I'm not sure what the grand total was, but I know that people donated well over £500 pounds in the last few weeks of the walk.

Festival of Fire

I've had an idea said Diane one Saturday morning at Stamfordham Village Hall, let's have a Festival of Fire to celebrate Pentecost!

Her enthusiasm soon spread to what became a planning group consisting of representatives from the Churches of Heddon-on-the-Wall and Mr Wheatley, Headteacher at Heddon-on-the-Wall St. Andrew's CE Primary School

Pentecost is a celebratory time of year in the life of the Christian Church. It is fifty days since the Resurrection on Easter Sunday and is often referred to as the Birthday of the Church. It is the momentous occasion when the Holy Spirit descended on the disciples of Jesus heralding reassurance to all Christians that though Jesus had died his spirit would live amongst us for ever.

The Festival of Fire depicted all these aspects of Pentecost.

The event began at school, where Mr Wheatley held an assembly and explained Pentecost to the children. They then dispersed to their classrooms to begin an afternoon on making Pentecost themed crafts.

Deacon Maggie was unable to attend due to ill health, so Revd. Rachel took up her position in the Storyteller's Chair, which had been beautifully decorated by Mrs Bilclough and the children of Year 4, to tell the story of Pentecost and to explain the amazing work done by the charity Christian Aid

St. Andrew's Singers delighted us with their singing ably led by Mrs Graham and Mrs Milner and Revd. Tom thanked everyone for their involvement.

When it was time to leave the hall and process to St. Andrew's Church, the children were given a flag to wave. The flags represented many different countries throughout the world and on arrival at Church, were placed around the foot of the wooden cross which was standing outside the church door.

Once inside church, the theme of a birthday party was evident. Cakes, candles (50 to be precise) and more joyful singing filled the Church with happiness and joy.

The event concluded with Revd. Rachel saying a few words and giving a special blessing to us all.

Everyone left the church clutching a piece of birthday cake.

A wonderful idea had turned into a truly happy occasion with many people involved. To begin to name everyone who helped this event reach fruition would be impossible, suffice to say:

This is just to remind Heddon residents that a box for donations to the Newcastle West End Foodbank is located outside the side door at the Methodist Church. The contents of the box are taken regularly to the Foodbank warehouse at Lemington.

The total number of foodbank parcels given out has risen by nearly 40% over the last year, so the need is increasing. And people cannot just turn up at the Foodbank to receive a parcel. They have to be referred, for example, by the City Council, Citizens Advice, DWP, Refugee Services or Housing Charities, who signpost those in need to the Foodbank's food and welfare support services.

So please donate, if you can. The most urgently needed items are:

- Tinned fruit
- · Soup tinned and packet
- Instant mash/tinned potatoes
- Custard
- Baby milk and formula
- Rice pudding
- Nappies (size 4 and larger)
- Cereal.
- Tea/coffee

But please also, no perishables and no clothing.

About Christian Aid



This week (14th – 20th May) is Christian Aid Week – a fundraising week which has taken

place each year since 1957. During Christian Aid Week Christians, churches, and supporters of Christian Aid work with their local community to raise awareness about the effects of extreme poverty and injustice, wherever it is found in the world, and to enjoy taking part in fundraising activities together. The money raised helps support community projects all over the world.

Christian Aid Week provides an opportunity to think about the world in which we live, to celebrate all the good things, but also to talk about some of the things that are unfair in the world. It's an opportunity to share ideas about how the world could become a fantastic place for everyone to live.

Christian Aid believes that it is unfair for so many people on the earth to live everyday with the challenges and consequences of extreme poverty. However, Christian Aid believes that, working together, it is possible to find ways to share the earth's resources more fairly and to find ways to live peacefully and in cooperation with one another


Christian Aid's ground-breaking work began in 1945 with a focus on helping and welcoming refugees following the second world war. For more than 75 years, Christian Aid has continued to work with local communities worldwide to help bring an end to poverty and injustice - to help create a world where everyone can flourish and to live safely. Today the work of Christian Aid continues and is underpinned by the values of dignity, equality, justice motivated by love for our neighbour.

This year during Christian Aid Week we have been invited to learn from families, communities and farmers living in Malawi – to develop our understanding of how climate change effects their lives and communities. With the help of Christian Aid and their partners, they have set up farming co-operatives and grow peas which are drought resistant, and from which they make flour for bread. This enables women (and men) to be more independent and to make a living to support sending their children to school.

The work of organisations such as Christian Aid and partners, have supported people like Esther Saizi in Malawi. Esther describes her small, but significant, agricultural work as 'a tree'. The pigeon peas she grows are the trunk, and the branches are the many ways in which she is supporting her children and grandchildren.

Esther has grown from a place of grief and loss, when her husband died, being able to move from exploitation to financial security. She has built up a herd of goats, started her own tailoring business, and supported her daughter Ziwone's dreams of being a carpenter by purchasing tools. Esther bakes and sells pigeon pea bread and feeds her beloved grandchildren Nespo and Emmanuel food that is delicious and nutritious – and she often has enough to share with the rest of her community. All branches of effort and hope that, from a tiny plant, have dramatically improved the lives of those around her


audience and his parting words were 'don't feel afraid to say NO.'



Grass and green spaces

After a successful ground's maintenance tender process – we're pleased to welcome Batson Groundcare as our supplier for the next 3 years. The robust process ensures that we're maintaining value for money. The Parish Council are responsible for the Memorial Garden, Taberna Close, Butterfly Garden. Other areas in the village are maintained by either Northumberland County Council or Karbon Homes. Similarly to us, environmental sustainability plays a huge role in any ground's maintenance contract, so many spaces won't be cut as regularly, or appear to be 'bowling green' standard. This overall provides great habitats for our small animals and helps to offset the carbon footprint of the growing number of vehicles on our roads.

Welfare field/MUGA/Playground

We've been working with some of the children at St Andrews with some ideas for our play area. We want to make sure that we have the views of people across the village, so here's an opportunity for you to input into our plans. Roads and pathways

We've been working with the highways department of Northumberland County Council with the feedback from our community about parking, roads, pathways and the speed of vehicles. We had a work-around the village with Peter Jackson our local councillor to look at the issues that had been raised and what improvements we could look to make. You may have already seen some improvements

• The bus stops on Hexham road, one has been reinstated and a new one has been installed to prevent people parking there and enabling the bus to stop safely to let passengers on and off.

Our Mission Statement:

- Flashing speed signs have been fixed so are now working throughout the village.
- School crossing signs have been put up on the roads leading to the school at Trajan Walk and at the edge of the Welfare field.
- Buffer zones (with red painted lines) have been introduced at the A69 entrance and Wylam entrance to the village.

Medium term;

- Chare Bank will be resurfaced and the entrance to the memorial park levelled to prevent flooding and silt.
- We'll also install the Hadrian Mosaic which is our legacy from the birthday celebrations last year.

Longer term plans include;

- A school safety zone at the rear entrance of the school and welfare field.
- Speed reduction within the village
- Parking options for consultation near the school

Dennis & June Neale

The funeral of Dennis and June Neale took place on 9th May at St Andrew's Church.

They were born within a 3 months of each other in 1931, and married in September 1980, moving to the village in the August 1981.

Prior to their marriage they both served their country with Dennis undertaking his National Service in the Royal Army

Medical Corp. He was an active member of the National Service Veterans Alliance and Royal Army Medical Corp Association. Upon leaving the Army he qualified as an Estate Agent and worked for the National Grid as a Land Agent until his retirement.

June, at the age of 16 met and chatted to a Police Woman and from that meeting decided she wished to be a police woman too, but upon learning that she needed to be 22 to join the Metropolitan Police, joined the Royal Airforce serving for 4 years as a Radar Operator and rising to the rank of Corporal. She then went on to serve in the Metropolitan Police for 25 years and was awarded the long service and good conduct medal.

Upon their arrival in the village they immersed themselves in village life. Dennis served on the Parish Council, he and June were both very active in the Neighbourhood watch scheme that operated in the village. They were both very keen gardeners. In 1994 they won Best Kept Front Garden award from the Heddon in Bloom committee. June also served as a member of the Heddon in Bloom committee in 1998 and along with her fellow committee members received the Queen Mother's Birthday Award for Environmental Improvement. June also served on the Knott

Memorial Hall Management Committee. She was also was a very keen supporter of creating sporting facilities in the village.

Sadly, June's health and mobility deteriorated, and she was unable to get out and about as much, although every Saturday morning Dennis would be backing out their car from the garage and they would both go off to Hexham for the day. You could set your watch by it they were 8am on the dot off to Hexham.

Dennis unfortunately had to give up his car but when June was transferred to Hexham Hospital last August Dennis would take the bus journey every day without fail to visit June, often standing for ages at the village bus stop, although a lot of villagers would see him and take him to Hexham, whether they were going there or not. He was clearly devoted to June and sadly when Dennis suffered a series of falls and was admitted to the same ward as June he was in very good spirits as he was able to just wander down the ward to see her and take meals together. Maureen from Posh Paws kindly fulfilled her promise to June and has adopted their dog Pippa and even managed to take her to visit Dennis and June in hospital. Sadly their health rapidly deteriorated and they passed away within a few weeks of each other.

We all miss seeing Pippa and Dennis on their daily walks around the village, Dennis was always such a gentleman, doffing his cap to any ladies he would meet. June's family spent a few days in the village leading up to the funeral and were deeply touched by all the lovely comments made to them about Dennis and June.

Nature Notes - Sounds of Summer - Warblers

I've written about migratory birds as a sign of changing seasons in this column before, but this time I want to focus on some of the warblers that arrive in the UK in spring and change the whole summer soundscape of our countryside. The warblers are a large group of birds so I won't try to cover them all in one go. Most feed on insects, often plucking them from leaves. Many are quite elusive and hard to tell apart visually, but they often have rich, complex and melodious songs distinctive to each species which can be the best way to locate and identify them.

The chiffchaff is one of our more common warblers and also one of the first migrants to return after winter. It has a simple and easily-identified two-note call which sounds like its name. For me that call is a real herald of spring. I usually hear them first in March or April, and then seem to hear them everywhere I go throughout the summer until about September. They are small olive-brown warblers which actively flit through trees and shrubs, picking insects from foliage but also snapping them out of the air in flight. They often sit on a prominent branch to sing, which usually gives the best chance to see them. They are numerous in the woods of Heddon Common and all around our area. This is one species that is currently doing well and expanding its range further north into Scotland.

A very similar-looking bird is the willow-warbler. Again they return to the UK in spring, usually slightly after the chiffchaffs. They have

a grey-green back and pale underparts with a yellow-tinged chest and throat. Their legs are pale and pinkish whereas the chiffchaff's legs are dark grey, and willow warblers tend to have a longer stripe above the eye, but their song is the clearest way to tell them apart. The willow warbler's beautiful song is a series of melodious descending notes. I've heard them in Heddon Common, by Throckley ponds and along the River Tyne. It's another widespread species but is declining across England and Wales and increasing in Scotland and Northern Ireland, so it currently has amber conservation status.

The final species I want to introduce is the grasshopper warbler. This is a much less common bird which suffered steep population declines between the 1960s and 1980s and is now a UK red-listed species of conservation concern. I was therefore excited to hear one in early May at the top end of Station road just as the fields begin, and to hear and eventually see one singing in a dense hedge just beyond the end of Throckley ponds. They have a very unusual call; a high-pitched, continuous gentle whirring which sounds similar to a cricket or grasshopper, hence the bird's name. This is quite a challenging one to hear and even harder to see as they are small brown birds which tend to stay hidden in thick scrub or foliage and creep around in a mouse-like way. The best time to hear these birds is early morning or dusk.

RSPB and BTO both have useful websites where you can find out more about all the warbler species and listen to recordings of their songs. I recommend getting familiar with some then listening for them when out and about. Learning bird songs gives you a much better chance of seeing the more elusive species and identifying them with confidence, plus it's rewarding just to tune in to these lovely little songsters and become more aware of them. Happy warbling!





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THE PROBABLE LOCATION OF MILECASTLE 12

The following is taken from the discussion section of the article below (published in 2021) following the finding of remains of Hadrian's Wall, but not the Milecastle, during the building of houses at Tulip Mews (previously part of Town Farm & later Tulip's Haulage Yard). Comments in square brackets have been added by me.

An archaeological watching brief at Heddon-onthe-Wall and the probable location of Milecastle 12 by Matthew S. Hobson. Archaeologia Aeliana, 5th series, vol. 50 (2021), pp. 115–132.




Fig. 2 Plan showing the archaeological features revealed during the evaluation trenches and watching brief.

The measured location of Milecastle 12 falls within the development area [the new houses of Tulip Mews], more or less precisely at the north-west corner of the former farm buildings. The identification of preserved remains of Hadrian's Wall at this location, in an area which had previously been assumed to have suffered complete truncation, warrants a reassessment of the probable location of this milecastle. The 2019 investigations have confirmed that the line of the Broad Wall was positioned rather too far south to have been disturbed by the widening of the old Carlisle to Newcastle road in 1926. If the pivot stone discovered during the 1926 roadworks [exact location of which was not recorded] was indeed part of the in situ northern gate of Milecastle 12, the clear implication is that its location is likely to have been farther west, close to where the projected line of the curtain wall meets the remains of the old road. In our estimation the discovery of the pivot stone in 1926 is most likely to have been some 90m farther to the west [closer to the garage] than the measured location of the milecastle, as indicated on fig. 2.

Supporting the idea that the discovery in 1926 was made farther to the west, is the fact that in 1856 the development area and the neighbouring plot of land to the west were both in possession of Messrs. Ord, Collingwood and Dutton. Stobbs (2020) has correctly observed that if these two plots of land could both be referred to as Town Farm, it would make sense of the fact that the pivot stone was described as having been found 'close to the western end of an outbuilding of Town Farm'.

The distance between milecastles varied depending upon the terrain and the need to communicate with forts on the Stanegate [a discrepancy of 90m from the measured distance between adjacent milecastles is not unknown].

It is still possible that the pivot stone was found during work linking up the east-west road [between Tulip Mews and Tank House] with the north-south lane which separates these two plots of land. If any remains of the milecastle lay within the western half of the development area they are very likely to have been destroyed. The remaining uncertainty means that in future the location of the milecastle should be sought somewhere between the western boundary of the current development site and the Shell garage to the west that faces onto Hexham Road. Use of Ground Penetrating Radar could perhaps be used successfully to solve this long-standing question.

Black Rood talk in



On her marriage to King Malcolm III, the Black Rood passed into the Scottish royal family, and so became a symbol of the authority and legitimacy of Scotland's kingship.


Giving its name to the abbey and then the palace and now the parliament of Holyrood, the Black Rood was to help define Scotland as a kingdom which was at least the equal of England in the eyes of God, and in some ways superior to it


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DMURUM Singers

HETT - Heddon Education & Training Trust

The Heddon on the Wall Education & Training Trust (HETT) was set up by St. Andrew's Church in Heddon more than twenty years ago for the benefit of the people of the parish. Each year the Trust awards grants for the education and training of people in the village. One of the main beneficiaries is St. Andrews C of E Primary School, which benefits from contributions from the Trust in a variety of different ways. Two examples include:

- a) funding the cost of a Bible for every child in Year 3, which children are allowed to keep as their own once they leave the school;
- b) purchases such as a garden shed for use by the school's Gardening Club, Read Write online literacy support resources, as well as musical equipment.

In addition, awards are also granted to former pupils of the school, as well as current residents. One example is Amy Anderson, a former pupil of the school who also grew up in the village. She successfully applied for a grant to cover the cost of the software, materials and trips that form a mandatory component of her degree course at university. This support enabled Amy to continue her education while defraying the cost of her course fees.
