### Work to continue to deliver fresh bid for South Midlands devolution

The government announced yesterday that an expression of interest to join the Devolution Priority Programme for the South Midlands Region will not proceed. Joining the Programme would have put the region on track to receive new powers and opportunities from government through the creation of a new Strategic Authority by May 2026.

Whilst the South Midlands Region has not been successful in the first tranche, the government is still keen to explore a future bid from the South Midlands Region and has committed to working with all South Midlands Authorities on developing this.

North Northamptonshire Council will now work with partners in the region to explore a future bid, which would deliver huge benefits for the council area and beyond.

## North Northamptonshire Adult Social Care Strategy to be considered for approval at next week's Executive meeting

North Northamptonshire Council's <u>Adult Social Care Strategy 2024-29 - 'The Lives We Live'</u> will be considered for final approval next week.

The council's Executive endorsed the five-year draft strategy on 14 March 2024. It has since been formally consulted on and the next phase of activity, if approved by the Executive at their meeting on Thursday 13 February, a delivery plan will be implemented.

An ageing population and more people living longer with more complex needs means the demand on the council's Adult Social Care services is growing. The strategy sets out how people with care and support needs can expect to be supported as they transition to adulthood, or at times in their lives when they may need additional support.

The strategy aims to address the challenges of more demand on services while always striving for the best for the adults in its population. Its focus is on wellbeing, enablement, partnership working and outcomes.

It has been co-produced with people who use our services, staff and local partners working in social care, and included our 'Expert by Experience' panel members. Drawing on their knowledge and experience the draft strategy aims to improve the way we deliver and commission support.

## North Northamptonshire Climate Change Strategy to be discussed by Executive

A Climate Change Strategy outlining the key climate related risks for the North Northamptonshire area will be discussed next week.

The council's Executive will consider the strategy which aims to build a more resilient, sustainable and equitable future by bringing together sectors and organisations to work collaboratively.

The strategy outlines a vision, approach and key areas of focus to address the effects of climate change over the next five years and has been shaped by consultation and feedback.

Once in place, the next step will be to develop a roadmap to Net Zero action plan to set out practical steps that can be taken to realise ambitions for the area. The action plan will be developed over the next year with input from residents, community groups, businesses, councillors and officers.

The council declared a climate and environment emergency in July 2021, recognising the need for action to enhance, protect and prevent further decline of the local environment. Alongside this declaration a set of recommendations were adopted to include developing a Climate Change Strategy and Action Plan.

The draft <u>Climate Change Strategy 2025-2030</u> ensures that North Northamptonshire Council has a strategy in place for its climate ambitions.

It focuses on six key areas of strategic importance: Transport, Homes and the Built Environment, Nature, Food and Farming, Energy, Green Economy and Waste.

Plans for each sector focus on reducing greenhouse gas emissions, building resilience to climate change, and ensuring an equitable transition to a low-carbon future.

## New powers to combat vacant commercial properties on Executive agenda

The council's Executive will discuss a new initiative next week that has been designed to reduce the number of vacant properties on high streets.

The council, as an Early Adopter, has been invited to apply to be part of a pilot scheme which would require landlords to rent out long-term vacant, commercial properties to new tenants.

The Executive will be asked to sign up to the government's <u>High Street Rental Auction Early Adopters</u> programme - a scheme that was introduced as part of the Levelling Up and Regeneration Act 2023.

High Street Rental Auctions (HSRAs) are intended to help local authorities bring long-term vacant properties back into meaningful use and permit local authorities to undertake an auction offering a lease of up to five years upon a privately-owned property.

It is anticipated that the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) will confirm the final list of councils that will be part of the programme during the week commencing Monday 17 February.

If the report is approved, council officers will work closely with the MHCLG throughout the process, and work through the next phases to identify high streets in North Northamptonshire to designate for HSRA. An update will be provided to the Executive later this year.

## Get ready for May elections - less than 100 days to go

With under 100 days to go and the new electoral register published on 1 February, residents across North Northamptonshire are being asked to think ahead and get ready for elections taking place locally this May.

On 1 May 2025, eligible registered electors will be able to vote in two elections:

- North Northamptonshire Council elections.
- Town and Parish elections.

These elections will also see changes to local government boundaries and wards, meaning residents may be voting in a new or different ward. The <u>new arrangements</u> can be found on our website.

Partly due to these changes, your polling station might differ from the last time you voted, so please double check your poll card when it arrives closer to election day.

Anyone wishing to vote in person now needs to bring acceptable photographic ID, an Anonymous Electors Document or a Voter Authority Certificate.

If you don't have any form of photo ID from the <u>accepted list</u>, or your ID no longer looks like you, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate. Applicants must be registered to vote beforehand. You can apply online for a <u>Voter Authority Certificate</u> on the government website.

Voters wishing to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate should first make sure they are registered to vote.

## Twenty-one new Community Orchards for North Northamptonshire

North Northamptonshire Council has received funding to help 21 community groups, schools and parish councils to plant their own community orchards this Winter, all of which will be planted on publicly accessible land across North Northamptonshire.

Ranging in size from small sites of five trees to larger ones with up to 100 trees, these new community orchards will provide opportunities for local people to enjoy nature, as well as offering multiple benefits to wildlife.

Funding for the scheme was made available through the Coronation Living Heritage Fund, part of a government initiative which celebrates the King's Coronation and supports tree planting projects across England.

## Voi e-scooters to be available 24/7 in North Northamptonshire

North Northamptonshire Council and Northamptonshire Police have agreed to a six-month trial which will see the popular Voi e-scooters available 24/7.

The changes will come into effect from Monday 10 February.

It is hoped that the extension in operating hours will enable more residents to use the scheme, providing a green, affordable and reliable transport option for those who work shifts or, for example, in hospitality.

All e-scooters will have additional reflective strips installed to the front of vehicles and, as is currently the case, riders are being encouraged to wear reflective clothing and helmets.

Over the next six months, the council, the Police and Voi will meet regularly to assess the success of the trial.

Voi e-scooters currently operate in Corby, Burton Latimer, Kettering, Wellingborough, Rushden and Higham Ferrers.
