The above headline publicised the Garleton Singers Christmas concert in Haddington in December.

Well known musician and critic, Alberto Massimo, wrote in The East Lothian Courier "The Garleton Singers gave an uplifting performance at St Mary's Haddington The title *Ring Out, Wild Bells!* referred to the Holy Trinity Handbells, who obviously enjoyed their pivotal role".

After some 3 years since their last performance, John Elcock refreshed the Holy Trinity Handbells group with an invitation in September to 'Come and Try' sessions. That resulted in 6 new members joining the band most of

whom had never rung bells before.

Very soon, John announced that he had received requests for the handbells band to play publicly. Gosh, now we were rehearsing for public performance. In the Garleton Singers concert we did individual performances of 2 pieces arranged for three octaves and accompanied the choir along with brass and percussion in 4 other carols.

Did we ring out? – yes, according to the audience. Were the bells wild? - perhaps, but we should leave the critic, Massimo, to define his comment 'pivotal'. Did playing uplift the band members? - unquestionably yes.

We are now well into term 2 and no one has withdrawn because of stage fright in December. Learning to ring bells has been a wonderful experience and I speak for all we novices in saying a big thank you to John and Stuart, our musical director.

Scotland's oldest Cathedral embodied sounds of delight, bells ringing Joy to the World, We Three Kings, Silent Night. (some delights were quite unique)


The bells resounded their praise, with joyous success, but it would have been sweeter, shared with friends from Caithness.

In June of last year, I was delighted to take part, albeit a small part, in ringing the tower bells in St Andrew's Church, Sonning, Berkshire, to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III.

Being a novice, I wasn't quite sure what to expect. However, the ringers all made me very welcome. To get to the tower, I had to enter a tiny door to the small, spiral stone stairs, and cling on to a rope to reach the tower whilst wondering how on earth I was ever going to get back down!

The actual tower is surprisingly big. Whilst I was talking to the ringers there, I met Andrew Price who told me that his father Ryan had recently passed away and that there was to be a "Remembering Ryan" handbell rally organized by the SW Region of HRGB in September 2024 in his honour. Not only had Ryan played handbells for many years, he had been a prolific composer and arranger of handbell music, too.

Lights, Street Fairs, Craft Fair and Concert



The lead up to Christmas 2023 for Dunblane Cathedral Handbell Ringers involved performing for the outdoor annual "Light Up A Life" remembrance event at Strathcarron Hospice (where our music adds to the lighting up of the Christmas tree as part of the service of remembrance for loved ones lost); performing seasonal music at the Christmas street fairs in both Dunblane and in Doune; performing Christmas music at regular intervals at our own fund-raising craft fair;

contributing to the music in Dunblane Cathedral Sunday morning service, along with the organ, choir and congregation;

and presenting a concert of all of our groups along with guest choir Sweet Harmony Barbershop Chorus. This concert had lovely feedback from the audience including "Absolutely fantastic night of festive entertainment...the handbell ringers played beautifully". The concert featured the youngest children in our



groups (aged 8 and 9), our teenage handbell soloist, our intergenerational teenage and adult group, a handbell trio, and our concert group. With something for all tastes the music ranged from "I want a hippopotamus for Christmas" to "Let it go" from Disney's Frozen, from "Dance of the Snow Flakes" to "Someday at Christmas" and "Little Drummer Boy" to "Have



yourself a merry little Christmas". Three pieces also combined handbells with the barbershop chorus!

This Christmas we were invited by the Glasgow Cathedral Choral Society to ring as part of their Christmas Concert in the Cathedral. We were excited to be doing this and all our ringers were able to confirm that they were available. The theme for their concert was 'A European Christmas' and I was told it didn't need to be all Christmas Music.

Our first piece was **Behold a New Joy** – Ecce Novum Gaudium, a 17th century Scottish Carol arr Malcolm C Wilson. This was

accompanied by a drum. Our next piece – Celebrate With Gladness is a Traditional Hungarian Folk Song arr Susan E. Geschke. We then put in a couple of 12 bell pieces rung by three ringers to show the variety you can have with handbells. The pieces chosen were A Hebridean Suite arr by Wendy Swain (which had been requested!) and Quem Pastores which is an old traditional German carol. We then returned to our 3-octave music, ringing Carol of the Bells by Mykola Leontovich arr Cathy Mokelbust followed by Ding Dong Merrily on

High arr Sandra Eithun. Our final two pieces were Still, Still, Still arr Bill Ingram and finishing with O Holy Night by Adolphe Charle Adam arr Ron Mallory.

It was a wonderful setting to be ringing for Christmas!

Since the first Covid lockdown, we have rung for the community at 6pm prior to the start of the Christingle service at 6.30pm. At that time people were encouraged to come out and ring a bell at 6pm. I suppose it will now be a new tradition for us! We had quite a crowd, but Michelle's daughter stole the show!
