25th Ring in Praise Seminar Dunblane - 8th June 2013

Two weary travellers from Aberdeen arrived in Dunblane just in time for coffee and scones before the start of this year's Ring in Praise seminar. We had left home in good time but the main road south was closed which meant a lengthy diversion and extra time on the road. So, the coffee pot was a very welcome sight!

Delegates from around the country were welcomed by Rev. Colin McIntosh, minister of Dunblane Cathedral, who spoke very movingly about the passage of time. This was - quite unbelievably - the 25th year of "Ring in Praise". Time does indeed fly when we are having fun!

Delegates had the option of Ringing All Day - on five pieces of ensemble music to performance standard - under the baton of Sandra Winter, of Solo Ringing All Day (also to performance standard) with Alan and Gay Cooper or selecting four different workshops led by experienced ringers from the Scottish Region HRGB.

After the first workshop session we were treated to a concert by Gay and Alan Cooper and Dunblane Cathedral Handbell Ringers accompanied by the Cathedral organist, Matthew Beetschen. It was a real feast of music from film themes to classical favourites. This was followed by another feast in the hall where we were faced with tables groaning under the weight of a sumptuous buffet. Full of fabulous food, everyone made their way back to ringing activities for the afternoon which included "Baton Beating Basics and Beyond", ringing pieces suitable for a Celebration, Processional Ringing, "Beautiful Belleplates", "Terrified of Twitter and Feart of Facebook" and "Cue Sheets and Chord Charts for Praise Band and Bells". With a delicious afternoon tea also served we were truly full of both music and food!

Before departure at 6pm we were treated to a performance from those who had selected the All Day ensemble or solo ringing. They did so well that it was difficult to believe they had just started the pieces that morning! All credit to their hard work and the expertise, good humour and patience of their leaders.

All too soon it was time to hit the road again for our journey North. Thankfully, the main road was now open so in two hours we were back home, tired but enthused after another superb Ring in Praise seminar. 

As we enter into our Autumn/Winter session we look forward to our handbell ringing every week and the friendship of each other.



Bells of the Tay

"Bells of the Tay" is the group formed last year by ringers from Blair Bells, Scone Belleplates and The Parish of Dunkeld HR. The members rehearse once a month and enjoy ringing three octave music, some of which is perhaps slightly more challenging than they would ring in their separate groups. Early this year it was decided that, rather than just enjoying ourselves, we should aim to give a concert. It was realised that preparing a full programme to an acceptable standard when only rehearsing once a month wasn't going to be easy. So it was thought wise to have a full day's rehearsal just prior to the concert.

"Handbells in Harmony" was duly arranged to take place on August 23rd in The Abbey Church, Coupar Angus with the Minister, Bruce Dempsey, adding variety as guest singer.





night, many members of the audience knowing they would enjoy the Minister's singing but, judging from comments received afterwards, many not being sure what to expect from the bells. The acoustics in the Church made life difficult for the seventeen ringers – the bass ringers at one end of the double row of tables being unable to hear the treble bells at the other end – but the ringers coped well and the audience obviously enjoyed our music, many saying during the interval and afterwards that they hadn't expected the bells to sound so lovely. (Something to consider for the future though: In order for the ringers to hear each other better, should we set up in a U formation, where possible, instead of two straight lines? Be interested to hear what others in the region think.)

A week beforehand we had our full day rehearsal which was much enjoyed (especially the delicious cakes brought along by some of the ringers!) The final run through of the complete programme towards the end of the day went well and gave us confidence for the forthcoming concert.

Parish of Dunkeld Ringers



A busy summer, as usual, for the group. The 12th summer season of weekly performances (solo and group) continued from Easter to the end of September. These are very popular with visitors to the area, many of whom come back year after year saying, "Wednesday is Dunkeld Day to hear the bells!" Sales of our DVDs and CDs do well. The group makes only a small profit from these sales as the cost of materials and licences for recording copyright music is high and 15% from each sale is donated to Macmillan Cornhill in Perth. However, we feel that the DVDs and CDs are good for promoting the art of handbell ringing to a wider audience. Many visitors make purchases for themselves and as gifts for family and friends.

Also in the Cathedral this summer were two performances, one of solo ringing and one by the group, during the Cathedral Flower Festival.

A concert of "Musical Bells" was given by the group in The Birnam Arts Centre at the beginning of August. This was well supported and raised £210 for The Arts Centre Development Fund and for The Fountain and Well Appeal (the Fountain in the centre of Dunkeld having been damaged during the festive season last year). The group is always keen to support local fundraising initiatives. Dunkeld ringers took part in the "Bells of the Tay" concert, the "Celtic Carillon" performance for the Church of Scotland Guild (see reports elsewhere) and are looking forward to attending the Regional Rally in Cupar on October 26th. The following day, October 27th, sees the ringers making their annual appearance at Dougie MacLean's Perthshire Amber Festival in The Wee Festival Hall at Dunkeld's Royal Hotel. The performance starts at 12.00 and is free. Why not visit Dunkeld for the day? The ringing is followed by an afternoon Open Mic session, usually well worth hearing and also free.

A new Christmas event for the group, in addition to the usual Christmas events, will be to entertain in Aviemore on December 7th for the Strathspey Railway's Santa Express – weather permitting us to travel that distance to ring and enjoy a day out and a Christmas meal together. The group should have been on tour again in 2013 but plans had to be put on hold due to illness. Hopefully, we'll be on our travels again in 2014. Heather I. McLean
