Holy Trinity Handbells Venture North

The Scottish Regional Association Spring Rally took place in Wick on Saturday, 16th March, celebrating 25 years of Handbell Ringing in Caithness. There were teams from across Scotland and from further afield including the N.E. region, the S.W. Region and West Midlands. Our group had been practicing three pieces for massed ringing over the last few weeks and a small contingent of handbell ringers, led by John Elcock travelled to Caithness for this event.

Arriving on Friday evening, we met some of the Ringers from across the region and were invited to participate in a ringing event after dinner. This was quite a surprise, as the bells in question were cowbells arranged in three octaves. I certainly had no experience of cowbells, but the tunes, including 'Over the Rainbow' were readily recognisable.



On the Saturday morning, we all met at the Assembly Rooms and laid out our bells for the three pieces we were to practise. We were joined by Irene, an experienced ringer from Scone Bellplates who greatly assisted in our team effort. The massed ringing pieces were conducted by Susie Dingle, a freelance orchestral and choral conductor and the pieces comprised:

- 'Judy Gees Goes Overseas'- a sea shanty composed by Katrina Gordon, Caithness Handbell Ringers
- 'Reflective Contemplations' a more serious piece, also by Katrina Gordon, featuring a ground bass and the
 opportunity for some of the ringers to improvise
- 'Over the Ord' written by Donald Sutherland from Wick and arranged for bells by Katrina Gordon. This provided
 a sing-a-long opportunity for audience participation during the informal concert on Saturday afternoon.

We were also treated to individual group ringing sessions between our practice sessions and during the informal concert, Caithness Handbell Ringers played 'Confluence' a piece written for piano by Blythe Bullen, a local schoolgirl. The piece was arranged for handbells by Katrina Gordon and Blythe was in the audience for the afternoon performance.

As a new Handbell Ringer, who can hardly read music, I learnt so much from the Conductor and started to watch the Conductor rather than simply trying to count time whilst focusing on the music sheet. The music came alive when the bells were played as one and we recognised the natural rests and timing intervals.

Our thanks go to everyone who attended and supported the event, and especially Poltney Bell Ringers who laid on lunch and served refreshments throughout the day. A raffle was held, and the money raised was divided between HRGB Scottish Regional Association to support young ringers and 'Arran's Appeal' raising funds and awareness of the Anthony Nolan Stem Cell Register.

Our new ringers are settling in nicely and enquiring about getting their sets of polo shirts and sweatshirts in our team colours. Children's Summer Holiday Handbell Ringing Week at Dunblane Cathedral

The final day of a week of music making with handbells for children aged 8-12 at Dunblane Cathedral, during the school summer holidays, concluded with a performance for family and friends. And the music worked on through the week, all specially written arrangements of music chosen by the children after they had registered, comprised Taylor Swift's "Wonderland", rock band AC/DC's "Back in Black" (with violin and cajon), "Let's go fly a kite" from Mary Poppins, and finishing with Olivia Rodrigo's "Deja Vu."

Some children had little to no prior music reading experience, while one could play several other instruments, and so the first few days had included everyone becoming familiar with music notation (note values and rhythms, time signatures, repeats, key signatures, dynamic markings), handbell techniques, and stagecraft, learning music notation while ringing – so it was all hands-on practical music making. By the morning of the final day, all the children demonstrated their developed music reading skills by being able to switch parts in one of the pieces so that each time they played the piece they played every other part in turn! They might have just even surprised themselves!

During the week the children played on handbells and on Belleplates. Throughout the week they had been introduced to the HRGB Crescendo Award scheme, and by the end of the week all the children had achieved all of the requirements of the first level of the Crescendo Award, and also gone on to achieve all of the requirements for the second level!

This was the second year in which Dunblane Cathedral Handbell Ringers had organised such an event. Much advertising had been undertaken locally, from emails to local schools, and posters distributed locally, to print media and social media advertising, and sharing on online "what's on" websites. This year was the first time children were asked beforehand what music they liked, to see if handbell arrangements could be made of some (with no promise that it would definitely happen – though it did this year!) And this was the first time the HRGB Crescendo Award scheme was incorporated – with the requirements of the first level award built into planning. As it turned out, the children really liked the idea of working towards the certification so much they were eager to rise to the challenge of doing more, and unexpectedly achieved the requirements for the second level.



The aim of the event had been to introduce more children to the fun of making music together with others using handbells. The smiles and laughs when they were learning, mixed with faces of concentration when ringing, and conversations with parents through the week certainly indicated that the children had enjoyed the week. We certainly hope that the seeds of enjoyment for making music with handbells for these children may in the future see them join a handbell group, whether that's right away or some years in the future.

It was with great sadness and shock that the ringers of Blair Bells learned of Margaret Davidson's sudden death in July.



A talented musician, Margaret began playing the organ in Blairgowrie at just 15 years old- going on to play regularly at churches in Coupar Angus, Blairgowrie and the surrounding villages throughout her life.

When Heather McLean formed the Parish of Dunkeld and Birnam Handbell Ringers in 2002, Margaret was one of the founding members of the group. Her musical skill, adaptability and enthusiasm meant she quickly became an active leading player, performing solo, duet and four-in-hand contributions. Margaret and Heather often played popular duets during the summer months in Dunkeld Cathedral, a fitting setting for their talents. The pair were also part of the Celtic Carillon - a very accomplished group of players from across the region. Margaret was well known across the handbell fraternity and really enjoyed the fellowship of meeting up with other ringers at both local and national rallies.

When Heather sadly passed away in 2017, Margaret took over as leader of the Dunkeld and Birnam group; a role she carried out with calm assurance giving lots of support and encouragement to the members. Margaret led the ringers until falling numbers and the impact of the pandemic led the decision to disband the group in October 2022. This had to be carried out in accordance with the constitution and Margaret's knowledge of the history of the group and its collections of bells and sheet music was invaluable when it came to dealing with their dispersal. It is encouraging to note that the set of Birnam bells which were designated to be given to the Scottish HRGB are currently on loan to a newly formed group who are enjoying playing them.

Margaret went on to join the Blair Bells group where she will be very greatly missed, not only for her musical skills but also the friendship, warmth and kindness she brought to the group. We send our love and condolences to her husband Andy and the rest of her family. Rest in Peace, Margaret.

Appeal for help to transport bells from East Anglia back to Scotland!

The Caithness Handbell Ringers were excited earlier this year to be authorised to borrow an extra set of bells from the William Hartley Memorial Fund, to accommodate our increasing number of ringers.

However, the bells are currently located in East Anglia and we are having some trouble getting them north. If any HRGB member is able to help to transport these bells safely from East Anglia to anywhere in Scotland, we'd be delighted to pick them up and take them the final 200-300 miles north to Caithness! Some of our team will be at Cumnock for the Rally in October so maybe we could arrange a handover there?

The set requiring transportation is the two octaves of Malmark bells which were donated to WHMF by the wonderful Heather McLean after her death in 2017. They are in 4 smaller boxes, handmade for Heather by her husband, so not too heavy for one person to lift. We're so much looking forward to welcoming these bells back to Scotland and giving them a caring home.
