Protecting most vulnerable

In June 2024 Police in the Scottish Borders attended and were involved with around 169 mental health related calls, around 39 missing person enquiries and approximately 86 domestic related incidents.

Selkirkshire had 15 mental health related calls and 3 missing person enquiries. Due to GDPR and protection of victims/subjects involved, we are unable to share any more specific information in relation to these type of call within this report.

Police Scotland work in collaboration with key partners to assist the most vulnerable within the communities and to provide support.



Reducing Violence and Anti-Social Behaviour

Assaults

On 19/06/2024 report of male assaulted by another male. Kirk Wynd, Selkirk. Male arrested and charged.

On 19/06/2024 report of male being verbally abused on the X95 bus. Male arrested and charged with a section 38 & assault.

On 26/06/2024 report of a male from Buccleuch Road, Selkirk being assaulted by a known male attending his address. Enquiries ongoing.

Anti-Social Behaviour

On 08/06/2024 report of youths having a party & fighting. Beechbank, Selkirk. Police attended, small party, parents in attendance. Parents given suitable advice. No crimes.

On 13/06/2024 report of children riding e-scooters on pathway. Roberts Avenue, Selkirk. Local Police aware & will monitor the situation.

On 24/06/2024 report of a disturbance in Buccleuch Road, Selkirk whereby a male has damaged a vehicle by smashing window. Male was charged and a crime report for vandalism has been submitted.

On 30/06/2024 report of personal documents relating to a child who resides at an address in Clifton Road, Selkirk have been published on social media. A diary appointment has been made to obtain further information.

Vandalism

On 06/06/2024 report of motorcyclist punching wing mirror off car. The Green, Selkirk. Diary appointment made to see reporter.

On 09/06/2024 report of child scraping car with a stone. Ettrickbridge, Selkirk. Caller has got parents details & they have agreed to pay for the damage.

On 19/06/2024 report of male vandalising car. South Bridge Street, Selkirk. Diary appointment made with caller.

On 19/06/2024 report of van side window being smashed with a brick. Buccleuch Road, Selkirk. Diary appointment made with caller.

Reducing Acquisitive Crime

Theft

On 21/06/2024 report of theft from a property in Bridge Street, Selkirk by a male who is presently in HMP Edinburgh. Further enquiries required to establish what if anything has been stolen and by whom.

On 27/06/2024 report of theft of alcohol from Co-op Store, High Street, Selkirk by known male. A diary appointment has been made for officers to attend to speak to witnesses and obtain CCTV.

Improving Road Safety

On 05/06/2024 a driver was issued a fine and penalty points for careless/inconsiderate driving in Selkirk.

Tackling Serious and Organised Crime

Serious and organised crime enforcement – June 2024

The Scottish Borders CID Proactive Unit executed 4 Drug Warrants across the command area during April, three were positive and 4 persons were charged with drug related offences. A number of stop and searches were also conducted in identified hotspot area where drugs misuse was prevalent across the Scottish Borders.

Serious and organised crime impacts local communities across the Borders and anyone with information on criminal activity are asked to contact Police Scotland on 101, report it at any Police Station or report it anonymously via the Crime Stoppers Charity. This information can be on any criminal matter but includes an individuals unexplained financial gain or wealth or persons who are vulnerable in our communities and being targeted or exploited by others for any reason.

Campaigns

Keep Safe Initiative

Primarily aimed at disabled members of the community helping to tackle disability hate crime, Keep Safe is a national network of over 800 safe places (including

shops, libraries, pubs etc.) for anyone who may feel lost, scared or vulnerable when out in the community. <u>About Keep Safe (iammescotland.co.uk)</u>

All Scottish Borders Co-ops have signed up to the scheme with staff training, business packs and store signage being provided.

Rural

Scottish Borders Partnership against Rural Crime (SBPARC) the partnership continues to meet regularly to address local priority rural crime throughout the year.

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CAT Update:

ROAD SAFETY – SBCAT have continued carrying out road checks in numerous locations in the Scottish Borders and have issued 2 traffic tickets for various offences throughout the month.



Throughout June a total of 6 hi-vis speed checks and foot patrols were carried out at schools throughout the Scottish

Borders at dropping off and picking up times. Including schools in Selkirk, Duns and Kelso.

PARKING TICKETS – Officers have been carrying out high visibility enforcement across the Borders and addressing parking concerns there. Advice has been given to drivers and 16 tickets have been issued.

Passing attention was given to Galashiels, Selkirk and Hawick Town Centres and Bridge Street in Kelso were also regularly checked by officers along with other areas.

RURAL ACQUISITIVE CRIME – We continue to carry out static road checks in rural areas at all times of day to deter and detect rural acquisitive crime. 5 static checks were carried out throughout the Scottish Borders this month along with numerous hi-visibility patrols of rural areas.

On Sunday 9th June the quad bikes were deployed Monynut. Several other patrols were made in a 4x4 with nothing to report.

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR – High visibility patrols have continued in targeted areas of the Scottish Borders to address concerns highlighted at these locations. The SBCAT has also been heavily involved in Community events throughout the month. Much of this has involved foot patrols targeting anti-social behaviour.

On Friday 7th and Saturday 8th of June 2024, SBCAT assisted at the Hawick Mare as part of Hawick Common Riding. The Specials Initiative Team also joined them. Over the 2 days, 1 recorded police

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warning was issued and 4 people were escorted out of the area due to their behaviour or alcohol intake. 1 male was arrested for domestic assault and 10 fake driving licenses held by youths were also seized and destroyed. There was a significant amount of friendly engagement with the public and several minor issues resolved before they could escalate.

On 29th June 2024 the SBCAT were tasked with patrols of Galashiels town centre for the Braw Lads Gathering. The Specials Initiative Team also joined us. During the evening several minor issues were dealt with before they could escalate. Later in the night we arrested a male and charged him with assaulting door staff.

Similar high visibility foot patrols are being completed across the Borders with a focus on, Burnfoot and Mansfield in Hawick following reports of Off-Road motorcycles being used and general ASB. When possible foot patrols are being completed at Jedburgh Sheriff Court on court days due to previous reported issues with members of the public. Innerleithen and Peebles have also been given a lot of attention during the evenings.

No youth warning letters were issued during the month of June.

PROTECTING VULNERABLE PEOPLE – Part of the SBCAT role is to trace persons wanted on warrant/missing person/and bail curfew checks. SBCAT have carried out regular checks on multiple individuals who are wanted on warrant. During the past month a total of 6 people were arrested with 3 of them being wanted for domestic offences.

On 9th June SBCAT officers were on mobile patrol in Hawick when they responded to a call regarding youths stealing vapes from Morrison's. The officers attended immediately and stopped the youths at the door of the supermarket. Following a review of the CCTV one of them was reported to the social work for youth offending.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT – SBCAT officers have not taken part in any drugs search warrants in the Scottish Borders. 2 males were searched under the Misuse of Drugs Act with 1 of them being found in possession of a personal amount of cocaine.

In June the SBCAT dealt with a package of cannabis that had been deliberately posted to an incorrect address near Hawick and then collected by an unknown person. Despite only have a fake name they were able to obtain CCTV and established that the package was meant for a youth who was staying nearby in a holiday let. That same day the youth was traced and issued with a recorded police warning.

Special Constables – Recruiting
