Letter from Lynda

It's easy sitting on the sideline watching but it's another thing when you are involved.

I'm preparing this just hours after the completion of the Women's Football World Cup when the nation had such high hopes that England would be bringing the cup home with them. I see that the recriminations have already started about the team chosen and the way the team played in the final especially the chances that they missed and the mistakes that they made.

Just days ago some students got their 'A' Level, B Tec or T Tec results. Those who were hoping to go to university to study in September were depending on their results. These students didn't sit their GCSE's because of Covid so this is the first real taste of exams. Many of them may well have got the grades they needed for their course but there will be some that haven't and need to consider their next step – a different course, defer and resit next year, or do something completely different. We are already being told to prepare that the results will not be as high over the next few years.

Today there is so much pressure to be better than anyone else. At all levels of sport there is pressure to win regardless whether it is a local team/school team. The expectations of the fans is for every match to be won. With exam results regardless of whether there is an expectation for an individual to do better than a peer there is pressure on the school for their students to get more A^*s . As etcetera than the previous year students &/or other schools. With all this pressure to succeed is it any wonder that those who don't feel as though they have failed. For them as an individual they may well have surpassed their expectations but that means little to them compared with others.

God wants everyone to be the best that they can be. He has given us all different gifts & skills with no gift or skill better than any other. The women may not have won the cup but they are the first team in almost 60 years to appear in a Football World Cup final of either male or female team. They will be disappointed to come home as runners up rather than winners. The students may not have achieved the grades that they hoped (or others hoped) they would but what appears as failure doesn't have to be the end – it can be the start of something new.

Many thought that when Jesus was crucified that was the end. His followers thought that their hopes and dreams were also over but 3 days later they discovered that it was actually the start of something new, something better. We may be disappointed in the football result, we may be disappointed that a family member hasn't achieved what they wanted to achieve but we need to help them celebrate what they have achieved. Whilst they (and us) may not recognise it at the moment the outcome is not the end. God has a better plan for them and us if we put our trust in Him.





They are digging the hole... well nearly

The restrictions have been placed on Chare Bank in anticipation of work commencing, a slight delay due to cemetery wall subsidence and

Parish Council wall repairs, however this is currently underway and the work on the surface of Chare Bank and installing the mosaic is imminent.

As mentioned in previous updates, to enhance the project and ensure a local element, it has been decided to provide an opportunity for the purchase of engraved paving blocks, which will be installed running parallel to the boundary wall alongside the mosaic.

It is anticipated the installation of the mosaic will generate a significant amount of media interest and demand from various sources for blocks.

St Andrew's Church — The Future and How You Can Help



Aren't we lucky to have had a beautiful, warm, welcoming, well maintained Grade 1 Listed Church here at Heddon on the Wall for over 1,500 years

At least once every week there is a public service and we are fortunate in that we have two priests available for our children's baptisms, family weddings and loved ones funerals.

However, not many people realise that the church can only remain open and functioning if we are prepared to help fund it. Contrary to belief, the church is not funded by the Government. The Church Commissioners are not hoarding their money but making it available to the National Church who use it for the benefit of all our parishes and activities.

The sad reality is that if the voluntary funding becomes insufficient the church will have no option but to close its doors and simply become a tourist attraction.

I would like to simplify the basic facts of church finance in this article:

Currently St. Andrew's Church costs £37k per year to run. This includes utilities, consumables, clergy expenses and insurance. A major part of our cost is a sum of money we are asked to pay called 'Parish Share' this is an annual sum of money paid to the Diocese who appoint the clergy and employ a few administrators. Like any employer it must pay the salaries, National Insurance, pension contribution as well as providing housing for the clergy. We try to give as much as we can in Parish Share but we know we won't be asked for something we can't afford.

Where does this funding come from?

I am sure this fact will surprise you but the majority of funding comes from generous donors: the church members and members of the community and the public who choose to financially support their local church, for a variety of reasons.

We receive a small amount of income from special services – weddings and funerals

The government fund the Gift Aid scheme and we are able to reclaim VAT on certain expenses because the building is 'listed'.

The National Church provides the funding of our two Bishops, Cathedral Clergy, it pays all clergy pensions and contributes towards church finances but the Parish Share is the main source of income for our Diocese from the generous donations of local people.

So to the nitty gritty. The population of the parish of Heddon on the Wall has in excess 1,600 people, the number of donors who regularly contribute to the running of St. Andrew's Church is 41!

If you would like to ensure the church will be there for you when you need it, would you like to consider some form of giving? Either a regular amount or perhaps a one off donation?

No matter how small a contribution, it will be gratefully received and will help to ensure there is a fully functioning church in Heddon on the Wall for future generations.

HETT - Heddon Education & Training Trust

The Heddon on the Wall Education & Training Trust (HETT) was set up by St. Andrew's Church in Heddon more than twenty years ago for the benefit of the people of the parish. Each year the Trust awards grants for the education and training of people in the village. One of the main beneficiaries is St. Andrews C of E Primary School, which benefits from contributions from the Trust in a variety of different ways. Two examples include:

a) funding the cost of a Bible for every child in Year 3, which children are allowed to keep as their own once they leave the school;

b) purchases such as a garden shed for use by the school's Gardening Club, Read Write online literacy support resources, as well as musical equipment.

In addition, awards are also granted to former pupils of the school, as well as current residents. One example is Amy Anderson, a former pupil of the school who also grew up in the village. She successfully applied for a grant to cover the cost of the software, materials and trips that form a mandatory component of her degree course at university. This support enabled Amy to continue her education while defraying the cost of her course fees.

Anyone can submit a request to the Trust, as long as the request is directly related to current or imminent education and training needs, and as long as you meet one of the following criteria:

- a) you are a current pupil at St. Andrews C of E Primary School;

Nature Notes - Forays for fungi

Most of these articles have focused on the animal kingdom and occasionally plants, but this time I'm taking a closer look at a fascinating group of organisms which are neither plant nor animal. Fungi are in a kingdom of their own, inhabiting a wide range of environments and taking very diverse forms. They do not have chlorophyll like plants so they can't make their own food. Instead they release enzymes to break down organic matter which they can then absorb. They reproduce by producing spores, often in great numbers. The fungi we are familiar with such as mushrooms, toadstools and bracket-fungi are actually the fruiting bodies of the organism designed to disperse the spores and are really just the tip of the iceberg. The majority of the organism consists of a network of thread-like hyphae which are collectively called the mycelium and are hidden from sight within the soil, rotting wood or other organic material they are feeding on, busily absorbing nutrients.

We now know that over 95% of plants live in symbiosis with fungi, a natural example of the phrase 'you scratch my back I'll scratch yours'! The fungi act as extensions of the fine rootlets of trees and other plants, and both species benefit from an exchange of nutrients. The role of fungi as natural recyclers of dead plant and animal material is critical to the survival of all other forms of life on Earth. Not all fungi are beneficial, some are parasites and crop pests, but others are used in food and medicine such as the yeasts that are involved in the production of bread, wine and beer, and antibiotics which mostly come from fungi.

Fungi can be found all through the year but tend to be associated with autumn and this is the best time of year to find the fruiting bodies of many

species. A good variety can be found in and around Heddon-on-the-Wall and they can be quite colourful and attractive. Here are just a few examples:

Fly Agaric – this is the typical 'fairy toadstool' that features in many children's books and illustrations. With its striking red cap and white spots it is probably the best-known toadstool of them all and is usually found in woodland, often associated with birch trees. It is present in Heddon Common and Slacks Plantation woods.

Meadow Waxcap – there are several species of waxcap in the UK, mostly found in grasslands and often very colourful. The meadow waxcap is orangey-brown in colour and has quite widely-spaced gills under the cap which hold the spores. Waxcaps can be a good indicator

of grasslands that have not been cultivated or disturbed for a long time so are valuable for other species too. This one was found near Rudchester.

Yellow Stagshorn is a very different type of fungus – not a mushroom or toadstool but a coral-like structure with orangey-yellow branches found growing on deadwood of conifers, often in mossy habitats. This is another species that can be found in the woodland of Heddon Common and Slacks Plantation and for me it really lights up an otherwise dull woodland floor.

When the flowers of summer are gone, fungi can bring colour, beauty and interest to our woods and grasslands throughout the autumn and winter. I hope this has inspired you to see what you can find. If you want to find out more, try these websites: https://www.first-nature.com/fungi/



NOISE: This year has been really noisy. Complaints shows that aircraft noise is a health issue with "woke me up", "made me anxious" and "made me angry" appearing a lot. You can get a copy of our report on this at: https://www.aircraftnoiseaction.com/downloads - it's first in the list.

AVIATION'S FUTURE: The aviation industry being aggressive about expansion right now. A number of airports across the UK are seeking to but not Newcastle (yet!). We think this is plain wrong. It's dangerous for climate change, it increases atmospheric pollution and the noise will get a lot worse.

Aviation would like us to think that it can fly ever more planes with no effect on us. So, it uses Greenwashing to try to persuade us that this can be done ...

GREENWASHING - ELECTRIC FLIGHT: The industry is promoting electric flight as a long-term alternative to fossil fuels (which it continues to use). Electric flight is too far off to make any difference to climate change and, because of the weight of the batteries, it's never going work. Why? Well, the Chief Technology Officer of Airbus has said: "even assuming huge advances in battery technology, with batteries that are 30 times more efficient and 'energy-dense' than they are today, it would only be possible to fly an A320 airliner for a fifth of its range with just half of its payload".

GREENWASHING - SUSTAINABLE AVIATION FUELS (SAF): Aircraft need fuel that has a lot of energy in it for every kilogram of weight. Fossil fuel comes from vast amounts of living matter concentrated underground over many millions of years. It's proposed that SAF can be made from crops grown for the purpose. To produce fuel as energy dense as fossil fuels this way would need enormous amounts of agricultural land at the expense of growing the food the planet's population needs.

WE THINK that aviation needs to start shrinking as soon as possible. Aircraft Noise Action Group supports **Stay Grounded**, an international campaign aimed at getting aviation to do just this.
