**Please report: Fires** to the Fire Service they may appear small, but in many areas in the village, could be disastrous if they take hold.


Vandalism and ASB to the Police via their online form unless you are in direct threat then via 999.

#### Be responsible!

Lambing season is now in full swing, birds are nesting, species are emerging from hibernation. The NFU along with the RSPB and Wildlife Trusts, are urging owners to keep their dogs on short leads when walking in the countryside, to protect grazing livestock and wildlife.

Experts say loose dogs are one of the biggest causes of wildlife disturbance – this is particularly problematic when many species are breeding and vulnerable either on or near the ground.

We have now been able to appoint a contractor to carry out the essential repair work on the church roof, porch, bell cote and boiler house chimney. We are also busy filling in application forms for grants from larger organisations. Whilst we have had some success with our first application, we still have a considerable way to go to meet our target.

Our **Garden of Remembrance** in St Andrew's Church is a very special place where ashes of our loved ones are interred and where we can go to spend time remembering them. The churchyard is however, like most places, governed by rules and regulations. In order to comply with the current rules, we are consulting with Michael Amos of Rusty Restorations on the construction of a wrought iron stand on which to place fresh flowers (without plastic) in memory of loved ones whose ashes are interred in the Garden.

This is in the very early stages of planning – more information will be available when we have decided on a design and site for the structure. We believe this will be a good way of us being able to have fresh flowers in memory of our loved ones without items being left on the ground.

Recently there have been a lot of flowers in plastic, artificial flowers, flowers in pots/vases and also memorials placed in the Garden of Remembrance without faculty permission, these will be removed during Lent and apologies for any upset this causes. It's Thursday and I've been reminded that the deadline for Heddon Gossip is tomorrow. Although I am in my third year of being a Methodist minister at Heddon Methodist Church, I shared it with Deacon Maggie who lived in Heddon and she tended to lead on the community and outreach of the church. It's only since September after Maggie sat down, as we call retirement in the Methodist Church as you never really retire as a minister. I am trying to get to the Coffee Morning that is held on a Thursday morning (10.00am midday) at the church and last week I mentioned to someone that I thought the deadline for pieces for the Gossip was imminent. Even though it was in the back of my mind it was receiving the reminder that prompted me to think of something to say.

I wonder whether you are a words person or a numbers person. If you are a words person it can be easier today as typing what we want to say on a computer any words that are mis-spelt are often highlighted rather than having to get a dictionary to check it. I've always been more comfortable with numbers than words which led me to working in accounts when I dropped out of teacher training college. I don't find being in a job that requires a lot of words comfortable which probably explains why I find it easy to be distracted when I have to write pieces for community newsletters such as Heddon Gossip or the monthly church newsletters. However my love of numbers has led me to being on the Methodist District finance committee & people know that I will check that the figures are correct in the grant application.

It doesn't matter what stage of life that you are at or whether you are still in employment or not there is probably something that you procrastinate about doing - it might be filing the documents on the computer, getting rid of the emails that you have kept just in case you need to refer to them. It might be sorting out the photographs you've taken whilst on holiday or whilst out with friends and family that are still on the phone. It might be sorting the garden out ready for the summer or sorting the garage out. If you have done that then have you disposed of the rubbish. We remodelled our garden and the stones and rubble that we dug out has been in the garage since we did it. We just need to arrange to take it to the tip.

In the church calendar we are in the season of Lent when we traditionally fasted from (gave up) something like chocolate, alcohol etc. but we all know that it is difficult to change our habits. Just as I leave it to almost the last minute to write the newsletters articles I do meet the deadline. On Good Friday Christians remember Christ's crucifixion alongside two other criminals. One mocked Jesus but the other one rebuked him. Jesus told the one that rebuked him that he would be with him in Paradise (Luke 23 v39-43).

Procrastination may lead us to miss the deadlines set for things that we have to do in this life but with God it's never to late take your place in his kingdom. Procrastination often leaves us stressed so I urge you, if you haven't already, stop procrastinating & know the peace and love that God offers everyone through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ this Easter.

## Newcastle Foodbank **Collection Point in Heddon**

A box for donations to the Newcastle Foodbank is located outside the side door of the Methodist Chapel. The contents of the box are taken regularly to the facility in Benwell. There are also collection points in all the main supermarkets, including Sainsbury's in Throckley (it's also possible to donate cash at the facility outside St James Park before every home match).

The donation of food items is extremely important but it's worthwhile noting that the Foodbank also provides welfare guidance. And it has recently developed a network of Community Pantries, aimed at providing an affordable shopping experience within areas of deprivation. This works through a membership-based model, allowing customers from low-income households to shop with dignity for affordable food.

#### TREES in the Garden

Now it may not be the most obvious time to think of planting a tree in the garden and anyone who knows me will know I always recommend autumn planting, when the soil is moist and warm and the newly planted tree will soon put out new roots whilst not having to worry about the stress of growing new leaves and shoots. But what if you didn't get round to planting one last autumn because it was too wet, or too cold? Well, my answer to that would be why wait, get planting now.

We need trees, We need more trees. Every garden should have a tree. Even in a small garden there is room for a tree. Trees can even be grown successfully in pots! It is just a matter of making the right selection. But why should I plant a tree I hear you ask.

Well here are just a few good reasons. I am sure you could come up with more! They add height to your garden and, in a small garden, planting a suitable tree will make use of the vertical space from a design perspective. As well as adding height, incorporating garden trees makes sense of its scale and provides structure that makes sense of the rest of your planting.

Trees can provide you with year-round interest. Imagine the spring spectacle of a mature cherry tree in full flower, and then, after choosing the right variety, the wonderful show of autumn colour as leaves begin to shed. Other trees with year round interest include crab apples and members of the mountain ash family. Many Acers are known for their colourful bark and exceptional autumn colour and range in size from some of the more compact Japanese Maples to the stunning but too big for many gardens Norway Maples.

An established tree supports a phenomenal amount of wildlife. A single sycamore can provide as much pollen and nectar for insects as six acres of meadow. OF course not everyone has room for a sycamore, but even small to medium-sized garden trees can provide habitat for insects, those all-important flowers for insects, and somewhere for birds to roost or nest.

Trees are brilliant for screening eyesores, giving privacy and creating shelter for the rest of the garden. They can help distract the eye and disguise boundaries visually, helping a small garden to become part of a bigger landscape. Not all views need to be blocked and trees can also be used to help frame a view and enhance it.

Choosing the right spot for a tree will help create shelter and shade, giving a cool area in the summer months and also allowing for a more diverse range of planting. There is something very charming about creating a woodland planting in dappled shade where primroses, hellebores, wood anemones and early spring flowering bulbs all thrive creating picturesque beauty before the leafy canopy above fills out.

When planting a tree, you can always consider an edible fruiting tree rather than something purely ornamental, whether it be apples, pears, plums, or even nuts! Just check to make sure there are good pollinations partners in the vicinity first!


Plant enough garden trees and you can feel much better about your carbon footprint – like all plants, trees capture carbon dioxide and turn it into oxygen, but unlike other, faster-growing or herbaceous plants, trees are by far the best at locking it up in their long-lasting woody mass. As well as benefiting biodiversity, trees also do an excellent job at muffling noise, and cleaning the air. Certain trees are known for their ability to filter air-borne pollutants

#### **Nature Notes**

#### **Ornate Orchids**

Many people consider orchids with their wide variety of colours and patterns to be among the most beautiful flowers. Some exotic species are popular houseplants but did you know we have over 50 native species in Britain? Some are extremely rare and can only be seen on a few nature reserves, but some are much more widespread and we do have orchids growing wild in Heddon and the surrounding countryside. Late spring/early summer is the best time of year to see them locally.

Orchids form a large and highly evolved

family of flowering plants, the Orchida-ceae, with several thousand species worldwide. UK species share a similar flower structure, despite the great variety in their appearance. There are 3 sepals (outer protective petal-like parts) and 3 main petals, with one that usually forms a lower lip known as the labellum. This lip is often the largest and most distinctive 'petal' structure of the flower and is helpful in telling species apart.

Many orchids have interesting and complex life cycles. They are usually highly specialised to a specific habitat and have equally specialised relationships with their pollinators, and with fungi which live in the soil. Their seeds are very small and need ideal conditions of light, moisture and warmth to germinate. However, they can remain dormant in the soil for a long time until suitable conditions occur. Orchids also need to be infected with a fungus from the soil to survive. The fungus helps the orchid to obtain nutrients. Some orchids are famous for their sophisticated mimicry to attract specific pollinators. The bee orchid flower's velvety lip looks like a female bee. Males fly in to try to mate with it and end up pollinating the flower. Unfortunately, the orchid's target bee species doesn't live in the UK but

luckily it can also self-pollinate. It's always good to have a back-up plan!

As the name suggests, the common spotted orchid is one of the species you are most likely to see. It has beautiful spikes of flowers in shades of pink and purple with streaked and patterned petals and spotted leaves. These flower spikes can be quite tall and impressive (*see photo*). Look out for this species in the damp grassland/marshy area at the top of Heddon Common during June and July.

Another good local site for orchids is the chalk hills of the Spetchells at Prudhoe. In addition to the common spotted orchid, northern marsh orchid and pyramidal orchid have been recorded there.

The dune helleborine is another species of orchid which can be seen growing alongside the River Tyne between Wylam and Newburn. Its flowers are more subtle and less showy, with greenish sepals and white lips. However it's a nationally rare species and is endemic to Britain meaning it grows nowhere else in the world, so it's a special plant. Some experts argue 'Tyne helleborine' should be classed as a separate variant of dune helleborine. It's certainly a plant worth looking out for.

See if you can spot any orchids over the summer. Sites that are good for orchids are often good for other wildflowers and wildlife too.

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
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# Passing of John Gillott John Gillott 1946 - 2025



Sadly joint library co-ordinator and John Gillott passed away in February our condolences to John's family.



... and climate change? Fly less, not more. Best of all, don't fly at all: see Flight Free UK (https://flightfree.co.uk)

**So:** based on a recent report from **The Royal Institute of International Affairs,** commonly known as **Chatham House,** a British think tank, entitled: "Net zero and the role of the aviation industry" ...

At the risk of boring you (!): Climate change is accelerating and aviation is hell bent on massive expansion and, in the process, aiding and abetting climate change (yes we've said this many times before – sorry!). In the UK, successive governments have seen no problem with this expansion – the current government is no different, it has swallowed the propaganda peddled by aviation that it is key to economic growth. It isn't, all it does is export a whole lot more money from the UK via leisure flights – holidays and visits to family and friends. – than it brings in. Clearly, however, the industry isn't going to be easily stopped from its insane expansion. So what to do?

If you fly, how about this for a strategy that you can control: If you are in that group of UK citizens that flies on holiday or to see family/friends 5 or more times a year, cutting it down by one or more flights could help to significantly reduce aviation's impact. The less this group flies, the better. If you fly less often, still try to cut it down by one flight or more. If you are in the 77% of the UK population who take no more than 1 return flight a year, don't worry too much though it would great if you could stop altogether. It's the frequent fliers that are the problem right now, they need to cut down! Is that you? Could you help? It's about managing demand.

Why is demand management so important? Because climate time is running out and because options for **supply side management** of aviation's climate change impact depend on zero-emissions aircraft (electric or hydrogen) and so-called sustainable aviation fuels. None of these are yet in a fit state to be scaled up any time soon (and may never be) or they are still in the protracted R&D phase.
