Heddon resident receives his MBE at Alnwick Castle

Heddon resident and former councillor Angus Lunn was awarded his MBE in May of last year in the late queens birthday honours list for Services to Conservation & Wildlife Conservation.

He was asked to attend a service at Windsor Castle in November of 2022 to receive his MBE but declined for various reasons, therefore he was invited to Alnwick Castle to meet and be presented with his MBE by Her Grace The Duchess of Northumberland in her capacity as Lord-Lieutenant of Northumberland. The presentation took place on the evening of 11th January with family and invited guests.

ANGUS LUNN citation before he was awarded his MBE...

"Angus is a man of immense academic rigour and knowledge having been Head of Adult Education at Newcastle University. Additionally, his life-long voluntary service and passion to peatlands is exceptional.

Angus has single-handedly produced the first vegetation map of Northumberland, which identifies and maps the sphagnum bogs in the West of the County, leading a campaign to ensure that their ecological significance was recognised. The bogs became known as the Border Mires, most of which are nationally and internationally designated and collectively recognised in their importance.

The bogs, the rare plants and animals they support are protected, valued and are being restored for future generations, securing significant LIFE funding to support their restoration, significantly improving their condition.

One of Angus' many achievements was overseeing the transformation of the Hancock Museum in Newcastle into a nationally important centre of public education and engagement in the natural world.

Angus has been involved with the Northumberland Wildlife Trust from its origin – he was awarded the 2009 Cadbury Medal for services to nature conservation by them and is now Trustee and Vice-President.

Angus has spent his working life educating people in the ecological sciences and geology, giving countless talks to a range of audiences and this has continued into his retirement – he is a vital force for nature, inspiring many through his teachings and still asking awkward questions when needed.

Stagecoach takes over Service 685 **Carlisle to Newcastle service**

Stagecoach are now operating Service 685 which runs between Carlisle and Newcastle. They will still be offering the hourly service with a few changes in the morning and evening.

As well as the route change, the Tyne & Wear Mega Rider boundary will now extend to Hexham - meaning that regular travellers can take advantage of new lower day and weekly fares for travel to and from Newcastle.

Until further notice Stagecoach are still offering their £2 single tickets, this means people who live along the A69 route will still be able to take advantage of travel as far as either Carlisle or Newcastle for the £2.00 bargain price ..

Day and week tickets are available on the bus by paying contactless or with cash, and also on our app, you can buy 28 day tickets on their website.

Nature Notes - What a Hoot! Tawny Owls in Heddon *Ruth Oatway*

It's not the cold and bad weather of winter I mind so much as the short hours of daylight. We are now well past the winter solstice and it's nice to think there's a little more daylight every day. I'm also seeing plenty of signs of spring with bulbs shooting up and catkins dangling from trees.

However, there are some advantages to the dark mornings and evenings and one of these is the increased chance of hearing or even seeing tawny owls. Tawny owls are resident in the UK and remain on their breeding territories all year round, defending them with territorial calls. They are early breeders with the first eggs laid in February, though most pairs will breed from mid-March onwards. Territorial activity increases in early autumn when young birds are establishing their own territories and continues through winter into February and March. This is one reason that you have a better chance of hearing them at this time of year. The other reason is that they are a mainly nocturnal species, often active around dawn and dusk, and it's easier to be outside listening for them at those times during the winter months!

There are five resident owl species in the UK, of which tawny owl, barn owl, long-eared owl and short-eared owl are native. Little owl was introduced in the 1800s. The 'Twit twoo' hoot of an owl is one of our most familiar bird calls but tawny owls are actually the only species to make this call. They are also our most common owl. In fact, the famous 'twit twoo' is made up of not one call but two. The 'twoo' part of the call is a territorial hoot by the male. Females rarely hoot but both sexes use the 'twit' part of the call (officially referred to as the 'keewik') as a contact call. During the breeding season, a resident pair will 'duet' with the male hooting and the female responding with the 'keewik' call in between his hoots. Tawny owls favour woodland habitats but may also breed in large suburban gardens and I've been lucky enough to hear a male hooting and even a pair duetting around Heddon on a few occasions. Occasionally when running or walking in the half-dark of a winter morning I've also seen the unmistakable round silhouette of a tawny owl in a tree in the village and once perched on a rooftop TV aerial! I've yet to get a photo but I live in hope.

Tawny owls feed mostly on small mammals such as mice and voles but may also take small birds, amphibians, large insects and earthworms. They need suitable tree cavities or nest boxes to breed in, so may be limited in their distribution by the availability of these nest sites. They are currently on the amber list of conservation concern as they may be undergoing a long-term population decline, but despite the familiarity of the species there's a lack of knowledge and information about what's happening to their populations and why.

The British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) has used volunteer surveys to record tawny owls calling. The surveys have been repeated in 1989, 2005 and 2018 to look at change over time. Initial results of the 2018 survey suggest that the percentage of sites (tetrads) occupied by tawny owls has declined from 62% in 1989 to 53% in 2018 and that most of the declines have been in sites dominated by conifer woodland with occupancy remaining stable in broad-leafed woodland. Research is ongoing to further understand these trends, but let's hope these beautiful birds continue to make a successful home around Heddon.

Time for a garden RETHINK!!

If your garden looks dull and unwelcoming in the depths of winter, then maybe it's time for a rethink.

Even through the light covering of snow on the ground there are signs that spring is just around the corner. Our first snowdrops opened in the first week of January. Witch hazels, with their spidery yellow, orange, or red spicily fragrant flowers are at the peak and the impressive upright yellow racemes of Mahonia's stand proudly above the spiny leaves of this tough evergreen. Fruits still hang on Mountain Ash, Hawthorn and many other shrubs and trees, though each day sees less and less as birds feast on this valuable source of winter nourishment.

So many other plants can provide us with some much-needed winter interest, too many indeed to list as even the naked stems of some of our more common plants show off their silhouetted branches against brilliant blue winter skies, especially when glistening white with an early morning hoar frost. The brilliant red, orange, yellow or even black stems of Dogwoods (Cornus alba) glow in the winter light with Cornus Midwinter Fire looking exactly as its name would suggest. Ornamental grasses can sparkle on such mornings and prove themselves worthy of a place in the year-round garden.



Of course, I am sure we all have a list of favourite plants, and If I were to be asked what mine were at this time of year then it would be Hellebores and the wonderfully fragrant Winter or Sweet Box.

Hellebores, with their elegant blooms of white, green, purple, pink, sometimes yellow and some even spotted with red, have a long flowering period lasting well into spring, The most commonly known varieties are the Christmas Rose (Helleborus niger) and the Lentern Rose (Helleborus orientalis), though recently there have been a large number of very attractive hybrids introduced, some with larger two-tone flowers, others with marbled foliage. Mainly evergreen, they will thrive in shadier spots, and many will seed themselves naturally. The flowers are an invaluable source of nectar for those pollinators brave enough to venture out!

A less well known and underrated evergreen shrub is the difficult to pronounce, let alone spell, Sarcoccoca, the Sweet, or Winter box. With its small, glossy and box like evergreen leaves, its appearance in summer will not steal the show but in the short days of winter, the small, almost inconspicuous creamy white flowers open to give off a delicious sweetly scented fragrance with even a small sprig of blooms filling a room. The flowers are followed by black, purple or red berries, depending on variety. The plants themselves are easy to grow, doing better in shade than full sun and will even tolerate dry conditions once established. One of my favourite varieties is Sarcoccoca hookerieana Winter Gem, with larger than average leaves held on upright reddish stems. The white flowers emerge from reddish buds and are followed by spherical, glossy red berries that ripen to black. Being a member of the box family, the upright forms can even be used as lightly clipped, informal hedge.

To see these and many more garden plants showing off their winter colours, then why not have a gentle winters day stroll up to the nursery and see us where we will be happy to point them out.

Memories of life in Heddon by Elizabeth 'Betty' Cockburn

Elizabeth Cockburn was born to Alice & William Ridley on 6th June 1912 and died 28th April 1995. I believe these memories were collected by Ann Lockley in the early 1990s and first published by Pat Farnaby on the earlier precursor of this Heddon website. Many of the things Betty tells us about the village in the 1920s and 30s would now be lost without their important initiative. This article was triggered by Ian Scott recently showing me a little metal plaque attached to a tree which overlooks the old quarry above Hill Head where she had been brought up. I had never noticed it.

My earliest recollection of my childhood is being rocked in a wooden cradle by my Mother in the middle of the night. I had toothache. I must have been only about three years old. I can remember my mother sighing with weariness. I remember the firelight flickering and the shadows dancing off the walls of the cottage where we lived at Hill Head, Heddon-on-the-Wall.

I was born at Wood Houses, Wylam, on 6th June, 1912. I was the sixth child born to my mother. She had nine children. Three boys and six girls. The boys all died in infancy at Wood Houses. When we moved to Hill Head, there was Father and Mother and four girls. Our Mother was to have two more children, both girls after we moved to Hill Head. My Mother's maiden name was Alice Knowles. She lived with her mother (a widow) and her brother John in George Stephenson's cottage on the river side below Wylam. She was a bond worker on the Rift Farm. They lived in the cottage and she had to work in the fields in order to get a roof over their heads. They must have come from South Moor because I have in my possession a small New Testament presented to my Mother for good attendance at South Moor Sunday School in 1890 Holmside Parish [Co. Durham]. She was married to my Father at Wylam Church.

My Father was born at Mickley, William Henry Ridley. I don't know much about his youth, but I do know that as a young man he was a soldier in the 'Northumberland Greys' as he called them. My eldest sister has a picture of him in uniform with my Mother and his Mother seated beside him. When he left the army he worked in the mines, coal hewing at Heddon Colliery. He also served in the 1914-18 war as an army cook. My father's mother lived at Whickham. She had a most unusual maiden name which was Miss Bread.

Our life at Hill Head as a child was as happy as we could make it. I was a



country child. I loved the woods and roamed for miles often on my own. The birds, flowers and animals were my life. Spring time was bird nesting time, and the birds used to nest under the pantiles of our little cottage and woe-betide any of the neighbours children I caught on our wall trying to get at the bird's eggs. I've shed many a tear over a small dead bird. The man next door to us used to trap the birds and cage them and keep them in a shed in his garden. I sat one day and watched them fluttering around in this shed till I couldn't bare it any longer so I went in and freed them all. I spent a few anxious weeks in case he found me out but he never did. I still cannot bear to see wild creatures caged.

Times were very hard for us between 1924 and 1930. The General Strike of 1926 left most miners families worse off. The men had to go back for less pay than they had had before. I well remember going to the soup kitchen at Heddon chapel, along with my sisters during the strike. We got a bowl full of corn beef hash twice a week. One day a girl behind me pushed me and broke my bowl, by the time the helpers found me a plate there was no hash left. I was so hungry I cried all the way home from school. We were also given six loaves of bread at the weekend to take home to our parents. What our parents lived on God only knows. They must have starved. Many of the men trapped the rabbits in the Common. One man had a double barrelled gun and his family never went short of meat but our father just would not go in for that sort of thing. So we just lived on bread and (pheasant) margarine and the few shillings we were allowed from the Guardians.

I remember going with my father to pick coals at Heddon pit heap. He took me because he said I could carry the most. He used to say I should have been a lad because while my sisters played with their Clouty Bettys (dolls) I played football and marbles and ran races with the best of the boys. He showed me how to use my fists as well so that when any of my younger sisters were in trouble with the other children at school they always ran to me for protection. I got many a good hiding on their behalf. I think my father was bitterly disappointed he never had a son that lived.

Our religion was not neglected. When we were children we went to the Methodist Chapel at Heddon twice every Sunday, afternoon for Sunday school and evening service, sometimes with our Mother. We had special clothes for Sunday and only wore them on that day. We always wore boots. Our Mother bought these boots on Scotswood Road at 5/11d. a pair. We didn't have shoes until we left school and went to work.

We had three special days during the year, Christmas Day, Anniversary Day and Trip Day.

Christmas filled me with happy feelings weeks beforehand, wondering what present I would get. We only got one gift each and an apple and orange. I could always play a mouth organ so my present was nearly always a new Band Master. Many a time I've played tunes for my sisters to dance to till my head was nearly bursting with blowing.

Taken from a handwritten letter that Beryl gave me last week with her memoires and a photo of her mother Elizabeth 'Betty' Cockburn.

'Mam was the 6th of nine children born to my grandparents George and Alice Ridley. she was born at Wylam. Unfortunately the first three were boys who all died in infancy, before the six girls were born. My mam was raised as a boy, doing all the hard jobs like fetching water from the well halfway down the field and cobbling shoes. They were extremely poor.

My grandfather was a very poorly paid miner and his pay had to feed 8 of them. My mam and her mother would walk to Throckley every Saturday then catch the tram to Scotswood Road to buy cheap meat and veg for the coming week. Mam was taken along because she was strong enough to carry the bags!!! a large pan of broth would be made over the open coal fire and added to every day so that it probably lasted for a few days. Mam said she was ALWAYS hungry. She always spoke of the time living at Hill Head with love and affection. Mam loved nature and being outdoors and would climb a tree in the wood and spent hours in the tree just watching the birds and squirrels and absorbing all the nature around her. She knew the names of all the trees just by looking at he leaves. Once one of the neighbours had a canary in a cage, which hung on a outside wall, and mam, hating to see anything caged, let the canary out to fly free. She was delighted and was never found out.

Because mam loved Hill Head so much we scattered her ashes in the wood beside Hill Head as she always talked about her childhood there as being happy, so my brother and I thought it fitting for her to there forever. My brother made a plaque which he fixed to one of the trees as a lasting reminder.

I cried the first time I read mams memoirs, and sometimes since even to think of the extremely hard and harsh upbringing mam had and yet she still turned out to be a beautiful person inside and out, with no malice, good advice, kindness and a willingness to listen to anyone who needed to be listened to or helped.

I learned SO much good stuff from my mam, about life and people for which I will always be grateful. She was a wonderful role model and I hope she passed some of that goodness and knowledge on to others

I would like to think that I have and that mam lives on'.

3 Little Words

What3words could literally be a life-saver. It could get you out of a jam and it could keep the kids happily occupied exploring the world with it. What is it? It's a geolocation app on your phone or tablet, or you can access it online on any device. It's used across the world by companies such as the AA, Network Rail, Openreach, Balfour Beatty, Domino Pizza, DPD, DHL and Evri, the Red Cross and Red Crescent in some countries, Land Rover, Jaguar and Mercedes Benz (in their GPS systems) - a list which just keeps on growing.

How does it work? Well, it's a simple and elegant solution to one man's frustration which could become the most used location system in the world. When Chris Sheldrick repeatedly found that drivers for his event organising business were wasting time trying to find the precise drop off point for their often extremely large deliveries, he thought there had to be a better way of giving directions. Later, chatting to a pal in the pub who was something of a maths buff, the challenge was set and before very long the simple solution was hit upon. The entire globe was to be divided into 3-metre squares and each square given a unique address made up of just 3 words randomly assigned by a computer.

So, for example, the entrance to the Knott Hall was assigned ///reviewed.shipped.responses, The 3 Tuns ///backed. perplexed.spending and The Swan ///secure.nutty.grape . We're told it's pure coincidence that the front door of 10 Downing Street has the address ///slurs.this.shark !!!

So what? Well, in Europe almost everywhere has an address, even if it's only a postcode. But there are innumerable places throughout the world where formal addresses don't exist at all and now, thanks to What3words, people living in those very diverse places can at last - and for the first time - order something online or otherwise and give a precise address for it's delivery.

Emergency and rescue services can identify very precise locations when attending disasters, no matter how remote the incident - anywhere in the world.

But in Britain? OK, we all have addresses and the need isn't as great, but in more remote areas finding a house or, say, a Youth Hostel, when all you have is a name and a postcode, being able to access a precise location is more than just handy. Or, perhaps, you're at a festival and want your mates to join you amid a mass of other people, or you want a way to remind you exactly where you park your car, or, heaven forbid, your car's broken down or a friend's had an accident in the middle of nowhere and you need to let someone know exactly where you are -What 3words is the ideal solution if you have your phone with you and can get a signal.

And keeping the kids happy? Well, they could each choose 3 words randomly and look to see whose 3-word address is the closest, or, furthest away, or nearest to, say, the Eiffel Tower (or anywhere they choose), or closest to, say, 1000 miles away. OR having chosen 3 words between them, they can each choose a different order for the words and then see whose is the nearest to home (or anywhere else!). They could search for the place with the most (or least!) appropriate 3-word address. And, being kids, it won't take them long to devise their own games and competitions while learning a lot about the world they live in.

... and all with just 3 little words!

HETT - Heddon Education & Training Trust

The Heddon on the Wall Education & Training Trust (HETT) was set up by St. Andrew's Church in Heddon more than twenty years ago for the benefit of the people of the parish. Each year the Trust awards grants for the education and training of people in the village. One of the main beneficiaries is St. Andrews C of E Primary School, which benefits from contributions from the Trust in a variety of different ways. Two examples include:

a) funding the cost of a Bible for every child in Year 3, which children are allowed to keep as their own once they leave the school;

b) purchases such as a garden shed for use by the school's Gardening Club, Read Write online literacy support resources, as well as musical equipment.

In addition, awards are also granted to former pupils of the school, as well as current residents. One example is Amy Anderson, a former pupil of the school who also grew up in the village. She successfully applied for a grant to cover the cost of the software, materials and trips that form a mandatory component of her degree course at university. This support enabled Amy to continue her education while defraying the cost of her course fees.
