Opening of Wolds Way

The official opening of the Nottinghamshire Wolds Way took place on Tuesday 23rd August at Bunny Village Hall. The Stanton Strollers were well represented by five walkers and one dog. After welcome coffee and delicious cakes, the opening address was given by Jeremy Colls of the Ramblers Holidays Charitable Trust. A group of 58 walkers then set off to walk the first stage of the route, from Bunny to Willoughby on the Wolds, a distance of six miles. Leaving the main road at Bunny, we passed the old gypsum mine entrance and entered Bunny Woods – always a lovely place to walk. From there we traversed several fields before reaching Wysall village. The Stanton Strollers had decided beforehand to lunch at The Plough, so we left the keen walkers to continue to Willoughby. We were blessed with beautiful weather and had a thoroughly enjoyable day.





The Notts Wolds Way is a new linear path of 26 miles from Bunny to Cropwell Butler divided into 4 linear stages each passing through an attractive and interesting part of south Nottinghamshire. Although there are a few short road sections, the route is mostly on rights of way in the form of field and woodland paths and tracks. It makes use of several paths which have been recently added to the Definitive Map and which have yet to find their way onto even the latest OS maps, and includes the new footpath in Stanton which follows the line of the railway tunnel and the bridleway from Browns Lane/Melton Road to the A46. The route has been comprehensively way-marked throughout with a characteristic black arrow on a white background. A 20 page colour booklet gives detailed walk instructions and information on points of interest along the route. Joining a mobile library is no different from joining any other library in Nottinghamshire and once you've joined you can use any library in the county or in Nottingham city.

You may request items from a mobile library as you would with a local library. Any items that you request will be available for you to collect from the mobile library on a later visit to your area.

If you miss a mobile library visit and you need to return borrowed items, you can return them to the mobile library on its next visit. Alternatively, you can also return any items borrowed from a mobile library to any local library. You can also renew books and other items, online or over the telephone.

All Saints Parish Church Survey

Following an article in last December's edition of the village newsletter, on extending the community use of our local parish church, a questionnaire was sent to all residents with the September newsletter. The response to this was disappointing with only 6 returned. When added to those views which were gathered at the Community event in September 2015, the total of responses is about a dozen. Without community support, funding applications cannot go ahead so regretfully those involved have decided to defer any further action for the moment.

However, thanks go to those who did offer their support, either financially or with offers of help with funding applications, coffee morning and support for other fundraising events.

Crime Prevention in Stanton

Although Stanton has been relatively crime free in recent years, since early August there have been an increased number of house burglaries in both Stanton on the Wolds and neighbouring villages. The majority of the offences have taken place during the day when the resident is out though there have been a smaller number where cars have been stolen from overnight burglaries. In particular quite a number of these offences have taken place on Tuesday and Wednesday during the daytime. In Stanton on the Wolds, houses on Melton Road have been targeted by burglars twice in October.

What is the police response?

The Wolds area will be a focus for crime prevention and patrols in the coming weeks.

Nottinghamshire Police have arrested a number of offenders for burglary during this time across Nottinghamshire but nobody has been charged with any burglaries on the Wolds area. They are carrying out 24 hour Roads Policing operations on a number of roads around the area using Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR). The Neighbourhood Policing team has visited many addresses in Stanton to speak with the residents and offer burglary prevention advice.

Key crime prevention messages

- 1. Make sure your house looks occupied even when you are not in. Leave a light on in the house especially after dark.
- 2. Use your burglar alarm if you have one.
- 3. Assess your home security doors and windows and in particular patio doors which are often the point of entry. Seek advice from a reputable locksmith or your local policing team.
- 4. Consider installing good quality professional CCTV (your local policing team can give advice).
- 5. Speak with neighbours and tell them if you are going away. Ask them to keep a close eye on your property.
- 6. Do not keep your car keys in an obvious place or within sight of window or door.
- 7. Keep other items of value, such as jewellery, secure.
- 8. **Be vigilant and report anything suspicious to the police** Early reporting of suspicious cars and people is absolutely vital. The police need to know the vehicle registration number, make, model and colour. They also need good descriptions of any people involved including clothing.

If a burglary or other crime is in progress you should always dial 999 or 101.

What does your Parish Council do?

I'm sure all residents are aware that Stanton on the Wolds has a Parish Council, but maybe many are unaware of what it does. Mike Elliott, Clerk to the Parish Council explains:

'A parish council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish. It is the level of government closest to the community. Parish councils are invariably the first place people will go with concerns or ideas. For this reason they are a vital part of any community.

If you've never been to a parish council meeting before, you may be forgiven for thinking that parish councillors are a group of (probably older) people who meet now and then in a draughty village hall (or in our case, the parish church) If, however, you live in a community where something 'big' has happened, you'll know that when people in the community need support and guidance, it is sometimes the parish council that is turned to.

By becoming a parish councillor you become someone your community will look to for help, guidance and support, a community leader with the power to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better, as a result of decisions you have helped make, is something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride.

Parish councils are statutory consultees on planning applications involving their parish.

Expenditure of the council includes such things as hire of the church for its meetings, office administration and payment of the clerk, provision of and upkeep of three notice boards, three seats, grass cutting, audit costs, statutory insurances, election costs and the newsletter four times a year. Income is derived from the annual precept and, from time to time, various grants. Currently the parish council at Stanton spends in the region of £7,000 a year.
