Passing of a Heddon Stalwart


HAZEL THOMPSON 1938 - 2024

Hazel was a lifetime resident of Heddon having moved here as a child with her brothers Billy and John when her father Jack Glendinning came to work on Heddon Banks Farm, and her mother Mrs Glenn became the village postwoman. During the WW2 years she spent time with Italian prisoners of war

who were billeted and put to work on the farm. She used to show her own children the etchings made by the prisoners on the wall at the bottom of Heddon Banks. As a child she won a prize at the village show for her handwriting, and as a teenager took part in the Festival of Britain celebrations in 1951 in the village.

After marrying and with 2 young children she moved to the house on Centurion Way and went on to have 4 more children and making many happy memories over the next 63 years, welcoming grandchildren and great grandchildren into the family home.

As an adult she soon became embedded in Heddon village life and was soon a well known figure. She participated and helped out at practically every village event, whether that be the W.I Strawberry Teas and jumble sales, or winning many prizes over the years for her baking in the village show. In the street Hazel was well known for hosting Tupperware parties, and with the biggest garden having all the kids in the street playing there with her own children, as well as supplying

Hazel served on the parish Council for a number of years, and when the library was under threat of closure became part of the team of volunteer librarians to ensure its continued operation. She was a member of the Knott Hall Committee coordinating bookings and a keyholder. She was the village Avon lady for many years, as well as distributing and collecting Poppy tins each year around local businesses.

Many people may remember Hazel playing football in a

fancy dress charity event on the Welfare field, where she was dressed as a casualty and broke her ankle, being carried off to be a real casualty in hospital.

She became the village heroine after trying to stop a robbery in the Post office, losing her own purse and gaining a black eye in the process. The post office rewarded her with a bravery award and a new purse (with money) in recognition of her actions that day.

Hazel became the go to woman for local history, having lived here most of her life she witnessed the evolution of Heddon over the years and there was very little she did not know about the village and a lot of the families who have lived here for decades.

She was the heart and soul of her family, Centurion Way and Heddon-on-the-Wall and will be greatly missed by all.

Happy New Year! I hope that you had a good Christmas & despite the weather last weekend that the year has started well for you.

I'm preparing this piece a few days before the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (18th – 25th January) when Christians are encouraged to come together & celebrate the things that unite them rather than the things that divide them.

Few people I speak to today make New Year's resolutions. I think most, if not all of us, have tried previously & after a few days we've slipped back & given up. I heard Paul McKenna speaking on Radio 2 saying that New Year's resolutions are often wishes & because they are merely wishes we fail to set targets or goals. He suggested that people should envisage what the outcome would be I in 12 months time if people kept their resolutions, then what they would need to be like in 9 months time to achieve their goal & to break it down into more achievable targets. One new year's resolution might be to lose weight so set a target say 2 stone by next Christmas. That may seem a lot at the start of the year but if you lost 2-3lbs a month then you would achieve your goal.

In the Methodist church either in January or September which is the start of the Methodist year we have a 'Covenant service' in which we renew the promises when we were made members/confirmed. It encourages to accept that there may be things to do but equally (& certainly as we get older) we might not be able to do the things we used to do. We may have times of peace & we may have times of trouble. What we think, say or do may be valued but at other times we may be disregarded. At the end of the Covenant prayer we say 'I willingly offer all I have & am to serve you as & where you choose'.

During this coming year I hope that there are many times of joy. However there will inevitably be times of sadness, we might face difficulties in our own lives or as a nation. Some things will be because of our choices & others by the choices of others that we have no control over. Whatever this year holds we have the choice to face it with courage or we have the choice to let it overwhelm us. We have the choice to be kind to others & make the world, or at least Heddon a better place or you can choose to wallow in misery.

We can make resolutions at any time - it doesn't have to only be on New Year's Day. *Let's resolve to make the day ahead as best as it can be for ourselves & our community* & then we might all enjoy, whether you have a faith or not, life in all it's fullness. God bless Lynda

I know from the comments on our social channels and discussions that many of you have with our current councillors that many of you have some great ideas to improve our village including the work and contracts that are managed through the Parish Council.

The next ordinary elections for Town, Parish and Community Councils across the county will be combined with the County Council elections on Thursday 1st May 2025.

During the elections all the current Parish Councillors must step down from their post. This is a great opportunity for people across the Parish to put their names forward if they would like to be



part of the Parish Council following the elections in May. Our council is currently made up of 9 councillors, supported by two paid members of staff.

Northumberland County Council update

At our meeting in January, we were joined by Councillor Peter Jackson. He provided us with the following updates in relation to Northumberland County Council. The Council is currently preparing budgets and future planning. The demand for social care is increasing and costs associated with that and education are also increasing. They are working to prevent any impact on the services residents receive and frontline services. Although not directly supporting Heddon, the new Northumberland rail line has now opened and is serving south east Northumberland. Also on travel, the project to make the A1 a dual carriageway north of Heddon on the Wall is no longer continuing, which is disappointing. The government has introduced new housing targets which could affect the Tyne Valley as they are looking for regions to review green spaces and brownfield sites. We will share updates as we're made aware.

In better news, schools in the county continue to improve and Northumberland is in the top 25% of the country in terms of the quality of education offered. The local schools are doing particularly well.

As an update from the Parish Council linked into the overall budget setting, after 3 years of maintaining our precept (the amount of money per household the Parish Council receives from your council tax) we have taken the difficult decision to make a small increase this year of 3%. This decision wasn't taken lightly but is due to the increased costs for services we pay for, and reduced services provided by



Northumberland County Council.

Welfare Field Enhancement Project

Our plans are continuing to go well, we have received feedback from the school and held an open consultation at the library. We've had a further open consultation online which closed at the end of January. This feedback will help us to define our final plans which we will look to deliver in phases as we secure funds. Councillor Peter Jackson has already agreed to some financial support for this project.



The Past, Present and Future of the Heddon on the Wall Education and Training Trust (HETT)

The Old School and the Old School House (opposite 'The Swan') in Heddon-on-the-Wall were built in 1851. They were later conveyed in a deed to the Vicar and Churchwardens of St Andrews Church, Heddon-on-the-Wall, for a school for the parish of Heddon on the Wall, and the adjacent villages, and for a schoolmaster's house.

Heddon on the Wall School was then transferred to its present site in 1963. The Vicar and Churchwardens ('the trustees') sold the old schoolhouse during 1989 and the old school in 1993, paying Northumberland County Council an amount to cover the cost of building a new school - Heddon-on-the-Wall St Andrew's First School. With the remaining funds, Heddon-on-the-Wall Education and Training Trust (HETT) was established!

The aim of the Trust is to support the education and training needs of residents of the parish, pupils of Heddon-on-the-Wall St. Andrew's CE Primary School and its past pupils. Over the years the Trust has supported many, many applications including a teaching assistant course, learning materials (for school), sports equipment to pursue elite training programmes, a refereeing course and even Heavy Goods Vehicle training!

It has been most successful for many years. However, as financial times become so unsettled, two things have occurred; It is no longer possible to invest capital and earn enough interest to meet the application demand and concurrently, the number of applications have increased each year as more and more people require financial support with their education and training costs.

At the last AGM, the HETT Trustees made the exciting decision to develop and grow the Trust. To do this, the Trust needs to protect current assets whilst generating new income. As such, for the next year, HETT will only be able to award grants from the monies earned on interest through investments. This is to protect the longevity of the Trust.

Since we sent the flyer with the last *Heddon Gossip*, we have been heartened by all the kind donations received and would like to take this opportunity to say a **HUGE THANK YOU** to those of you who have already donated. Your generosity and willingness to support the work we do is incredibly appreciated.





Aviation's free ride:

We've reported about this before but we think it's worth a second look. If you drive a diesel or petrol car you currently pay 30p per litre VAT plus 52p per litre fuel duty every time you fill your tank. What does aviation pay? Zero VAT and zero fuel duty. Which means that taxpayers and car drivers in particular are effectively helping aviation's profits. Air passenger duty is the only tax levied on air travel and it's typically around £13 per passenger on, say, an economy flight to somewhere in Europe. Who pays this? Not the airlines, it's the passenger who pays it's you. We think it's high time taxpayers stopped subsidising airlines' executive pay and profits.

Noise Action Plan (NAP):

Newcastle Airport regularly updates its plan for limiting the effect of noise. It's currently updating the latest version and, as in previous years, we are highly critical of a lot of it. We particularly think that the absence of measurable targets for improvement means that the Airport can't be properly held to account.

We also think that the Airport's consultation process for the latest plan was, well, rubbish - just like the flawed consultation process in 2014 which led to the noisy flight paths we have now.

For the new NAP, virtually no residents were told about the consultation, there was no preparation, no public meetings and it took place over Christmas and the New Year. And the printed plan wasn't available to view in Heddon Library until after the original deadline of the 6' January (it was available on line but you probably weren't told)! And, when it was delivered, it was propped up against the Library door while it was closed. It wasn't until we pressed the Airport that they extended the deadline they really haven't learned how to communicate with people.

Nature Notes

Nature's drummers

Now is the perfect time of year to listen out for one of the most distinctive sounds of spring - the drumming of woodpeckers. There are three UK species; the great spotted woodpecker is the most common and the one I regularly see in the woods of Heddon and in our garden. It's also the best drummer. The green woodpecker is our largest species but drums rarely with a series of soft taps. It prefers to display with a loud laughing call known as a yaffle. It often forages on the ground probing for ants in grassland areas like parks. I've occasionally heard or seen them around Heddon. As the name



suggests, the lesser spotted woodpecker is similar-looking but much smaller and also much rarer than the great spotted. Sadly it has disappeared from much of the UK and I've never seen one. Its drumming is slightly slower and not as loud as the great spotted.

January to April is the peak time to hear great spotted woodpeckers drumming and calling (a sharp 'yap'). Both sexes drum to defend their territories and attract a mate. They are also easier to spot when the trees are bare. They beat their beaks against hollow branches or tree trunks at a stunning 40 strikes per second! Their drumming can carry for half a mile and they are picky peckers, often moving from one dead branch to another trying out the sound quality. If they find a good 'drum' they may come back to it repeatedly. On one walk In Derwent Valley I kept hearing a loud, metallic ringing sound. Eventually I traced it to a male great spotted woodpecker drumming on a metal pylon! He had found a good way to get himself heard above all his rivals.

Great spotted woodpeckers are also some of our most striking-looking birds with smart black and white plumage and a bright scarlet patch under the tail. The males have a band of red on the back of the neck which the females don't have, and youngsters have red on their foreheads. They are similar in size to a blackbird but different in shape. They often dominate bird feeders, scaring smaller birds away.

Their amazing dagger-like beaks are not just used for drumming but also for finding food and chiselling out nesting holes. Their main food source is insects hidden under the bark in dead wood, but they also eat tree seeds and will take the eggs and young of other birds. Great spotted woodpeckers breed around May to June and lay 4-6 eggs which hatch after a couple of weeks. As the chicks get larger and more confident they will come to the nest-hole entrance to beg loudly for food. I've been lucky enough to see a young woodpecker being fed at the nest-hole by

a parent after being alerted by the sound. We also find a parent will bring a recently fledged juvenile to our peanut feeder to show it this easy source of food!

The good news is that the great spotted woodpecker is currently thriving in the UK with numbers and range increasing in the past few decades. Tree diseases have many negative impacts but may also benefit woodpeckers which rely on deadwood for food and nest sites. Increased understanding of the value of deadwood for nature means this is more likely to be left in place where safe to do so. Reduced competition for nest sites due to the decline in starlings, and increased food availability from garden feeders may also be factors.




