Vale of White Horse District Councillors Hello from Hayleigh and Debra:

Sunday 9th November was Remembrance Sunday, and like every year, we were honoured to be laying a wreath of Remembrance on behalf of the Vale of White Horse District Council. Each year, we parade

down the High Street in Harwell Village alongside veterans, cadets, parish councillors and other local groups.

National Government's plans to reorganise local government still dominates the discussion at the council, and the work of the officers. By the end of November, we will, as a council, have submitted a to the Government for proposal consideration. To be clear, this will be their decision - and they have, in the case of Oxfordshire, three submissions to look at. The Oxfordshire unitary, the Greater Oxford model and the one which the Vale is putting forward alongside four other councils; Cherwell, West Ox, South Ox and West Berkshire. The proposal has the potential to save the most money of all the options - with possible savings reaching £59.8m a year. It would create authorities that are big enough to be efficient, stable and reliable, but local enough to care and be responsive to communities.

The proposal would create two councils covering the following geographical areas:

- Oxford and Shires Council would comprise the existing district areas of Cherwell, Oxford City and West Oxfordshire.
- Ridgeway Council would be made up of the whole of West Berkshire Council's area and the existing district areas of South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse.

The proposal has been designed to meet the criteria set out by the government earlier this year. The criteria called for all proposals to be for councils that serve populations of around 500,000, are financially stable, deliver high-quality services, are responsive to the needs of communities, and support positive growth across the region. In the last update, we explained the current position with the Joint Local Plan — which is still at the examination stage, though the Planning Inspectorate asked us to withdraw it. The Inspectors said the councils had failed in a "duty to co-operate" with Oxford City Council on the single issue of how many homes South and Vale should plan in their districts to help Oxford with its unmet needs. The councils wrote back to the Inspectors setting out concerns they had with the Inspectors'

recommendation. The latest development is that a few days later Matthew Pennycook MP, Minister of State for Housing and Planning has written to the Planning Inspectorate, the organisation that oversees all Planning Inspectors, to request that they "be proportionate" in how they apply the guidelines related to the duty to co-operate, and to consider the context. The Minister's letter also welcomed Inspectors providing more opportunities during the examination process for councils to clarify how they've met the duty to co-operate.

Now the two councils have written to the Inspectors again requesting that they reconsider their initial conclusions in light of the Minister's letter, along with legal points the councils have raised, and Oxford's latest published housing figures — which show that we have already planned enough to cover the unmet need.

Dear Parish Councillors and residents,

The last few weeks have been busy, largely with road resurfacing issues. Many residents were negatively affected by overnight closures of a section of Didcot Road. The communication and planning around these roadworks was extremely poor. I attended the site every night with OCC officers to ensure everything ran to schedule; on the positive side, works finished three days early. I have already arranged a follow-up meeting with senior officers to review and improve processes. Thank you to everyone who came to join our pubs of the parishes walk; in particular, John and Annabel from the Red Lion Blewbury, who between them joined the entire walk, and to the Station Garden, who put on free tea and coffee to set us up for the day.

I'm keen to continue a programme of public engagement, so will be doing more walks in the future, with particular focus on issues raised with me directly, such as SEND and Adult Social Care. If you have any ideas for topics you think it would be valuable to discuss, please let me know.

Message from Olly Glover, MP for Didcot and Wantage

This month has been incredibly busy, full of constituency engagements alongside exciting activities in Parliament.

In Parliament, I secured a commitment from the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care to help unblock progress on the GP surgery in Great Western Park. At Prime Minister's Questions, I challenged the Prime Minister on the Government's decision to delay SEND reforms until 2026, asking what he has to say to parents and education staff who are deeply worried by these delays. I also led a debate on the proposed cuts to funding for the International Baccalaureate (IB) programme - an issue that affects many families at Europa School - and spoke on the need to improve statutory maternity and paternity pay. I have also been busy in my new role as Transport Spokesperson - speaking in Westminster Hall debates on sustainable aviation and headlight glare, and pressing the Secretary of State for Transport on the environmental impact of the proposed third runway at Heathrow.

It is always a pleasure to meet constituents in Parliament. Recently, I've met with residents campaigning to end cages for farmed animals, and with local pharmacists attending the launch of the new *Shot in the Arm* vaccine campaign.

Back in the constituency, I've held surgeries in Wantage and Didcot and met residents on the doorstep in East and West Challow. I joined members of CulBug (the Culham Bicycle User Group) for a cycle trip and opened the new visitor centre at Culham Campus - planting a tree and recognising 60 years of remarkable work at the site. I also had the pleasure of visiting Fitzwaryn Special School and Wantage Primary Academy to see Bikeability training in action alongside the Local Transport Minister, Lilian Greenwood.

It was wonderful to attend SOFEA's "Donate What You Can" community meal in Didcot, where all proceeds support the charity's Nourish and Flourish programme. I also visited the Thames Travel bus depot in Didcot and made further progress on improving the Orchard Centre, where parking is now free after 7pm every day. Lastly, it was a privilege to lay a wreath in both Wallingford and Didcot at Remembrance Day events, alongside laying a wreath on the Poppy Train at Didcot Railway Station. Lest we forget.
