tatty pies the night before and the next morning we all walked down Heddon Bank, past Heddon Station to Moor Court, to the river side and got the boat over the river to the Willows. It cost a halfpenny each. There was a horse brake waiting and we all piled in and got a ride over to the shuggy boats that cost another halfpenny. We had very many happy days on the Willows.

I can remember the Peace Tea at the end of the Great War 1914-18. It was held in the Killiebrigs field belonging to Mr. Shield of Heddon Banks. All the children got a bag of buns and a new penny. We also ran races and I won a shilling in the potato race. The field is now a big housing estate.

There was a big quarry not far from where we live. We called it Hunter's Quarry. It was owned by George Hunter who lived at Hill Head in the big house. He had workmen who carved gravestones in the Quarry. There was also a joiners shop. They blasted the rock down in big chunks then split it and trimmed it for house building. There was also a big crane but I never saw that working. A man called Chambers fell off the crane and was killed and a small cross was chiselled in the rock face where he fell. This quarry was filled up (1979) with refuse.

There was a smaller quarry nearer Heddon and we called that one the Paddock Pond because we went there for frogs eggs and we called frogs Paddocks. This pond used to freeze in the Winter and we used to slide on it, unknown to our Mother, of course. I lost one of my clogs in there one day. That quarry is also filled with refuse now.

I left school at fourteen. I still had three sisters still at school, Sarah, Winnie and Alice who was the baby. Our Mother was a semi invalid then and my older sister, Margaret, looked after the house. Our oldest sister, Barbara, was working as a servant on a farm. As the strike was on at that time I had to look for a job. I got a job at March's farm at Houghton looking after cattle. It was Winter time and the cattle were fastened up in the byres. It was very hard work. The wages were one shilling a day. I had to muck them out and feed them. I was just a little lass about five stone and that muck had to be filled into a barrow and wheeled out to a big heap and shoved onto the top. The barrow sometimes got the better of me and it tipped and I had it all to do again.

I also cut the turnips into ships and carried them in a basket to each beast. I also fed them hay. This feeding had to be done twice a day and I got a shilling a day for that.

The boss sometimes sent me with corn on my back in a sack to

feed sheep as well. I was the only one in our house to take any money home that Winter. My footwear was a pair of my Father's old pit boots full of hob nails and very heavy. I also had to give the cattle a pail of water each day, which had to be hand pumped in an outhouse and carried across the yard to the byre.

Another job on the farm was a back breaking job. I had an apron made from a sack fastened around my waist and I filled this with small stones from the field, then tipped them in the hedge. The wickens were generally burned. Pulling yellows was another job, often you did this on your own and got very lonely for nine pence a day.

Our Darling Mother was only forty eight when she died. She is buried behind Church House in the old cemetery at Heddon. I had to come back home and as I had been away nearly a year I was longing to see my sisters. It was November and a cold frosty moonlight night when I got back to Newcastle. My sister Margaret had promised to meet me off the bus but somehow she missed me and I had to get home myself. When I got home all my younger sisters were sitting round the fireplace, but there was no Mother and we all had a good cry and they were all pleased to see me and hear about my year away.

# **Charles Edward Bell**

On approximately 29th January, sadly Eddie passed away at home. He had recently been in hospital, was aware that he was slowing down, but was still doing his weekly shop, being fiercely independent, and seemed to be on the mend.

Charles Edward Bell, known as Eddie was born on 18th Feb 1942 in Northern Ireland. His father, also



Charles Edward, died when he was very young so he became a father figure to his younger sister. Initially he trained as an electrician, but didn't like it, and so went to work on a farm, driving tractors, for about year before, at the age of 17, he joined the army - the Royal Signals, where he served for 26 years.

When he left the army he worked in the prison service then in security at Fenwick's apartment stores in Newcastle.

He retired about 16 years ago and made Heddon-on-the-Wall, a place he loved, his home.

He was a good son and brother and uncle. His mum idolised him – as I think did his nephew, Charlie, Charles Edward, who was named after him, and loved him dearly. Charlie's 21 week old son, Eddie is also Charles Edward. Charlie said Eddie never forgot his nephew's birthday, and added that Eddie was one of those people who would have done anything for anyone – he was truly a good person.

Eddie will be sadly missed by all the Bailie family and his friends who knew him. RIP uncle.

Eddie was cremated during February at the West Road Crematorium which featured a number of soldiers, some travelling from York, including 4 flag-bearers, a piper and a bugler, who all provided a very moving spectacle. This was very low-key in other respects, following Eddie's wishes. The music chosen for Eddie's village service, led by Deacon Maggie Patchett at the Methodist Church on Wednesday 8th March, was purposely upbeat including *When Irish Eyes are Smiling* and *Danny Boy*. Poems were read by Mr T. Smith and myself and a few words spoken. With permission of course, Marilyn Chapman, as she did at the cremation, took video clips throughout the service, in order that Eddie's family from Belfast who could not attend would at least share some of the moments. Eddie's ashes were placed in the ground by Mr T. Smith and covered by a number of those present. RIP C. E. Bell.



# Stephensons Cottage Walk

We start this walk outside the Methodist Church, (can be started and finish anywhere in the village) head west passed the Swan before turning left down Heddon Banks.

Head down and along Heddon Banks until the tarmac road runs out. Go through the gate 2 and follow the signposted path downhill along the hedge until you reach Clayton Wood. 3 Turn right, following the path along the side of the wood, down through the gap in the hedge keeping the wood on the left and the golf course on the right crossing the stream to join the other path. 4 Turn left along the metalled path into the field and follow Hadrian's Wall Path and signs along the side of the field until you reach the waggonway. 5

Once on the waggonway turn right walking for 100 metres before going through the gate on the left and onto the Riverside Country Park. If you are quite and observant you might get a brief glimpse of a Red Squirrel. Keep walking along the path which takes a fork at the end of the pine trees - the bottom path takes you along the river bank.

Taking the top path you will find a great variety of rare plants Alpine Penny-cress and other plants influenced by heavy metal contamination. Dune helleborine can be found on the edge of the grassland under some young beech trees and can be found further into the woodland.

Go through the gate at the end of the Riverside Country Park, turn right onto the waggonway and Stephenson's Cottage (National Trust - check website for details: if open summer months for tea).

Once through the gate at the right of Stephensons Cottage turn left and follow the road up to and through The Rift 8 until you reach Bluebell Lane. Walk up Bluebell Lane taking care as it can be quite busy with vehicles, until the sharp bend in the road. On the right you will see a stile and finger post, 9 climb the stile and follow the field path along side the hedge, enter the small West Wood 10 following the path until you come to the Close House Driveway 11 where you turn right along

the driveway and follow it to the driving range and cafe. (You are welcome to pop in for a cuppa)

Cross the road and follow the path through the pine trees until you come to a steep tarmac path. Head down the path crossing the road, passing the pond aiming for the gate straight ahead. Go through the gate and yard until you come to the finger post that points you up the steep 'cobbled road' which can be very slippery when wet. As the road levels out and bends left on the right along a path is the domes housing former Newcastle University observatory telescopes. Head through the gap at the side of the gate and pass the house on the left heading upwards to Heddon Banks.

As you reach the Slacks Plantation (Bottom Common to us locals) take the left steep path uphill crossing the path from Hill Head passing the Butterfly Garden onto the Top Common to taking the path along the edge of the gardens until you come to the Welfare field.

Turn left through the gates on the path on Hexham Road, 77 cross Towne Gate through the Memorial Park, up Chare Bank 18 till you reach Towne Gate again, bare right past the Women's Institute to the Methodist Church and the start of your walk.
