- All rockets will be charged with the identical quantity of water.
- All rockets will be launched on the same trajectory.

• One 2 litre plastic fizzy drink bottle.

This would be the basics for your rocket, however the addition of fins and a nose cone would help it fly further.

SAFETY: This rocket uses air pressure to fling a bottle at high speed 20–50 metres.

Letter from Revd Lynda

By the time you read this the 'schools will be out for summer'. Speaking to primary teachers I know the formal lessons may not be happening during the last week of school but the children will still be learning skills if not facts in the activities that they are taking part in.

Not having school age children I don't tend to take holidays when the schools are off. Each summer I hope to get on top of some of the jobs that need doing whilst it is, hopefully, quieter as it is the end of the Methodist Church year on 31st August just like the school year. Unlike other denominations where ministers can move throughout the year, all Methodist Ministers who are starting at a new/different church move during the month of August ready to start on 1st September. For the last 12 months my colleague & I have been grateful for the help of two retired ministers covering a vacant post but we are looking forward to welcoming a new colleague based in Ponteland.

Last month my husband and I spent 17 days in Canada during which we spent some time travelling on trains, visiting different cities before going to see a friend. Newcastle Foodbank Collection Point in Heddon



A quick reminder of what the Parish Council does:

Heddon Parish Council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of parish residents. We sit within the broader framework of Northumberland County Council, and a small portion of your council tax—called the precept—is allocated directly to parish activities.

Our key responsibilities include:

- Reviewing planning applications.
- Managing and improving green spaces and village assets.
- Campaigning for improved services and facilities.
- Collaborating with partners on issues like roads, signage, and pathways.

Importantly, **all Parish Councillors are volunteers** who give their time freely. Please extend a warm welcome and your respect for the vital role they play in preserving our village's independence.



It's been on our "wish list" for some time—upgrading signage throughout Heddon, especially around the Hadrian's Wall site. Feedback from residents and tourists has been invaluable

in identifying issues, and we've worked alongside Northumberland County Council, the Borderlands Project, National Trails, and English Heritage to address them.

Here's what we've learned:

- The Hadrian's Wall trail curves around Heddon in a peculiar arc that doesn't reach the Wall's actual site.
- Walkers using Station Road can end up feeling stranded.
- The Wall site lacks visibility for both drivers and pedestrians.
- Existing signs are worn, outdated, and sometimes misleading—especially with newer landmarks like Victrix and the Hadrian Mosaic not properly represented.

We're making strong progress in updating and replacing key signs to improve navigation, showcase village identity, and ensure safe and welcoming routes for all.

Anti-social behaviour

It's disappointing that the anti social behaviour (ASB) has reared its ugly head in the village again. Please can I ask everyone to be vigilant and report as appropriate.

It is good to make everyone aware through Facebook channels, however, it's important that we alert the correct authorities too.

Please report: Fires to the Fire Service they may appear small, but in many areas in the village, could be disastrous if they take hold.



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Nature Notes

Butterfly life-stories

Ruth Oatway

Butterflies are some of our most familiar and best-loved insects. They are a welcome sign of spring and summer, associated with warm sunny days. They are also known for the amazing transformations they undergo through their lifecycle, from egg to caterpillar to pupa within a chrysalis, finally emerging as a beautiful adult butterfly.

But, have you ever wondered why different butterfly species are more abundant at different times of year? It's partly to do with the different foodplants required by the caterpillars, but also their breeding and winter survival strategies. Butterflies and other insects rely on external heat to warm their bodies which is why they are most active on warm sunny days and can often

be seen basking in the sun. This makes it difficult for them to be active in winter. Storms and a shortage of food also pose problems. Most enter a form of hibernation called 'diapause' and shut down over winter. Depending on the species, this may be as an egg, caterpillar, pupa or adult butterfly. Some butterflies are 'univoltine' meaning they have a single brood within a year, while others are 'bivoltine' with a brood in early spring and a second brood later in summer. Some species can mix both strategies.

A few species even migrate to escape the cold. The painted lady is a UK butterfly which migrates to Morocco and crosses the Sahara. This migration is really a relay, taking three or more quickly-reproducing generations to make the journey of up to 7,500 miles. Some years we see very few of these butterflies and other years we get a large migratory influx, depending on weather conditions. I haven't seen any this year at the time of writing, but there's still time yet.

One of the first butterflies I see each year is the orange-tip. Only the males have the distinctive bright orange tips to their white wings, the female has dark grey wing tips, but both have a mottled green-grey pattern on the underwing. Orange-tip caterpillars love garlic mustard, cuckooflower and hedge mustard plants so they are often found in meadows and along verges and hedgerows. The caterpillars pupate in July and overwinter as a pupa, emerging as butterflies the following spring. This is why they can be seen as early as April but then disappear from July onwards.

Another species visible early in the year is the speckled wood, a dark brown butterfly with cream spots. These are abundant in the woodland edges of Heddon Common as they like partially shaded woodland with dappled sunlight. They are very territorial and pairs or small groups can often be seen spiralling upwards chasing each other as they battle for their patch. The caterpillars feed on grasses and the adults feed on the 'honeydew' excreted by aphids

feeding in the treetops. Adults can be seen from March all the way through to October because they can have two or even three broods in a year, with the adults of each generation living only a few weeks. They can over-winter as a caterpillar or as a pupa.

Peacock, small tortoiseshell, comma, and red admiral are species that spend the winter as adults, tucked away in a sheltered spot. They can therefore be seen at any time of year but with peaks in spring and mid-late summer. Their caterpillars feed on nettles (though comma caterpillars can also feed on other species such as elm and hop). Small tortoiseshell caterpillars build a communal web for shelter. The adults can feed on flowers and rotting fruit. Late flowering species such as buddleia, bramble and ivy are important for these species to build up their fat reserves to last the winter. The Heddon Butterfly Haven is a great place to see these four species and others. I hope you get a chance to enjoy these fascinating and colourful insects over the summer and into autumn.



Rudchester Township

Andy Curtis

Based on an article by V.L.B. in 'Vision'

In 1892 the boundaries of the parishes of Ovingham and Heddon on the Wall were altered, so that the township of Rudchester, which was previously in the ecclesiastical parish of Ovingham, was included in the parish of Heddon-on-the-Wall.

Rudchester is about one and a quarter miles from Heddon, situated at the first cross roads on the Military Road. *John Collingwood Bruce* writing in his 'Handbook to the Roman Wall' in 1863:

"When the Pretender's forces appeared before Carlisle in 1745, the Royal Troops were lying at Newcastle, where the enemy had been expected. At that time, no road that could bear the transit of artillery existed between Newcastle and Carlisle, so that General Wade was obliged to leave Carlisle to the mercy of the enemy, and proceed in search of them by a southerly route. After this the road between Newcastle and Carlisle, now known throughout the district as 'The Military Road' or the 'West Turnpike' was made. For miles together the Wall was pulled down to form it. Formerly the facing stones were in many places seen protruding through the metal; but in part they have been removed to supply material for mending the turnpike, and for the rest they have been hidden by the covering of tarmacadam".

The antiquarian, William Stukeley, wrote at the time that an Act of Parliament allowed Wade to "....demolish the Wall and beat the stone into pieces, to make the road withal. Every carving, inscription, altar, milestone, pillar, etc. undergoes the same vile havoc from the hands of these wretches".

John Wesley writes on May 21st 1755, "I preached at Nafferton near Horsley, about thirteen miles from Newcastle. We rode chiefly on the new western road, which lies on the old Roman Wall".

The fact that this road is on the Roman Wall accounts for its straightness.

Having thus digressed, I return to Rudchester, and for information, to Paul Brown's Friday Books of North Country Sketches (a selection of 'Friday Articles' from the 'Newcastle Journal' published from 1934), although I have a certain amount of personal knowledge having lived there for close upon 26 years.

Rudchester means 'Red Camp' and there is a reason for its name. It stands, in fact, upon the site of Vindobala, one of the Wall forts, and when in 1924 part of that fort was excavated it was found that many stones had been turned red by burning. Here was evidence of a tragedy long before the first of the Rudchesters built his tower out of the ruins.

The present Rudchester Manor is to all outward appearance 18th century, but mixed up in the building are parts of the ancient tower, and strangely enough a Saxon window was discovered not very long ago; it had been built up and its discovery came as a great surprise. How had it come to be incorporated in a tower erected in the late 13th century?

The site of the fort of Vindobala lies north of the house, which stands therefore within what was the civil settlement in Roman times.

There have been many finds in the fort itself - altars, statuary, pottery, coins, etc., including an altar which *Lucius Sentius Castus*, a centurion of the 6th legion, dedicated to Mithras and, departing this life, left the ornately-carved stone to be discovered by inquisitive people some fifteen hundred years later. I was instrumental in 1953 in initiating the excavation of the **Temple of Mithras**, thanks to the co-operation of Mr. J.P. Gillam and others interested in work of this nature.

Those who undertook this work were fortunate in the fact that when

found (in 1844), the position of the altar was marked on the Ordnance Survey Map produced in 1919. It was at this spot that the first trial trench was dug, but without success, a second trench was then tried a short distance away and some stonework was encountered which turned out to be the face of the north bench of the temple.

If my memory serves me aright, this is the third Mithras Temple to be found on the site of the Roman Wall, the other two being at Housesteads and Carrawburgh, both of which are kept open for inspection, whilst that at Rudchester has been filled in again. One must remember that stonework deteriorates if exposed to the weather, and is also disturbed by people walking about on it, so most of the excavation work done today after it has been photographed and recorded is once more covered up in order that it may be preserved.

A full-sized reproduction of the interior of the Temple of Mithras, discovered at Carrawburgh in 1950, complete with a tape recording which gives a detailed commentary on the temple, is on view at the Museum of Antiquities at Newcastle University (now the Great North Museum)

The items found at Rudchester are on display there, including the so-called 'thurible' or flat-bottomed vessel with elliptical holes in its side. No similar vessel has ever before been found. A visit to this collection of prehistoric, Roman and Anglo-Saxon antiquities is most rewarding, and of interest to all whatever their age.

In what was once an orchard west of Rudchester Manor is to be found what is often referred to as the 'Giant's Grave'. This is a cistern or tank carved out of the solid rock, which was discovered in 1766. It is of considerable size, being 12 feet long, 5 feet wide and 2 feet deep, and must have taken quite some time to fashion with the tools available in those days. It has a groove cut in its base, terminating in a hole to let out whatever liquid it was made to contain, which can be plugged in the same way as one plugs the waste hole of a bath today.

At p. 60 of Dr. Bruce's Wallet Book of the Roman Wall is the following passage, which may probably interest your correspondent J. L.:—

"To the west of the farm-house (at Rutchester, near Heddon-on-the-Wall, in the county of Northumberland) on the brow of the hill a trough-like excavation has been made in the solid rock. Its use is not known. It was once popularly called the Giant's Grave. Another account of its use is recorded in Sir David Smith's MSS. now preserved in Alnwick Castle. 'The old peasants here have a tradition that the Romans made a beverage somewhat like beer of the bells of heather (heath), and that this trough was used in the process of making such drink.' The opinion long prevailed in Northumberland, that the Picts had the art of preparing an intoxicating liquor from heather-bells, and that the secret died with them."

Giant's Grave Rudchester in Notes & Queries (1863)

It is not known what this large trough was used for; one suggestion is the making of mead, which is a fermented liquor made from heather honey, water and spices. If this was the case, I can only think that the Romans were a thirsty lot!

It was to Rudchester that *William Hutton* came one day more than a hundred years ago, and met with such a poor reception that he wrote the following in his records of his visit to these parts:-

"I saw old Sir at dinner sit, Who ne'er said "Stranger, take a bit", Yet might, although a poet said it have saved his beef and raised his credit."

That may have been the state of things in those days, but I know your

reception would be very different today, and whilst I don't want to embarrass the present occupiers, an arranged visit could be most rewarding. As one enters the house by the front door, the room on the right possesses a big fireplace and oak-beamed ceiling. The room on the other side of this doorway is the drawing room, and contains an interesting fireplace adorned with sculptured ornament. This room is in the oldest part of the house, a portion indeed of the medieval tower. The walls here are of great thickness and it was in this part of the building that the little Saxon window was discovered.

The whole site of the Roman Camp has not yet been excavated and none of it which lies north of the Military Road. I hope some day this work will be done as one never knows what of interest might be found.

The earliest part of the manor house is a 13th century Pele tower set within its south-east corner. Evidence for the date of the tower is restricted to historical references which suggest there was a hall built on the site around 1285. The only remaining medieval window within the tower, however, contains a cusped ogee header indicative of the 14th century. This may of course be a later insertion. The tower has been largely modified to accommodate the 18th century manor house which has resulted in many of the original openings and features being removed or replaced.

The manor house appears from the outset as a comfortable late 18th

Here again the modern route again diverts to the left around the village.

The Rev. William Stukeley incensed at the destruction of the Wall by the road builders wrote in Carausius (1757-59):

The overseers and workmen employed by Act of Parliament, to make a new road across the kingdom ... demolish the Wall, and beat the stones to pieces, to make the road withal. Every carving, inscription, altar, milestone, pillar, etc., undergoes the same vile havoc, from the hands of these wretches.'

century residence and displays many features of the period including the gothic windows, Tudor arched doorway, plan form, symmetry and overall construction methods. This likely construction date would correlate with other historical developments at the end of the 18th century including the Rudchester Manor House and Barn: Historic Building Report © AOC Archaeology 2009 | PAGE 15 OF 25 | www.aocarchaeology.com discovery of many Roman artefacts suggesting some groundwork and construction was being carried out. The Military Road was constructed in 1752 which would have allowed increased accessibility to the property as it operated as a gentleman's home. The site was bought by Aysgarth Fawkes in the later 18th century and remained under the Fawkes family ownership until it was sold again in the early 19th century to William James. It remained with the James family for the majority of the 19th and 20th centuries. It was one of these major families who were responsible for the construction of the manor house and associated farm buildings including the barn.

The barn to the north-west of Rudchester Manor, like the majority of the buildings at Rudchester, was probably built of stone from the Roman ruins that once dominated the area. In particular, the large dressed stone blocks set against the centre of the east elevation at ground floor level seem to date from this period with evidence of tooling to the western face of the stones. The stones have been re-used in this area of the barn in order to hold a hopper which has since been removed. The stones were probably set in this location in the late 19th and early 20th century. The Roman Mithraeum was discovered in 1844 and stones from that site were used in the fireplace of the manor house. It is likely that such large stones came from the same area if not from the fort itself.

Vindobala Roman Fort, Rudchester

There is little now to see of the remains of Vindobala apart from a raised area of grass and low banks hinting to the buildings below. It was the fourth fort from the eastern end of Hadrian's Wall. Excavations in 1897, 1902 and 1924 revealed much of its history. It was built as part of the Wall and was in use for some 400 years. Around the fort there was an extensive civilian settlement. Aircraft Noise Action Group (ANAG) -**UPDATE August/September 2025 TAXATION**

Many of us grumble from time to time about being taxed. Some of us grumble about the way our taxes are used, about what they get us. However, we mostly agree that some things are worth being taxed for. For example, most of us think that the NHS is one of the key benefits that we get from paying taxes, especially because it's free at the point of use (many of us might otherwise stay sick and/or be bankrupt as in the USA).

One of the things about taxation is that we generally agree it should be equitable, that everybody should pay their fair share for the greater good. As you know, many of the really large global companies don't pay their fair share - Amazon is one example.

AVIATION TAXATION- A FAIR SHARE?

Aviation also doesn't pay its fair share of tax, with no tax on jet fuel (road fuel is taxed at 50%), and no VAT on airline tickets. The benefits of aviation are felt by only a few, yet we all suffer the negative consequences and the industry contributes little to the things we all need via taxation.

Similarly, aviation - which is a major and growing contributor to the climate change and the global warming emergency - pays none of the costs associated with the damage it does. Offsetting, i.e. the planting of trees as a way of cancelling out the carbon emissions aviation generates, has long been proven not to work. It can make airports and airlines look good but it makes little or no difference.

Maybe the Chancellor, who is currently struggling to find the money needed to run the economy, should take a serious look at taxing aviation.

So, just a thought to bear in mind next time you take a flight anywhere – if you do.

Macmillan were there for her in her last week, supporting her at home, where she wanted to be with her precious family and friends.



If any one would like to take over the baton of producing Heddon Gossip then could you let me know along with the Parish Council.


