COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Aberhafesp Community Council covers the area of Aberhafesp, Bwlch-y-Fridd, Bethel and Rhyd-y-Felin.

A Community Council is governed by the Local Government Act of 1972. Here in Aberhafesp it consists of seven Councillors who sign a Declaration of Office and work on a voluntary basis for the good of the whole community. They are supported by a clerk who is employed to ensure the correct procedures are enforced and the smooth running of the Council in general.

Notice of each meeting is displayed for three clear days giving the date, the time, and the agenda. They are posted on the notice boards at Bwlch-y-Ffridd, Hillcrest Aberhafesp, the Community Centre and the telephone kiosk in Bethel.

You can access the latest *County Councillor monthly reports* as well as current *County planning applications*, where you can enter comments to support or object.

The minutes of meetings are only posted on the website after they have been approved by the Community Council which takes place at the start of the following meeting. For example minutes from a meeting in July would be approved in August, if a meeting was held then.

Meetings are held on a Wednesday evening in the Community centre, (no longer on Zoom), and members of the public can attend any meeting, unless otherwise specified.

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VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

MONTGOMERYSHIRE AND RADNOR BRANCH OF THE RSPCA NEED YOUR HELP!

The Montgomeryshire and Radnor Branch of the RSPCA is a registered charity, number 506701 in its own right. It is one of the many regional branches of RSPCA throughout Wales and England. We are closely affiliated with the National RSPCA body and share their aims.

Montgomeryshire and Radnor is a small branch of dedicated trustees all of whom give their time voluntarily. No member receives any payment except for occasional expenses such as telephone and car usage.

The money we raise is used exclusively to help pets in our local area. Currently our main activity is helping people on low incomes cover the cost of veterinary care for their pets. The cost of some veterinary treatment can be quite a challenge for people on lower incomes. We feel the welfare of all animals is of the highest priority and the financial assistance we give should ensure that no animal suffers unnecessarily from a treatable health problem.

We usually pay part of the cost. Not only is this financial assistance incredibly important for the welfare of the animal but also critically important for the well- being of the owner.

We encourage people to neuter their pets to avoid the expense and issues with unwanted litters. Neutering can also prevent certain illnesses in later life for the animal, we also help to cover the cost of neutering for those on lower incomes.

We visit schools and community groups when possible to speak about the latest research in animal welfare, thereby preventing animals suffering as a result of ignorance or thoughtlessness on the part of owners and owners to be.

We are seeking new trustees and volunteers as many of our longstanding members have retired. Without replacements we are in serious danger of having to close the branch and the vital support we give to local people will no longer be available.

We meet approximately 6 times per year at a time and place to suit those involved, you are not obliged to attend all meetings and you can contribute as much or as little as you feel able to.



CREMATORIUM APPLICATION

The residents of Aberhafesp Village were recently asked if they wanted to participate in a petition to ask that the Crematorium application (near Caersws) be "called in" for further consideration by Welsh Government.

The petition was raised because Powys County Council Planning Committee did not discuss the effect of the new traffic generated by the development on the villages that are on the access routes.

With 60 signatures it has been forwarded to the planning departments at the Welsh Assembly Government and Powys County Council.

The petition gave options as follows:

- a. The proposed Crematorium only be approved if Aberhafesp Community Council's recommendation that a pedestrian walkway through Aberhafesp should be provided is accepted.
- b. The proposed Crematorium should be relocated to a place that did not involve increased traffic through small villages by drivers unfamiliar with the roads.

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
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CLOSURE OF BETHAL CHAPEL





In 1872, a schoolroom and place of worship accompanied by cello and flute, was erected in Bethel, near Aberhafesp, to accommodate growth of population in the district, and growth in spiritual life. It was a branch of Bwlchyffridd Congregational Church, where a day school had been held in the new chapel from 1802 and where I was ordained in 1976.

Following the 1904 revival, the church at Bethel was pulled down in order to rebuild a new, larger church. They received a generous donation from Lord Joicey, former Northumberland coal mine owner who had acquired Gregynog Hall in 1898, and provided employment for many, and owned much of the land in the area at that time.

From these country churches, including Llanwnog Union of Welsh Independents, the Gospel extended into the wider communities and further afield, including missionaries sent out to Madagascar.

On Sunday June 27th, we recalled the services, youth work and musicals, the renowned eisteddfodau talent celebrated in the district and shared with the Congregational Federation's N.Wales and N.W. Midlands area celebrations. Some members joined us in Llanidloes' hosting of the URC's Provincial Day celebrations in 1994. Bethel Chapel has not had a minister of its own for many years, but continued to hold services with visiting preachers until COVID-19. Today we recalled the members, deacons, ministers, who have served the church here and contributed in so many ways to the spiritual life, educational development and witness in this area.

Members are now scattered at home and abroad by marriage, employment; the farming community has changed, and Gregynog is no longer a big employer. Those who remain are mobile and able to participate and contribute elsewhere, as they have always shared in the past.

The witness of those churched here, began long before their building was erected and will continue long after the doors to the building have closed. A pilgrim people, may they continue to bless and be blessed.

(Yes, we observed social distancing and wore masks throughout, but having eaten the fantastic tea served in distanced pews, they remained around our necks when someone called photo! I hope everyone else also held their breath!)
