"There will also be a chance to see a very short presentation on screen about the impact that the Annexe and re-ordered nave have made on the life of St Mary's."

St Mary's Wivenhoe Music Society is holding its second concert this year on Friday 26 May at 7.30pm and features the Encore singing group. They will be singing numbers from well-known musicals.

Tickets will be £8, including a glass of wine or soft drink. They will be available after 1 May at Wivenhoe Bookshop and on the Internet via TicketSource.



More than 20 gardens will be opening and there will be refreshments and plant sales. Tickets and maps covering both days will be available from Wivenhoe Bookshop and Town & Country Estate Agents, Vine Parade, costing just £5 each. Accompanied children under 14 go free.

This event is organised jointly by St Mary's Church in aid of the fabric of the church and by the Wivenhoe Society towards local causes chosen by the society.



St Mary's joins in No Mow May

Spring is here – and the sound of lawnmowers and the smell of mown grass bring joy to our hearts after the long, dreary winter.

However, a temporary halt to this is about to be put into place at St Mary's as Wivenhoe Town Council, Wivenhoe churches and other local groups support the national campaign, No Mow May.

It aims to encourage people not to mow their lawns until the end of May in order to boost the flowers, and nectar, available to pollinating insects such as bees, butterflies and moths.

Leading charity Plantlife said: "The number of people not mowing their lawns is increasing after a successful campaign to keep gardens wild."

"Just eight dandelion flowers may produce enough nectar sugar to meet an adult bumblebee's baseline energy needs."

After May, people with gardens and lawns are asked to mow less throughout the summer and preferably leave at least part of their garden untouched.

As many readers will know, St Mary's always leaves a significant part of the churchyard undisturbed to allow wildlife to flourish and buzz.

So if you wonder why St Mary's churchyard might be looking a bit unkempt this month, you now know that Wivenhoe churches are playing their part in supporting the natural habitat.

You might just want to play your part at home too!
