# Selman Park is reopening!

We've been working closely with the landowner of Selman Park to look at how we can bring the facility back into the community. Taking into consideration historic issues and concerns with regards access, parking and over usage of the sports field, the Parish Council have agreed with the landowner to trial an approach for 12 months in October to bring back usage to try and protect the longevity of the Selman Park facility. Depending on usage, the Parish Council will make a decision in October 2024 on whether to extend the length of the Lease Agreement.

The size of Selman Park being leased has been reduced, however, still includes the changing room facilities which we know bring value to the groups using it.



We've already experimented with some local groups and have seen the newly formed Heddon Guides using the facility to prepare for their camping trip, kites were flown at the Heddon Culture Show and we're having ongoing discussions with St Andrews School to support their sport curriculum. It's all very exciting.

To get things up and running and encouraging people to use the facility for the next 9 months, the Parish Council will subsidise the hire costs with the initial hires being free. We're open to exploring ideas that you might want to use the facility for and how we can accommodate usage by smaller Heddon groups and activities. In addition to the groups we're working with, here's some ideas of the types of activities we're looking to encourage;

# Aircraft Noise Action Group (ANAG) – UPDATE

NOISE: The usual reminder to carry on sending in the complaints and get your neighbours to do it too! https://www.aircraftnoiseaction.com/complaints-form-2 Newcastle Airport now has its own complaints form on line – we recommend that you DON'T USE IT. Why? Because you can't choose a part of the day, you have to specify the precise time for each complaint. It is also confusing about the questions it asks and you might struggle to answer them. It also doesn't collect enough data. We think that, overall, it will effectively suppress the number of complaints. Don't let that happen.

PRIVATE JETS: The use of private jets is privilege of the rich and of senior executives of big companies and corporations – and it's growing rapidly. Why is this a problem? Well, private planes are up to 14 times more polluting per passenger mile than commercial planes and 50 times more polluting than trains. They carry far fewer passengers and about 40% of flights are empty, simply getting the aircraft to the right location. Newcastle Airport is not a major problem in this area BUT other UK airports are and when you add them all up it's a serious contribution to climate change. This must stop, what price climate change?

HOW THE GOVERNMENT IS SUPPORTING AVIATION EXPANSION: No VAT on jet fuel, no environmental impact taxation and planning for flights from UK Airports to increase by 33% by the year 2050 or earlier. The government claims that aviation is central to our economic development - an outright untruth. In practice (as we reported last time) the data says it is primarily a leisure industry that helps the export of vast amounts of money from the UK while bringing in a whole lot less. Expansion also runs entirely counter to the Government's stated objective of aviation being carbon zero by 2050. The government claims (without evidence) that future efficiency gains will deliver aviation's emission targets. However, the increased number of flights will entirely wipe out any gain. Truth is, we all need to fly a whole lot less.



## A word from Rev Lynda Coulthard

As I'm writing this there are more winds forecast, hopefully by the time you read this they will have past over & that you have come through unscathed or at least with not too much damage. Compared with some parts of the country we have been lucky. As Christmas was a month ago it is probably a distant

memory but I hope that any hopes & dreams that you have for 2024 are still alive.

With the snow, the heavy rain leading to flooding, & now the strong winds along with news reports of stabbings, killings, the wars between Russia & Ukraine & between Hamas & Israel & the rising cost of living it can be difficult to find something positive happening in the news at the moment, just at a time when we need a lift to help us look forward to Spring.

I received a pleasant surprise on Sunday when I returned home from leading worship. We often receive post for a nearby address which happened with a parcel last week so when I returned home after leading worship I was surprised to find a parcel had been pushed through the letter box. My immediate reaction was that it had been delivered to the wrong address as I hadn't ordered anything but the name & address on the parcel was correct. When I opened it I was astonished to find that someone had been thinking of me & had sent me a surprise gift which certainly gave me a boost. To receive a letter, a phone call or even a present out of the blue is such a boost to our wellbeing.

There has been a lot of focus on people's wellbeing recently as I think January is often a difficult for time for people after the Christmas & New Year celebrations. Last week Radio 2 highlighted 5 ways people could boost their well-being which included exercise, mindfulness, the part music can play in our wellbeing, cold water baths & sleep. In recent years cold water swimming has become popular but I'm not sure it is something that would be in my list of things to improve my wellbeing.

Last year with the rising fuel prices many places registered as warm spaces. Whilst some of those were new, a lot of the warm spaces were spaces that were already open but we were encouraged to increase their publicity & what they offered. Those warm spaces are still needed. We may not all be able to take an active part in those spaces but we can still help by writing a letter, card or email to show that we are thinking of someone, by ringing someone & letting them know that they haven't been forgotten about, it's passing the time of day with people in the street, in the shop, complimenting someone rather than complaining. Throughout his ministry Jesus so often went to those whom society had cast aside & showed that God cared. Knowing that we have made a difference to someone also encourages us & improves our own wellbeing.

So whatever 2024 has in store for us, whether there are dark clouds in the sky or not, may the hope that we have in Jesus help us to spread a little bit of happiness as we go by.

## Newcastle Foodbank **Collection Point in Heddon**

A box for donations to the Newcastle Foodbank is located outside the side door of the Methodist Chapel. The contents of the box are taken regularly to the Foodbank warehouse at Lemington. They are gratefully received.

To provide the most appropriate help for the circumstances of any situation the Foodbank works with local agencies. These include Citizens Advice, DWP, Newcastle City Council, GPs, Mental Health providers, children's centres and health visitors. If they feel that someone is struggling to put food on the table, they will issue a Foodbank voucher.

In the majority of cases the Foodbank is able to support people in overcoming their food crisis after three visits. For those in need of further support, and recognising the unsustainability of handing out food parcels on a regular basis, support and guidance is offered using the local agencies. The Foodbank works with them to help people overcome the often complex underlying problems that have led to the need for support, including household debt, worklessness, risk of homelessness, addiction and not claiming full benefit entitlements.

Currently, the most urgently needed items are:

- Tinned fruit
- Instant mash/tinned potatoes •
- Baby milk and formula
- Nappies (size 4 and larger)
- Toiletries (sanitary towels)
- Tea/coffee
- Soup tinned and packet
  - Custard and rice pudding

  - Tinned meat
  - Curry Sauce and rice.



## **Cricket at Close House**

Cricket was played at Close House during the late 1800s into the 1900s but it was not until the early months of 1904 that discussions took place regarding the possibility of forming a cricket league in the West Tyne area. A committee was established in this year, arranging friendly games between interested clubs, with a view to forming a league in 1905.

Due to the generosity and sponsorship of Captain David Cuthbert who presented the Challenge Trophy for the competition the following year, the League commenced in 1905.

The original league was made up of eight teams: Close House, Corbridge, Haltwhistle, Haydon Bridge, Humshaugh, Newburn, Ryton and Tynedale with each team playing each team home and away. Making fourteen games in all.

Each game would have a playing time of four hours, with a tea interval of 30 minutes, and a commencement start of 2.30 p.m.

The winning team would be awarded two points and one point for a game drawn or postponed.

In the early years average scores being in the region of sixty against forty, due to the quality of wicket preparation and out-fields.

Matches turned out to be very popular with spectators, particularly involving the top sides and in one game between Close House and Newburn over 1000 spectators watched the fixture and were helped by the hay harvesters in looking for a ball when hit into an adjoining field.

The first winners of the League were Close House with Newburn being runners up.

Before the Second World War, cricket weeks at Close House attracted famous touring sides. There is a legend that W.G. Grace once played here and undoubtedly took tea in the pavilion. Matches were played regularly when Close House was owned by the University of Newcastle upon Tyne from 1960 to 2004.

## The Cricket Pavilion

In the late 1800s a brick-built pavilion and a score hut were constructed along with two cricket pitches.

When golf superseded cricket, the pavilion became the main golf club house, later being converted into a luxury golf lodge after the new custom-designed club house opened. The new clubhouse, built on a different site as part of the post-University development of Close House Mansion and its two golf courses.

"Close House, a Georgian mansion in the countryside west of Newcastle, had its own cricket pitch and indeed - between the wars - its own cricket team. The 1894 pavilion and scorebox - both little changed externally - were designed by

Newcastle architectural practice Septimus Oswald & Son, best known for their work with Newcastle Breweries. The former cricket pitch is now a golf course, and the pavilion is currently serving as the golf clubhouse."

# **'Enrich the Earth'**Leave your garden clean-up!!!

Deadline day again, and poor Mr Scott must be past himself waiting for a few helpful and thoughtful words to fill the gap I promised I'd fill, and inspire you all that this year will be a better year for the garden! Inspiration is proving rather difficult though, as I can't remember the surrounding fields looking so wet for so long, while the rain keeps coming and the wind roars outside. Despite all this, we surprisingly had Snowdrops flowering in the garden before New Year. As we approach Spring, which inevitably will come, we will start to see other signs of new life in the garden and all around- the lawn might be growing, albeit slowly, buds are appearing on the ends of branches, and some particularly hardy plants might be showing leaf growth.

Aside from new growth however, there's a good chance your garden is looking worse for wear, with dead leaves, soggy moss, fallen twigs and branches and rotting stems. Give us a nice weekend weatherwise, and it will be very tempting to grab the shovel, the rake, the secateurs, hunt out the gardening boots and gloves, and start on the annual garden spring clean. There are, however, benefits to holding your nerve and leaving the clean-up for a few weeks longer.

Despite the cold temperatures, the dead plant matter that's making your garden look wild has been slowly rotting over the last few months.



As plant matter rots, it is slowly broken down into simple components like nitrogen, phosphates and magnesium. These nutrients are released back into the soil and will help feed your plants throughout the year. Leaving garden detritus to decay is a natural and cost-effective way to improve the quality of your borders and flowerbeds. Feeding the soil and increasing its biodiversity will result in far better and healthier plants than by just feeding the plants with fertiliser over the long term.

Dead matter is absolute gold for insects and other wildlife in your garden. Decomposition of plant matter is conducted mainly by organisms known as detrivores that also feed off it. Detrivores (also known as detritivores) include bacteria, plus insects like beetles, flies, woodlice, slugs, snails, millipedes, and earthworms.

While we might think of fungi and slime moulds as plants, they are also detrivores and help the decomposition process.

But, in short, allowing decomposition to occur in your garden supports a vast and complex ecosystem, feeding the organisms that improve the quality of our garden's soil, that grows this year's plants that decay and get broken down... the cycle of life.

Worryingly, more than 40% of insect species are declining and a third are endangered, and many other once-common animal and bird species are declining, so your garden needs your help!

So our suggestion is to leave the garden clean-up for as long as you can, until there is a risk of debris interfering with new growth. Depending on the weather, your clean-up could be in March or even April. Cleaning up in February is risky because the weather could take an unexpected U-turn back into frost and even snow. Some of the coldest winter spells have hit us in February!

If the patio is a mess and you can't bear it any longer, you could move leaf and other plant litter onto the flower beds, or even onto the compost heap. Bear in mind that some insects might have laid their eggs on the underside of leaves, so go gently.

When you do start the big clear up, try and leave a few areas untouched to create thriving habitats for invertebrates and other beneficial organisms. Even start your own compost heap so that you can incorporate this nutrient rich gold to improve your soil's fertility and health. We are working with a project called "Enrich the Earth", which exists to transform unavoidable green and food waste into nutrient rich compost. It's a simple solution that will help tackle the climate crisis, reuse our waste, either on a big or small scale, and put nutrients right back into the soil. ## Nature Notes - Mad as a March hare?

Early spring is the best time of year to get a good view of a brown hare. This shy mammal with an air of mystique is active all year round and doesn't hibernate, but they are particularly active now as they start to pair up for the breeding season. It's also easier to spot them while the fields are bare or crops are in their early stages. Brown hare feed on the shoots of grass and other vegetation so are usually found in grasslands or arable fields.

I recently discovered brown hare are not native to the UK. Their exact origin is a mystery but they have certainly been present since Roman times and some sources claim earlier evidence from the iron-age. Certainly they have become firmly established and naturalised in the British countryside and have inspired mythology and folklore due to their elusive nature. In medieval times hares were associated with witchcraft. The myth of the moon-gazing hare has become a popular artistic motif, but they are also regarded as a pagan symbol of springtime and fertility and this is thought to be the origin of the 'Easter Bunny'.

Brown hare are sometimes confused with rabbits which look similar. However, hare are significantly larger with longer legs and ears. Hares' ears have distinctive black tips which are often the best feature for identification. They also have amber eyes whereas rabbits' eyes are dark brown, and their coat is golden-brown rather than grey-brown. They also move and live quite differently. Rabbits tend to hop whereas hare will walk or run and leap at great speed. Brown hare are Britain's fastest land mammal and can reach speeds up to 70kph/45mph. Rabbits live communally in burrows underground where they retreat to evade predators, whereas hare live entirely above ground so rely on speed and agility to avoid their main predator the fox. Hare also make a shallow depressions in long grass called 'forms' where they can hide and shelter. In contrast to rabbits, brown hare are generally solitary though will often feed in loose groups.

Brown hare breed between February and September and can have up to four litters of young, called leverets, per year. During the breeding seasons males chase the females and these chases can become very athletic with leaping and 'boxing' from the females to repel unwanted attention. This behaviour is the origin of the phrase 'mad as a March hare'.

I've had some delightful close encounters with brown hare near Heddon, mostly around Rudchester and High Seat. They are most active at night and in low light so dawn and dusk are the best times to see them. Field margins, tramlines between crops, and footpaths or road verges are good places to look as hare often seem to follow these features. If I'm lucky enough to come across one when downwind I've been able to get quite close before being noticed, but I've yet to witness their boxing behaviour for myself. That is still on my wildlife wishlist but maybe this will be the year?




AGM - Wednesday 21st February 7.00pm Womens Institute Everyone Welcome!
