
Heddon *Fluito*



- Tea/coffee



Chare Bank

The Parish Council are working collaboratively with Northumberland County Council, Historic England, St Andrew's Church and preferred contractors in firming up arrangements for getting the wall along Chare Bank repaired before the resurfacing can take place. As Chare Bank sits along the Vallum, it requires additional approvals including what's termed as 'scheduled monument consent'. This can slow down our progress as there are additional requirements

needed for us to undertake this work. Please bear with us as we work through this approach to complete the repairs on Chare Bank.

Roads and Pathways

September

We continue to work closely with the highways department of Northumberland County Council to make the village safe for all. You will have seen a number of improvements already carried out and we continue to push for more. Our next priorities are to address the following:

(1) Speeding in the village - this is an ongoing concern in the village and was raised by residents at our recent Annual Elector meeting. We are seeing an increased level of vehicles passing through the village which is a serious safety concern.

(2) School Parking and drop-off - this is an ongoing concern exacerbated by the growth in the size of the school from a first school to a primary.(3) Resurfacing of footpath running along the B6528 (Hexham Road) on

the north side from the junction of Close House through Houghton to Heddon and then from the junction of Towne Gate.

Annual Elector Meeting 14th June

A letter from the Chair : Di Keller

I, alongside the Parish Council (PC) was overwhelmed by the number of residents from across the Parish who joined us. I promise to organise a bigger venue for next year!

During the open forum, residents asked us about;

• Memorial Park maintenance – this will be managed through the new contract.

 Speeding and traffic calming within the village – this has been added to our local transport plan alongside some action already taken in collaboration with Northumberland County Council

 Concerns regarding the seating area on Station Road – we have installed a bin by the seat and will engage with the local community police regarding any anti-social behaviour.

• The allotments (specifically around the rate increases) – we have a long waiting list for the allotments and want to ensure they are being utilised. We would welcome working with allotment holders to understand their requirements to help inform any decisions we make.

• Planning application for the 'Pitch on the Wall site linked to the proposed Summer Madness Festival – we shared details on the Facebook page and put forward our comments to the planning request. We'll share the details of all future planning requests on the Facebook page to improve awareness.

I'm very proud to have been voted in as Chair of the PC and to be able to share the great work that has been done. Much of the progress is made possible by the great volunteers that work with us on our projects and keeping our village a great place to live and I want to share a heartfelt thanks to everyone involved in that support.

Closure of the Lower Churchyard?

The Parish Council have been supporting St Andrew's Church over the last few months with regard to the imminent closure of lower churchyard. We wrote to all residents within the Parish stating there was limited space in the churchyard for burials and we welcomed comments, suggestions and invited people to an open forum.

The Church have now reached the stage where they will need to set in process the formalities to apply for closure of the lower churchyard with the exception of any faculties that have already been secured which will be honoured.

To provide an overview of actions we've taken and suggestions that were made;

- Land owned by the Diocese that oversees St Andrew's Church falls along the Vallum and therefore is limited due to historical covenants, or the bedrock structure that prevents depth of digging.
- Grave re-use the lower churchyard isn't old enough to permit grave re-use and as the upper churchyard is already closed, no further activity can take place other than interment of ashes within the churchyard.
- Cramming involves looking for additional space in the churchyard, has been maximised and further expansion limited due to the bedrock structure in the churchyard.
- Land owned by the Parish Council there weren't any areas large enough to facilitate the requirements of a cemetery.
- Available land within the Parish at the current time neither the Church or the Parish Council have been able to secure any suitable areas.

The options going forward or if a community cemetery can't be established are;

- Choice of burial at a cemetery in a different location. Additional costs may be incurred dependant on location.
- Interment of ashes within St Andrew's Churchyard will continue
- The Book of Remembrance at St Andrew's Church will be open to all residents of the parish.
- If you already have a grave that was previously prepared to double depth, it will continue to be possible to bury in the available space.
- The annual 'All Souls' service which this year will be held on the 4th November at 4pm in St Andrews Church. This is an annual opportunity to gather as a community to remember our loved ones we see no longer.

If either party were able to secure any land, this would need to operate as a community cemetery, which would require funding and volunteers to formally set up, run and maintain the cemetery. Without all three of these elements, a community cemetery wouldn't be a viable option for the Parish, and we would revert to the options mentioned above.

We've already asked for comments and held an open forum, but there was little interest or comment from those living within the Parish. However we recognise this could be a sensitive issue for some and therefore wanted to provide a final opportunity for people to provide their comments and feedback but most importantly to commit to getting involved if we're to take this forward.

We'll be hosting a final meeting at 6.30pm on 18th October in St Andrews Church for any members of the Parish to meet with us to discuss this further.



HETT - Heddon Education & Training Trust

The Heddon on the Wall Education & Training Trust (HETT) was set up by St. Andrew's Church in Heddon more than twenty years ago for the benefit of the people of the parish. Each year the Trust awards grants for the education and training of people in the village. One of the main beneficiaries is St. Andrews C of E Primary School, which benefits from contributions from the Trust in a variety of different ways. Two examples include:

a) funding the cost of a Bible for every child in Year 3, which children are allowed to keep as their own once they leave the school;

b) purchases such as a garden shed for use by the school's Gardening Club, Read Write online literacy support resources, as well as musical equipment.

In addition, awards are also granted to former pupils of the school, as well as current residents. One example is Amy Anderson, a former pupil of the school who also grew up in the village. She successfully applied for a grant to cover the cost of the software, materials and trips that form a mandatory component of her degree course at university. This support enabled Amy to continue her education while defraying the cost of her course fees.

Anyone can submit a request to the Trust, as long as the request is directly related to current or imminent education and training needs, and as long as you meet one of the following criteria:

- a) you are a current pupil at St. Andrews C of E Primary School;
- b) you are a former pupil of St. Andrews C of E Primary School;
- c) you are a current resident of Heddon.

Nature Notes - A Bug's Life in the

Butterfly Garden

Over the summer I spent some time exploring the Millenium or 'Butterfly' Garden on Heddon Common and it's an area well worth a closer look. It certainly lives up to its name, especially when the buddleia is in flower, and a wide range of butterflies can often be seen on a sunny day. While butterflies and bees are some of the most noticeable and familiar insects to be found here, they are not the only ones to benefit from the range of wildflowers and habitats. Here are a few of the colourful and charismatic insects I've found here, though black-and-white photos don't really do them justice.

The hairy shieldbug or sloe bug is one of several shieldbug species found in the UK. Shieldbugs tend to be quite large and colourful and are also known as stink bugs because of their ability to release a smelly fluid as a defense against predators. The hairy shieldbug is just over 1cm long and purplish-brown with a green triangle in the centre of its back known as the 'scutellum'. It has a black-and-white striped border at the rear of the body and black-and-white antennae. As the name suggests, a close inspection will reveal it is covered in little bristly hairs. It lives in a variety of habitats such as parks, gardens, hedgerows and woodland edges, and is common and widespread throughout the UK, though scarcer in northern than southern England. It also lives up to its alternative name of sloe bug because it is often found around blackthorn where it feeds on the fruits called sloes, but it can eat a variety of leaves, seeds and fruits of other plants too. Hairy shieldbugs shelter through the winter as adults and emerge in spring to mate. The females lay barrel-shaped eggs on plants which hatch into young known as nymphs. The nymphs go through several growth stages, finally developing into adults in late summer or early autumn.

Another common but attractive insect I found frequently basking on foliage in the sun, is the red-and-black froghopper. This is also about 1cm long, but longer and thinner in shape than the shieldbug. It's another common species found in a variety of wooded and open habitats, which feeds by sucking juices out of grasses and other plants. It also lives up to its name with striking black-and-red markings and an incredible ability to leap large distances through the air. The powerful back legs can fully extend in under a millisecond! The young nymphs of this species are rarely seen as they feed on roots underground, but adults can be seen from April to August.

The final species I want to introduce is the cinnamon bug. This bug is just under 1cm in length and the origins of its name are less clear, but is orangey-red in colour with striking black markings. It feeds on a variety of plants. It used to be quite scarce, found locally in sandy habitats around the coast and only in southern England, but in recent years it has rapidly extended its range and is now found in a variety of inland habitats and much further north. Perhaps this is one species that is benefitting from climate change? It overwinters as an adult and the new generation emerges August to September so this is when it is most numerous and most likely to be seen.

I think these species show that the miniature world of insects can be fascinating and beautiful. The best days to look for insects are warm, sunny and fairly still, as this is when they are likely to be most active. If we get some late summer/early autumn sunshine, why not visit the Butterfly Garden and see what you can find.

A potted history of **AMOS BROS**

From Heddon Histories

The Roman Wall Forge was founded by Harry Amos in 1886 and run by four generations of xthe family for over a century, exemplifying traditional skills. At one point employing 24 people in two locations producing high profile jobs throughout the region.

The first smithy was a single-storey building next door to the Swan Inn on Towne Gate until the business moved to new premises at the top of Chare Bank. The floor of the forge was originally the sandstone rock. Outside, set in the ground, is a large circular metal plate used by the blacksmiths to fit the metal outer hoops to the wheels of horse-drawn coaches and carts. The forge became incorporated into the restaurant of the Swan, with period features including farm implements and a large log-burning fireplace.

It wasn't just farmers who provided substantial work for the business including The Duchess of Northumberland, who came knocking when the gates at the Alnwick Garden needed fixing after someone drove a car into them. Ridley later wrote to her to see if any further work was required and knowing the standard of the Amos brothers' work, she asked them to design and produce the gates to the Poison Garden.

While the 1970s brought their rewards, however, the 1980s were the golden age for the business. It was then that the brothers were involved in everything from the construction of the Metro-Centre in Gateshead to the Kielder Reservoir and the Tyneside Metro system.

Sadly the brothers Charlton and Ridley Amos had no choice but to call it a day in 2011 because of falling business.



Now after 12 years Michael he has decide he is ready to revive the firm under the name of **'Rusty Restorations'** in memory of his dad and uncle. Charlton sadly passed away in 2019 age 73, and Ridley died in 2021, age 73.

Back then Amos Bros were a very well-known business in the north east making the poison garden gates for the Duchess of Northumberland at Alnwick Garden as well as all the railings around the Town Moor.

Michael said he will start off as a mobile business and will be based between his home in Throckley and Alston in Cumbria, where he has a caravan.

Michael plans to offer traditional blacksmith services as well as upcycling and restoration. He said he decided to offer an upcycling service after carrying out a project for a friend and receiving a positive response.

Heddon Residents Association

The Heddon Residents' Association have been trying to establish a Speedwatch campaign in the village for some time now led by Secretary Hedley Rogers. News was received just after the previous deadline for the Heddon Gossip that Northumbria Police were finally in a position to offer some training to volunteers from the village. There are various reasons, but basically resources and the pandemic, why it has taken years to get to this point. It boiled down to repeating some on-line form-filling by a recent deadline but then waiting for an individual private phone-call from the Police before submitting certain identity documents, which is the stage a number of local people are at. Once these checks have been completed, local residents will be offered the opportunity to collect a speedgun ready for training in small groups somewhere in the County, most likely not too far away. There was a similar volunteer group quite a few years ago now. Volunteers do not have full Police status of course and any speeding drivers receive notification of this only, not fines. It is hoped however that by drawing attention to speeding, the environment can be made more pleasant and of course more safe. The problem affects horses and their riders as well as walkers, cyclists, parents with children and the elderly crossing roads. How much activity will take place in Heddon is not known at present but updates will follow here.

As summer approaches, activities at the Hall wind down, with the need for child care many clubs and classes cannot sustain their activities with the small classes and close for the summer period.



Twiddle mitt instructions

Twiddle mitts or hand warmers, with beads, buttons and objects sewn onto them are popular gifts for those living with Dementia, as having something to 'twiddle' helps to calm agitation and restlessness - both common symptoms of the condition.

Materials: Any left-over and odd balls of wool & 8mm circular or 6.5mm

straight knitting needles.

Instructions

Cuff: Cast on 45 stitches using two strands of double Knitting wool or one strand of chunky wool. Work in stocking stitch (1 row knit, 1 row purl) for 11 inches.

MItt Body: Continue with stocking stitch or variety of fancy stitches but use up oddments of various textures of wool such as chunky, mohair, ribbon etc. until the work measures 23 inches. Cast off.

Finishing: If working with straight needles, lightly iron the long strip, then neatly sew the long edges together with purl side facing you. Turn inside out, push the cuff (lining) up inside the mitt body and neatly sew the cast on and cast-off edges together.

Decoration

Now is the time to decorate the mitt, inside and out, with ribbons, beads, flowers, zips, loops, pompoms, buttons, etc. You could even knit a separate pocket for a favourite photo or memento. Be creative, but make sure each item is securely attached.



Aircraft Noise Action Group (ANAG) – UPDATE

With the advent of warmer weather along with the uptick in holiday flights, aircraft noise is as bad as it ever has been. Why is this?

In the warm weather holiday season, aircraft depart in dense batches during the day starting from 0600 each day. During this season, aircraft are far more likely to be fully loaded, jet engines are less efficient at low altitude in warm weather, aircraft wings provide less lift when the air is warm and less dense. All this means that aircraft tend to fly lower than at colder times of year with throttles wide open in order to gain height as quickly as possible. As a result the noise impact is far worse.

Aircraft Noise Action Group is pressing the Airport to change its Noise Action Plan to take this on board and change how it manages flights at this time of year.

Noise complaints – the Airport is dismissing your concerns. The experience of aircraft noise campaigns is that most people complain about aircraft noise only once or a few times and then stop or come back some time later while a small number of others keep complaining all the time. There's nothing at all wrong with that, it's perfectly possible that the one-time complainant is as badly affected by aircraft noise on an ongoing basis as the multiple long term complainant. However, because most people complain once or twice, the Airport is claiming that the whole noise thing is down to a small handful of disgruntled people. Show the Airport that this isn't true by complaining more often when you are affected by aircraft noise.
