Welcome to the First Newsletter of 2024



Fife Active Travel Consultation A91 Guardbridge - Cupar Route

Fife Council have various active travel travel projects across the Kingdom. Open for public comments is the first step in developing route options between Guardbridge and Cupar to avoid cycling on the busy A91.

Arup are the company developing this project: 'As we are at an early stage in the project, we do not have any plans for the route at this stage **as we are looking for the engagement that we undertake to help inform this**. The route is to connect Cupar and Guardbridge but the start/end points and alignment of this can be influenced through the engagement process. We would be keen to hear your thoughts around this. 

Potholes

Potholes and other road defects can vary from being a nuisance to being a major hazard and cause of accidents.

In the 2023 UK ALARM (Annual Local Authority Road Maintenance) survey it found that 'that local authority highway teams in England and Wales only received around two-thirds of what they needed to stop our local roads from further deterioration and that more than £14 billion – £68,000 for every mile of local road – is now needed to fix the backlog of carriageway repairs'. The Scottish situation on the state of road repairs and lack of funding is likely to be very similar - plenty to complain about if you want to contact your local Councillor or MSP.

While resources are limited and it may not seem as if its worth the effort the Council can only check potholes / road defects if they are reported to them. Minor roads you use may be routinely surveyed infrequently. Pothole reporting can be important in any accident claims as Councils duty of care may only extend to defects they know about https://www.cyclelawscotland.co.uk/
