### Parish of Dunkeld Handbell Ringers

When I saw a request for all the bells throughout the UK to ring for 3 minutes at

8 o'clock on the morning of July 27<sup>th</sup> to celebrate the start of the 2012 Olympics

I knew that The Parish of Dunkeld Handbell Ringers had to join in!

We decided that we would actually ring for longer (wasn't worth travelling to Dunkeld and unpacking all the bells just for 3 minutes!).

So- 9 of us set off from the gates of Dunkeld Cathedral at 8.12 (the time having been changed to accommodate the BBC News Bulletins). We processed down the rather narrow Cathedral Street, with some people, still in their dressing gowns, watching from their doorways and cheering us on. Then into The Cross (Dunkeld's central square) and along one side of that into the main street (we've only one).

We continued processing and ringing along Atholl Street until we reached The Royal Dunkeld Hotel and there we finished, packed up and made our way into the hotel to enjoy a hearty breakfast together. Altogether we rang for about 25 minutes.

We felt that we really were part of the Olympics, that it was a unique opportunity to take part even though we were up in the highlands of Scotland, far removed from London where all the action was to take place.

I have to admit that there were fewer people watching than we'd hoped - 8.12 in the morning was obviously too early for most of the population of Dunkeld. Those who did turn out to watch clapped us and said afterwards that they had thoroughly enjoyed it and congratulated us for taking part. Several joined on at the end of our line of ringers - one with a ship's bell and some children with smaller bells. It was a very joyous occasion for us all, although I have to admit that Malcolm's "Jubilant Procession" didn't sound quite as good as it perhaps should - a ship's bell can play havoc with ringers' rhythms! Amongst the 450 attending this year were 15 ringers from Scotland, many of whom were involved in the running of the event. Lysbeth Wilson, Dunblane Cathedral HR, and Lynda Barclay, Jordanhill Parish Church HR, were members of the organising committee. Lysbeth ran classes

on how to stitch a Celtic knotwork card, while Beryl Snowden, Blair Bells, together with Lynda and myself led a session on Scottish country dancing.

The opening ceremony began with tower bell ringing in which Judith Frye, Dunblane Cathedral, took part. Eleanor Wilson, our youngest member, proudly carried the Union Flag in the Parade of Flags. Malcolm Wilson composed and conducted 'Festivamente', one of the two pieces chosen by HRGB to be rung at the Symposium. The other, 'Olympic



Having to produce a summary for The Cathedral Magazine Rurals, Guilds and Disability groups, at Flower Festivals, Edinburgh's Winter Festival, in many Churches and, during the summer months, provided weekly entertainment for visitors to Dunkeld Cathedral. Notable venues in which the ringers have performed are Iona Abbey, St. Giles' Cathedral, The National Museum of Scotland, Pitlochry Theatre, The Birnam Institute, Perth Concert Hall, Scone Palace, Falkland Palace, Dornoch Cathedral, and Duart Castle.

> When we perform anywhere we are invariably invited to return, which we sometimes do, but feel that to promote the art of handbell ringing as widely as possible, we should ring for new audiences.

> As already mentioned, the above record is one of which the ringers and I, as Musical Director, are proud. It has not been achieved without much hard work and dedication, has considerably increased the number of visitors to the Dunkeld area and, we feel, has promoted the image of handbell ringing into the wider community. We do not claim to be the best team of ringers there is but we enjoy ourselves and people seem to enjoy our music. Isn't that what it's all about? We now look forward to the future.

## Virtual Handbell Ringing

**DAYTON,OHIO**—Handbell musicians from around the globe will combine their ringing skills over the next five months as they collaborate on a unique musical creation, and they invite you to join them.

Inspired by the many virtual choir projects for vocalists, Handbell Musicians of America has teamed up with San Francisco handbell conductor and composer James Meredith to create the first ever Virtual Handbell Ensemble. In the virtual choir projects, individual vocalists from around the world make videos of themselves singing one part of a choral work written specifically for the project. All the videos are compiled to virtually create the effect of a mass choir performing the piece.

For the Virtual Handbell Ensemble project, Meredith has composed a work titled "Misterium," which he has deconstructed into 135 individual segments to be recorded separately by individuals and small groups of players from around the world. Musicians are invited to download the work from the project web-

site (virtual.handbellmusicians.org) and record themselves playing any one or a number of the individual segments, which will be assembled by the editing videographer and the composer. There are pieces of the music which can be performed by beginning handbell players as well as pieces which will challenge the most seasoned players. And no one will know what the actual music sounds like until it is compiled and premiered next July at the Handbell Musicians of America National Seminar in Portland, Oregon, after which it will be uploaded to the website and YouTube.

Musicians are encouraged to be creative in how they record their segments. Meredith said, "Find a place as quiet as possible indoors or out. Choose a background which does not detract from you. You may film very close up, at a distance, from the side, front or overhead but make your performance interesting. The more interesting, the more likely your clips will be prominent in the final video collage. In other words, don't look like robotic automatons! Let's show the world how exciting handbells can be to watch and listen to."

After the online premiere, the score will be published so that any groups interested can perform the work, which is written for double ensemble.


#### NEW! WHITECHAPEL HANDBELLS WOODEN JIGSAW PUZZLE

This is a familiar picture of part of the Woodroyd Handbell Ringers' refurbished competition set now used by HRGB to introduce new ringers to the art of handbell tune ringing.

Wentworth puzzles make an excellent gift. They challenge those who enjoy jigsaws that intrigue, frustrate and confuse! There are straight edges inside the puzzle and a set of specially cut musical "whimsies" (so-called because Victorian puzzle cutters included them 'on a whim').

This wooden puzzle contains 250 pieces and measures 250mm x 360mm ( $10^n$  x  $14^n$ ). It costs £22 (plus £3 p+p within the UK).


Border Bells Belleplate team is affiliated to the Galashiels U3A so by its very nature has older members. That's why we play Belleplates. They're a third of the weight of proper bells and easier for weak or arthriticy hands to lift.. As time has gone by we have got fed up with carrying our Perspex raised stands to performances. They are cumbersome and extremely heavy. So we decided to make our own and with this in mind we gathered on 13<sup>th</sup> September to have a craft session using heavy duty cardboard, sticky backed plastic and a plan by Tim Coombes.. In an hour six of us made twelve sturdy cardboard stands. We then spent some time puzzling over the best way to cover our stands. They might not last forever but we have a stack of cardboard left over to make new ones as and when needed and all our stands cost less than a single

purchased stand.
