Center Parcs arrives in Borders

First Scots park to be situated 3 miles north of Hawick

Center Parcs, the UK and Ireland's provider of short holiday breaks, has announced it is developing proposals to create its first holiday village in Scotland, just off the A7, north of Hawick.

Proposals are at an early stage and they intend to submit a planning application in 2025. It is expected that the holiday village will boost he local economy, including by job creation. A planning application will be submitted for approximately 700 lodges. The site will offer a range of indoor and outdoor activities, shops, bars, restaurants, an Aqua Sana Forest Spa and the Subtropical Swimming Paradise indoor water park.

Center Parcs plans to undertake an extensive programme of afforestation, carefully cultivating new woodland and delivering significant biodiversity net gain on the site. The company outlined its proposals on November 5th in Hawick, and followed up with presentations to the Hawick and Selkirk Community Councils.

When plans are more advanced, it is expected that Center Parcs will mount a comprehensive presentation in Selkirk, probably at the Victoria Halls.



Around about 40 riders enjoyed the fantastic countryside in the Ettrick Valley as riders made their way via the Haining, Howden, Middlestead, Hartwoodmyres and on to Ettrickbridge. The ride returned to Selkirk on a similar route, apart from joining the Borders Abbey way for a short while. oncern is being expressed about the plans by SPEN (Scottish Power Energy Network) to create a new power line, connecting an electrical substation in Galashiels to a similar one south of Hawick using metal pylons, 50- 61 metres tall. The pylons would take a route going west of Galashiels, and then progressing roughly south across both the Ettrick and Yarrow valleys.

Consultation has started, including public meetings in village halls in the valleys, with residents expressing concern about the effect that these large pylons, planned to be 200-300 metres apart, would have on the valleys, both aesthetically and practically. SPEN's pylon route would connect power generation in Scotland to distribution in England, via new substations, by Galashiels and to the south of Hawick, and a nearly 50 mile route to a point at the Scotland - England border.

At one of the recent consultation meetings, it was revealed that some compensation will be available, and suggestions were invited for how this should be allocated. The most popular suggestion was to use the money to run the Ettrick & Yarrow section of the line underground, although this is estimated to be four times




more expensive. Scottish Power is a subsidiary of Spanish utility firm Iberdrola. An action group has been formed - Ettrick & Yarrow Valleys Pylon Action Group.



he Ancient and Royal Burgh of Selkirk stands above the Ettrick valley and was once part of the ancient Ettrick Forest. Around 1113 AD, King David I granted land in this area to monks from Tiron in Normandy, so that they might build an abbey here. Incidentally, Selkirk Abbey was probably founded in the vicinity of Lindean Church to the north of present-day Selkirk. However, the abbey was short lived and was relocated to Kelso around 1128 when the monks complained to the king that the land at Selkirk was not suitable.

Later, in 1535, the grant of the land containing Selkirk Hill was reaffirmed to the town in recognition of the heroic Souters (Selkirk people) who fought and died at the battle of Flodden in 1513. Since then, the land has remained as part of the Selkirk Common Good - administered and managed by successive local authorities in the interest of the people of Selkirk by whom it is owned. It is now managed by Scottish Borders Council on behalf of the Selkirk community and each of its elected members is a Trustee. In Selkirk, we have elected three elected local Councillors and they form part of an SBC subcommittee, together with a representative of the Selkirk Community Council, to look after the interests of the Common Good - and Selkirk Hill.

The Selkirk Hill management group was established to maintain the boundaries, restore the Hill and conserve its natural environment against various invasive species. Its purpose is also to keep it open, safe and workable for the local community and visitors who wish to use it for recreational purposes, such as those that want to walk and enjoy the area as the place for exercising their dogs. The hill is also a useful educational resource for pupils and students from local schools.

Selkirk Hill (140 acres / 56 hectares) has moor ponds, trees and meadows. The Hill Group endeavours to conserve the natural flora and wildlife habitats as a form of tended heathland by balancing what is present against the requirements of those using the Hill.

In the summer months, Common spotted orchids, Mountain Pansy, Tormentil and Harebell can be found in the meadows and Yellowhammer can be heard singing from the Hawthorn bushes. And very recently, a white (not albino) Blackbird has been seen on the Hill by the warden. The Hill also has two natural wells within its boundaries: the Caulks Well and Currie's Fountain, where a refreshing drink may be had during hot weather. And, last but not least, the use of the Hill is shared with Selkirk Golf Club, who have an active membership looking after an attractive 9-hole course. The next Hill Group meeting is on Wed 5th February, but community members can still report issues or keep in touch via the contacts listed on the Community Council newsletter/website.

riday 8th November was the Selkirk Merchant Company Winter Function in Selkirk Rugby Club, and Moira and Douglas Squance were the choice to receive the Jim Oliver Memorial Award for the Selkirk Personality of the year for 2024. The award is in recognition of over 50 years' service to Selkirk Flute Band, in teaching the flute to youngsters in the town and running the band over the years.

Selkirk Flute band play a big part in Selkirk Common Riding, be it playing on Appointment Night or playing as the Senior Burgh Officer Cries the Burley on the Nicht Afore the Morn. On Common Riding morning the band parades round the town from 4am, visiting the Provost's house before collecting the Royal Burgh Standard Bearer and marching to the West Port in time for the First Drum at 6am. There is something special about being wakened by the Flute band marching past your house on Common Riding morn. The Flute band also plays at various other events throughout the year, including Scott's Selkirk and the Yarrow Show.

In the early 1970's an appeal by the Town Council for new members to learn the flute was made, as the band was down to about six elderly players. Jimmy (Cookie) Brown volunteered his three daughters Elaine, Moira, and Anne, who were taught by the band master John Watson. In 1974 Moira married Dougie Squance, who joined the band as side drummer playing beside Colin Watson.

Dougie and Moira had two sons, Steven and Colin, Steven playing flute and Colin playing drums. By this time Moira's younger brothers Dave and Alan had become members as well, while later, nephews Chris, Stuart and Allan, as well as niece Laura, joined the band. The family story does not end there, as daughter in law Lorraine and granddaughter Emma and grandsons Ross and Callum have all joined.

A fter more than 2 years of "vacancy", Selkirk Parish Church (now united with Ashkirk) has a new minister. On Thursday, 12th September, the congregation, welcomed Rev. Dr. Kwame Ahaligah as their new pastor. The church was full. As well as the Selkirk congregation, friends came from the community, and ministers and members from other local churches. The service started with a specially composed song, "How lovely are the feet of those who bring good news", sung by an ad hoc choir of local church members. What followed was an uplifting and positive hour of worship, with both minister and congregation declaring their faith, and their commitment to each other. During the service a young person, a Selkirk member and a representative on the linked congregation of Ettrick & Yarrow, presented symbols - a Bible, a jug of water and a communion cup - to Kwame, as signs of shared ministry. The service closed with a rousing rendition of Great is thy Faithfulness.

The serious part over, everyone moved through to the church hall - 120 folk squeezed in - to celebrate the start of this new chapter in the congregations' life. A glass of fizz and an amazing array of canapés set the mood for the evening. Kwame, along with his wife Annabel and daughter Bethany, were regaled with a humorous song, written for the occasion, with verses about life in Selkirk and the Valleys, such as "Now about the Common Riding, your involvement is a must; you must ken a flag's no' broken when they tell you it's been bussed; we're glad you are right holy, and a man God can endorse; but the thing that really matters - Kwame, can you ride a horse?"

Well, that was all 2 months ago, and many of you will by now have met Kwame in church or along the street. If you haven't met him yet, look for a chance to say "Hello". We know Selkirk folk are already making him, and his family, welcome. Kwame is originally from Ghana, and comes to Selkirk and the Valleys via the USA, London, Leeds, and most recently, as minister in the Lanarkshire village of Law. Quite a journey!

Pantry Thursdays in Philiphaugh

elkirk pantry operates from Philiphaugh Community Centre on a Thursday morning from 11am-ish through to 12:30-ish under the umbrella of Rowlands. Food is ordered from Fareshare on a Wednesday and is delivered on Thursday morning to the Community Centre.

Quantities should always be available of vegetables, fruit, pasta, dried and/or tinned food and meals, egg Cornish pasties or pies, as well as meat, plant based food and bread. There is a charge of £3 to cover the cost of Fareshare food.

Surplus food is either frozen for use the following week at cook club or taken up to Rowlands on West Port for people to help themselves. Around 50 people a week use the service and no referral is required; no questions are asked.
