I have lived in Chilton with my wife Jacquie since 1990, bringing up our two children here. I spent most of my working life at the Harwell site, engaged in radiochemistry, with over 15 years spent managing involving large projects nuclear management. In Chilton, I was a member of All Saints' church PCC for 13 years, a Church Warden for 6 years and Chairman of the Church Fabric Committee for 12 years. I am currently Chair of the 'Lydia Thomas Chilton Gift Fund'. I care very much about keeping the rural nature of the village intact, and I am very supportive of public transport and I use the local buses frequently. I would like to see changes to road signs, as currently they direct travellers only to the 'old' part of the village. My other interests include steam railways and photography. I'm most visible in the Village either walking our black labrador Ralph, or waiting at the bus-stop in Main Street!

I am pleased to be able to represent parishioners as a Parish Councillor for another term. It is a role I have undertaken for several years. Scrutinising and commenting on Planning Applications has been and will continue to be an important activity. It is important that the views of residents are understood and properly represented to the planners at the Vale of White Horse District Council. If anyone is unsure what the Parish Council actually does or has an issue they think the Parish Council could help with I would encourage them to come along to one of the monthly meetings which always have an item on the Agenda that gives members of the public the chance to raise issues.

I am happy that the 400year-old timbers are now able to breathe, and the house's appearance once again makes a valuable contribution to the street scene. My career was in marketing, 25 years with British Rail, ending at InterCity headquarters in London, followed by 13 years at Oxford Brookes University. I retired nine years ago but haven't been forgotten and occasionally do freelance photography for the University. I also volunteer in various roles at Didcot Railway Centre, which has its origins in 1961 after four friends of mine decided to buy a steam locomotive, when we were all 16-year-old trainspotters at Southall! It is now the most popular tourist attraction in South Oxfordshire, so a hugely satisfying achievement for all the volunteers. I have served on the Parish Council since 2004, and am the Parish Transport representative, Parish Council representative on the Village Hall Management Committee, and liaison with the North Wessex Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The importance of Chilton's location in the protected landscape of the AONB cannot be over emphasised.

The D Day Service at the RAF Harwell Memorial Stone

Did you know that you can report fly-tipping online using the Vale's <u>online form</u>, or telephone **03000 610 610** or email <u>admin.vale@biffa.co.uk</u> or contact your local District Councillor.

What information does the Vale need?

To help the Vale investigate the complaint they need as much detail as possible, including:

- the date, time and the place where the tipping is taking place, or has occurred
- what the waste is and how much of it there is
- a description of any vehicles involved and the registration number if possible

Removing fly-tipping
