

Local Events

Event season is upon us with Common Ridings, Rugby Sevens Tournaments and The Jim Clark Rally being some of the main events that local Police will be involved in over the coming months. Whilst I have been involved in many events across the country during my time in the Police, I have never had so many in my calendar as I have for this year. It is generally one of the more enjoyable aspects of being a Police Officer and I am very much looking forward to being involved.

Bike Thefts

Unfortunately, we continue to have reports of bike thefts in the Borders. With high end bikes costing many thousands of pounds, it is an often quick and easy target for thieves. Whilst thefts occur mostly in Tweeddale, the wider Borders is not immune. As with all thefts, some simple security steps can make all the difference.

- Don't leave bikes unattended for any period of time.
- Don't leave bikes on roof or towbar racks.....especially overnight.
- Ask about security when booking accommodation. Do they have secure bike storage?
- Bike locks are a good deterrent however they should not be considered as entirely thief proof.
- If you offer accommodation as a business then speak to customers about how best to secure bikes when staying with you.

Doorstop Parcel Thefts

With the rise of online shopping many people in the Borders receive parcels on a weekly and sometimes daily basis. Most couriers will accept instruction in relation to delivering your parcel if nobody is at home. A parcel visible on a door-step is another easy target for thieves. Please always give instruction to leave with a trusted neighbour, deliver to a work or other address as an alternative to home or deliver on an alternative date rather than leave at your front door if nobody will be at home.

Protecting most vulnerable

In April 2025 Police in the Scottish Borders attended and were involved with around 217 mental health related calls, around 23 missing person enquiries and approximately 109 domestic related incidents.

Police Scotland work in collaboration with key partners to assist the most vulnerable within the communities and to provide support.



Reducing Violence and Anti-Social Behaviour

Assaults

Tackling Serious and Organised Crime

Serious and organised crime enforcement – April 2025

The Scottish Borders CID Proactive Unit executed 30 Drug & General Evidence Warrants during the month of April which resulted in the seizures of significant quantities of Class A and B controlled drugs. Fifteen persons were reported for drug related offences during the month.

The majority of these incidents were within Galashiels and Hawick.

Most of these warrants were in connection with one Serious and Organised Crime Group operating across the Scottish Borders.

Serious and organised crime impacts local communities across the Borders and anyone with information on criminal activity or people living outwith their means are asked to contact Police Scotland on 101, report it at any Police Station or report it anonymously via the Crime Stoppers Charity.

Campaigns

MOTORCYCLE SAFETY CAMPAIGN



April is the start of Police Scotland's annual motorcycle safety campaign.

We are calling on road users to play their part in reducing motorcyclist deaths, after a new report showed there were 269 motorcycle deaths in a nine-year period.

Police Scotland released the findings as we launched a campaign asking drivers to be considerate of vulnerable road users, and for motorcyclists to take action against the risks.

Every year, March to September sees the highest number of motorcyclists killed or seriously injured.

Chief Superintendent Hilary Sloan, head of Road Policing, said:

"Motorcyclists are one of the most vulnerable road users. Cornering left hand bends and overtaking are the most common collision types. If you are speaking to bikers in your community, highlight these risks and talk about motorcycle safety.

"For other drivers, you are more likely to see a motorcyclist on the road from now until autumn so take an extra look for them, especially in rural areas on a weekend.

"Losing control of your bike or failing to look properly can happen in a split second.

"We are running Rider Refinement classes with a road safety charity and doing targeted patrols, speaking with all road users. But we need your help to change behaviours."

Engagement and enforcement activity will happen throughout the spring and summer months using both marked and unmarked police vehicles.
