Final budget for 2025-2026 approved by North Northamptonshire Council

Final budget proposals for North Northamptonshire Council for the next financial year were approved at a meeting of the council earlier today.

Draft proposals were initially agreed by the Executive on 19 December, and these were subject to a detailed consultation process and scrutiny before final proposals went before Executive earlier this month.

Overall, the net revenue budget for 2025/2026 is £400.8 million, excluding the Dedicated Schools Grant. This money provides a range of services to residents and businesses across the area including care to vulnerable adults and children, education, the disposal and collection of waste, highways maintenance, economic development, housing and support for those who are homeless.

A commitment to maintain vital service provision has seen the council invest an additional £51.8 million into services, including £23.7 million into adult social care and £6.2 million into children's services to protect the most vulnerable in our communities and address growing demand for these vital services.

These pressures are, in part, offset by savings, efficiencies and further income of £26.3 million. Taken together with an improvement in funding expected from business rates, Council Tax and government grants the council has been able to set a balanced budget for 2025/2026.

The council also has a programme of capital investment totalling £208.5m over the four-year period 2025-2029 across a number of schemes including investing over £59.3m into highways, £36.6m for continued investment into housing stock, £29.4m for investment into schools, £8.1m to support facilities for those with disabilities, £6.3m in improving digital infrastructure and £2.6m for electrical vehicle infrastructure.

East Carlton Countryside Park awarded country park status

East Carlton Countryside Park has been awarded accredited country park status by Natural England.

The park, run by North Northamptonshire Council, has shown that it offers high quality visitor facilities and services to over 400,000 visitors annually. With its well maintained, accessible and welcoming green spaces, the park has successfully met Natural England's accreditation criteria.

Located near Corby and spanning 102 acres of park and woodland, East Carlton Countryside Park has become a key destination for families, walking groups and nature lovers.

The park is free to enter and offers a wide range of attractions, including a café, woodland shop, large adventure play area, scenic trails and the popular Love Exploring Dinosaur Safari Trail.

Proceeds from the woodland shop support the park's conservation efforts, including a vibrant volunteer programme.

The park has received the coveted Green Flag Award for four consecutive years since 2021. This recognises the hard work and dedication of our Country Parks and Woodlands Team and The Friends of East Carlton Country Park who maintain the park to such a high standard.

2025 election campaign for the UK Youth Parliament

The council, in collaboration with <u>Clubs for Young People Northamptonshire</u>, has launched a campaign to elect two Members of <u>UK Youth Parliament</u> (MYPs).

The election is now open for young people aged 11 to 18 and resident in North Northamptonshire.

The elected individuals will represent the views and opinions of young people from North Northamptonshire on the things which really matter to them and make a difference to the lives of young people.

Initially, MYPs elected in 2025 will be in post for just over one year (until 31 March 2026). MYPs will then be elected for a two-year period in line with the national election process. They will be expected to attend Westminster twice yearly when Youth Parliament is sitting.

Young people interested in standing as a candidate are required to submit a manifesto for other young people to vote on. The closing date for manifestos is 24 February 2025.

The two individuals with the most votes will be elected as the North Northamptonshire Members of Youth Parliament.

Discover Northamptonshire gains Local Visitor Economy Partnership accreditation

A joint bid for a Local Visitor Economy Partnership (LVEP) for Northamptonshire has been approved by VisitEngland, paving the way for a far more co-ordinated and strategic approach to promoting the tourism sector.

Local Visitor Economy Partnerships have been introduced as part of the government's response to an independent review of how the nation's visitor economy is co-ordinated and promoted and will have the potential to draw in additional support and funding from Westminster. This new national portfolio of LVEPs will work in collaboration locally, regionally and nationally on shared priorities and targets to support and grow the visitor economy.

As well as achieving a nationally recognised official status, LVEPs will provide strong leadership and management of their destinations. Working collaboratively with the public and private sector, they will help to shape and deliver national strategy and activities to promote sustainable growth.

The new partnership for Northamptonshire, which has been approved by a panel involving VisitEngland and the Department for Culture, Media and Sport, will ensure that the greatest benefits are achieved for Northamptonshire's visitor economy.

As an LVEP, the Discover Northamptonshire partnership will have access to resources and guidance from VisitEngland on product distribution, business support and the opportunity to bid for funding and marketing. As part of the LVEP's marketing, local activity is already being aligned with Visit Britain's national 'Starring GREAT Britain' campaign alongside the opportunity to tap into wider campaigns across the country in the future.

An important strand of support will be highlighting available government funding streams as well as developing and providing a 'toolkit' to help the LVEP with bids to those streams.

North Northamptonshire Counci's five-year housing strategy 2025-2030 sets out exactly what the council needs to deliver to meet the current and future housing needs.

While working to support residents to have access to safe, decent and affordable homes, it is also designed to make sure the council meets its statutory obligations in the prevention of homelessness and supporting the changing housing needs of older residents.

The document sets out the council's ambition to meet demand, offer choice, match aspirations and provide a range of housing and tenures that are affordable for those who wish to live, work and visit North Northamptonshire.

Work starts on the first Local Transport Plan (LTP) for North Northamptonshire

Initial work has started on producing the first Local Transport Plan (LTP) for the North Northamptonshire area. It will identify our transport policies and objectives, and link in with our Big50 Future Vision, Corporate Plan and wider council policies for the area.

The production of Local Transport Plan is a statutory requirement of the Transport Act 2000 and Local Transport Act 2008 which require us to set out our plans and policies for transport as well as how we intend to implement them.

The current plan for North Northamptonshire is the Northamptonshire Transportation Plan produced by the former Northamptonshire County Council in 2012. As a unitary council, we want to develop a new plan for North Northamptonshire that reflects local needs.

A draft Baseline Report has been produced which identifies changes that have occurred since 2012 as well as the policies and guidance that will be considered in the development of the Local Transport Plan.

We are therefore seeking your feedback and comments on this draft Baseline Report so that we can progress with developing the plan.

There will be future public consultation and engagement as work progresses over the next 18 months, with the Local Transport Plan programmed for completion and adoption in 2026.

Rural communities - How accessible are your local health and wellbeing services?

Residents living in rural communities across North Northamptonshire are invited to take part in a Rural Health Needs Assessment survey to share their experiences of accessing local health and wellbeing services.

The online survey aims to gather feedback from residents in villages, hamlets, market towns, or less builtup areas, as well as those who feel their community faces challenges often associated with rural living, such as limited transport or fewer local services.

The council is particularly keen to hear from residents who may face additional challenges in accessing services, including older adults, people with disabilities, carers, and those without access to reliable transport or digital services.
