Church boundary wall collapse

There are a few cones and tape put up around it, by the council, but the wall either side is unstable and there could be further collapse. The churchyard is still open but please use, ideally, the south or west gates. If you must use the east gate please use the footpath to the south of the library.

Please can I also ask that if you go to see the damage that you don't go up to where the tape is and that you stay at the car park level. It is NOT a safe area!

If you have any youngsters in your family please ask them to stay at car park level or stay away entirely. There has just been a couple of lads climbing the hill to have a closer look...it is not safe to do this! When they were asked to go back down the hill they were polite and did so immediately.

We will keep you up to date with when the council will be doing repairs.

Newcastle Foodbank **Collection Point in Heddon**

A box for donations to the Newcastle Foodbank is located outside the side door of the Methodist Chapel. The contents of the box are taken regularly to the Foodbank warehouse at Lemington. They are gratefully received.

The Foodbank recently reported its busiest year on record, with over 25,000 food parcels distributed between March 2023 and April 2024. In total, 337 tonnes of food were used to fill parcels. The cost-of-living crisis is hitting families hard and people are indicating that Universal Credit and other benefits are not enough to live on. With the support of donors and volunteers, the Foodbank will continue to help local people through these increasingly difficult times.

Bishop of Newcastle Appointed Foodbank Patron

In April, The Right Reverend Dr Helen-Ann Hartley joined the Foodbank as a Patron. The Bishop's role will be to advocate for issues of social justice that underpin the vision to tackle food insecurity. Bishop Helen-Ann stated "I hope that in my role as a patron I will be able to use this platform as Bishop of Newcastle and as a Lord *Spiritual to highlight the many systemic issues of injustice that make* the foodbank a necessity of daily life for so many people."

Anti-social behaviour in the village

We've had a number of incidents over the past few weeks of anti-social behaviour. As a Parish Council, we've been working with our local police liaison officer who has agreed to increase the patrols in the village to try and deter or catch the perpetrators of these incidents. They are aware of similar incidents happening outside of our village.

Please can we be vigilant and if we have any evidence report it to Northumbria Police either by calling 101 or using their online reporting form. If you are under threat or in immediate danger, please call 999.

It's important as we're into the summer school holiday period that we don't make assumptions about who the perpetrators are and spoil the enjoyment of the children in our village.


Similarly, if you have children, you may want to discuss the incidents with them, ask them to let you know if they see anyone different but also remind them of the impact that anti-social behaviour can have on people especially those who are in more vulnerable situations.

I think overall it's important to remember that these spates of incidents are few and far between and overall that we live in a very safe environment. We're hoping that our engagement with Northumbria Police will help to bring these incidents to a close soon.

Allotments

We're aware that we have a number of people who are on the waiting list for the allotments that are sited near Halls of Heddon. Over the early summer a number have become vacant, and we've reallocated those to the next on-line on the waiting list and also taken the opportunity to reduce the sizes so that all of our allotments will eventually be the smaller plots.

We recognise that it would be good to have more plots available and we're speaking with Northumberland County Council as to whether there would be any further opportunity for sites in the village. However in the meantime, we'd like to run a volunteer project at the Butterfly Garden and would love to hear from anyone interested in helping us make this a community allotment space next to the Roman herb gardens.

Aircraft Noise Action Group (ANAG) - UPDATE June/July 2024

AIRCRAFT NOISE ACTION GROUP: update for August/September 2024

Noise: It's bad right now – the main holiday season -so, as always, keep complaining whenever the noise affects you (https://www.aircraftnoiseaction.com/complaints-form-2.

Climate change? Fly less, not more. Best of all, don't fly at all: see Flight Free UK

(https://flightfree.co.uk)

Electric flight. Kerosene is the main jet fuel but it's dirty in terms of climate change. It's very energy dense which is important for use as aircraft fuel and its weight reduces during every flight as the fuel is used. Not so with batteries which are less energy dense and weigh the same at the end of a flight as they do at the beginning – a dead weight that the aircraft has to carry for the whole flight.

Aircraft are also required to have reserve fuel – kerosene or electric or hydrogen - to allow for unforeseen events. A plane needs extra capacity to circle the airport for 30 minutes in case it can't land right away, and it must also be able to reach an alternative airport 100 km (60 miles) away in an emergency. When you take all that into account, the usable range of a 19-seat electric plane goes from about 160 miles to about 30 miles.

Airbuses or Boeings carrying around 200 passengers – as they do now - on short to medium haul trips to Europe or long haul trips powered by electricity? Not a chance in any foreseeable future – probably never even if the energy density of batteries were to be massively and miraculously transformed. In any event, raw material used to make batteries is finite and will run out, just like fossil fuels, and its extraction and processing has environmental costs. So, why bother with electric flight?

Sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) SAF is made from theoretically renewable feed stocks like energy crops. Emissions from SAF are comparable to fossil-based jet fuels, except for marginal efficiency gains, the majority of which originate from the production process.

A tiny percentage of aviation fuel consists of SAF right now. SAF as a complete replacement for fossil fuel derived kerosene would need so much land that food production would be hugely affected.

So, given the emissions won't change, what's the point of SAF? And given the massive area of land needed to produce it, what should we do – fly or eat?

Why is aviation so excited about these so-called alternatives? Because its public relations machine wants us to believe that it can be business as usual forever – it wants to go on making money come what may. None of this is acceptable in the context of the climate change emergency and the rapidly approaching thresholds of no return.

Next time? – don't know yet!

Cut a small hole in the centre of the parachute.


Attach strings to each corner of the hexagon, long enough to go round teddy's body and under his arms



Nature Notes

Butterfly Garden Bioblitz - the results are in!

On June 30th the Sustainable Heddon group held a Bioblitz event based in the Heddon Butterfly Garden and surrounding woodland to record as many different species as possible. The weather was a bit cool and grey – typical of this rather disappointing summer, but thankfully the rain held off. We had support from ERIC NE, the Environmental Records Information Centre for the North East, and NHSN, the Natural History Society of Northumberland and were very grateful that they sent along natural history experts to help us with the identification of species and useful equipment such as sweep nets, ID guides and bug-collecting pots.

We were also joined by Ian Armstrong, one of the key people involved in the original creation of the Butterfly Garden, and several enthusiastic families who did a great job of collecting mini beasts as well as identifying plants and birds. The overcast weather meant we saw fewer butterflies than I would have expected, but my highlights of the day included a pretty moth called a mint moth, a low fly-past from a buzzard, frequently calling great-spotted woodpeckers, and a spider with lovely markings called a common candy-striped spider. We also found a semaphore fly, so named because the male has white wingtips which it uses to signal to females during a complex courtship dance, like the waving of flags used to communicate in semaphore code. I learnt so much from our guest experts and it was great to see how much the children enjoyed getting up close to wildlife – the slugs and snails found under rocks seemed particularly popular!

We also ran a couple of sessions with Year 4 pupils from St Andrews school the Thursday before the main event. We had slightly better weather with a good amount of sunshine, which allowed us to see red admiral and peacock butterflies along with many other species. The children were knowledgeable and keen and made a great contribution to our overall species list.

In total we recorded 119 different species across a wide range of wildlife groups showing the diversity present and how beneficial even a small space like the Butterfly Garden can be for wildlife. We recorded ants, bees, beetles, butterflies and moths, flies, dragonflies, bugs, millipedes, centipedes, woodlice, slugs and snails, worms, spiders, grasshoppers, birds, flowering plants, grasses, ferns and trees. The full list is posted on the Sustainable Heddon Facebook page.

We were able to add 51 species to our project page on **iNaturalist** where we had either a photo or sound recording to allow the record to be verified by experts and contribute to scientific research – see **www.inaturalist.org/projects/heddon-butterfly-garden-bioblitz-june-2024** for the records with photos.

Many thanks to everyone who helped make the event a success.

Check Your Loft Insulation

First measure the thickness - you need a ruler or a tape measure. It should be 27cm (11 inches), but most houses from the 1960s would have had only 5cm to start with.

Even if the loft is boarded, you might find a gap near a joist to get the ruler down. Or, as you climb through the loft hatch, measure the depth of the hatch space. There may be a thin spot where a hot water tank is or used to be. If you want to add a second layer of insulation, roll it out in the other direction to the first to avoid gaps.






