I am writing this in a cold kitchen, looking out on a frosty garden. The dog has rushed out to chase a squirrel, and done a 6 foot skid on the ice. He enjoyed it so much that he repeated the performance. It just reminded me that those of us who are older, and with only 2 legs must be a bit more cautious!
We have had a good Autumn in the hall, as the pop-up coffee and chat mornings on the $2^{\text {nd }}$ and $4^{\text {th }}$ Fridays of each month, have been really popular, and we've all enjoyed them. The first one was on September $9^{\text {th }}$. Nigel and Rachel have also been doing the pop-up pub nights, in "The Wander Inn" with table tennis and darts being played as well as the drinks, crips and nuts going down well. Many thanks to you two!
The traditional Harvest Supper on the $8^{\text {th }}$ October was very successful, with about 90 people sitting down to a delicious cold supper, with the usual scrumptious puddings, and music from our new sound system at such a level that it was possible to talk.

On November $12^{\text {th }}$ there was a big bowls tournament in the hall, and a member of one of the other teams suffered a cardiac arrest. The defibrillator from the front of the hall was used, and his life was saved. Also, we had the post code of the hall up in the foyer, which saved time when calling the ambulance. This just shows how important defibrillators are, especially in rural areas. Which is another reason for trying to keep our Welshpool Air Ambulance, as we're so far from a general hospital. Health wise, I feel we are the "poor relation" of Wales in Powys.

By coincidence, the coffee morning on Saturday November $19^{\text {th }}$ had been designated as one to raise funds for the upkeep of our three defibrillators, and it was a marvellous morning, and very well attended, so thanks to everyone for their support. We had seven lovely stalls, with very festive Christmassy things - from flashing decorations, quilted presents, cakes, pictures, toys and John Williams' wooden gifts. As usual the brilliant bacon butties were one of our favourite things. We made a marvellous $£ 580$ which, with $£ 130$ still in the defibrillator kitty, should keep them going in pads and batteries for the next year.
The last thing on the Autumn agenda was the Quiz Night, on December 3 ${ }^{\text {rd }}$, organised by John Bateson and his wife Alison. The quiz was a very interesting and unusual one, and quite hard but I think everyone enjoyed it, and the hall was full of happy people. As we hadn't sold tickets in advance, we had done a "guestimate" of the probable numbers, when doing the snack supper, but we were right at about 60 , and full marks to all who turned out on such a cold nasty night. Full marks too to our "Quizmaster" himself and his wife, who cycled down with equipment for scoring the quiz carried on their backs. Thank you John and Alison!
The last thing is to wish everyone a very jolly and enjoyable Christmas, with lots of presents, and good eating and drinking with families and friends, and we can now look ahead to a Happy 2023.

To access the AED box you have to Telephone 999 or 112 Request an ambulance and tell them your location (see below for post code of the nearest defibrillator) Ambulance control will give you a CODE to open the defibrillator box
Follow the instructions. Paramedics will be on the way to administer the next stage of the resuscitation process.
Due to insurance purposes the Code is not displayed on the boxes

## COMMUNITY COUNCIL

By the time you read this the SID (Speed Indicator Device) should be up and working in Aberhafesp village. This has been purchased by Aberhafesp Community Council. The devise will be moved every few months within two locations in the village. The SID measures the speed of the oncoming vehicles and displays this to the driver. The SID also collects data on the speeds of vehicles which can be passed onto the Police or Go Safe as proof that there is a speed issue through the village. Hopefully the sign will help to deter speeding motorists.
At the last meeting the budget was set for 2023/4, it was agreed to help towards the cost of printing of the newsletter. Many thanks go to Marilyn for her hard work compiling the newsletter, as I am sure you all agree she does a fantastic job.

## COMMUNITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

## Aberhafesp Community Council covers the area of Aberhafesp, Bwlch-y-Fridd, Bethel and Rhyd-y-Felin.

A Community Council is governed by the Local Government Act of 1972. Here in Aberhafesp it consists of seven Councillors who sign a Declaration of Office and work on a voluntary basis for the good of the whole community. They are supported by a clerk who is employed to ensure the correct procedures are enforced and the smooth running of the Council in general.
Meetings are held on a Wednesday evening in the Community centre, and members of the public can attend any meeting, unless otherwise specified.

## Notice of each meeting

is displayed for three clear days giving the date, the time, and the agenda.
They are posted on the notice boards at Bwlch-y-Ffridd, Hillcrest Aberhafesp, the Community Centre and the telephone kiosk in Bethel.

Details of meetings can also be found on the
Community Council Facebook page and the Community Council website You can access the latest County Councillor monthly reports as well as current County planning applications, where you can enter comments to support or object. The decisions made at a meeting and also the attendees are posted on the website within a week of a meeting. The full minutes of meetings are only posted on the website after they have been approved by the Community Council which takes place at the start of the following meeting. For example minutes from a meeting in July would be approved in August, if a meeting was held then.

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## THE GAME CHANGE PROJECT

## FOOD GROWING GARDEN

We recently partnered with Keep Wales Tidy to secure a development package to set up a food growing garden at The Game Change Project (TGCP). The package was funded by Local Places for Nature and provided everything we needed to get started. Before the garden was installed, thanks to Localities Initiative funding, we were able to take two groups of young people, together with staff and volunteers to Cultivate in Newtown where they learned some basic horticultural and cooking skills. Following on from the training our participants got stuck in building raised beds, constructing a green house and laying paths. They were joined by members of MenShed, Newtown who came to lend a hand on Tuesday 27th Sept and really enjoyed working alongside our young people out in the fresh air. Under the guidance of the Keep Wales Tidy team, we completed the installation during the first week in October and planted our first crops. We are now looking forward to our third workshop delivered by Cultivate, this time at our brand-new food growing area at TGCP! This session will give us the knowledge we need to get the most of our plot and also upskill our staff and volunteers to take the project forward. The project will enable us to share food growing and cooking experiences with people of all ages, many of whom would not normally engage in outdoor activities. Our garden will be used by members of the veteran's community and other local groups who would benefit from social and wellbeing activities outdoors. An unexpected success of the project has been that it has made us much more aware of our environmental impact as an organisation. Almost all of our waste is now recycled, composted, or fed to the animals on our farm. Our aim is to become as self-sufficient as possible by using our own resources and wasting nothing!
