COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Aberhafesp Community Council covers the area of Aberhafesp, Bwlch-y-Fridd, Bethel and Rhyd-y-Felin.

A Community Council is governed by the Local Government Act of 1972. Here in Aberhafesp it consists of seven Councillors who sign a Declaration of Office and work on a voluntary basis for the good of the whole community. They are supported by a clerk who is employed to ensure the correct procedures are enforced and the smooth running of the Council in general.

Meetings are held on a **Wednesday evening in the Community centre,** and members of the public can attend any meeting, unless otherwise specified.

Notice of each meeting is displayed for three clear days giving the date, the time, and the agenda. They are posted on the notice boards at Bwlch-y-Ffridd, Hillcrest Aberhafesp, the Community Centre and the telephone kiosk in Bethel.

You can access the latest *County Councillor monthly reports* as well as current *County planning applications*, where you can enter comments to support or object.

The minutes of meetings are only posted on the website after they have been approved by the Community Council which takes place at the start of the following meeting. For example minutes from a meeting in July would be approved in August, if a meeting was held then.

A BRIDGE A HOUSE AND A CHURCH

Half a mile west of Aberhafesp, on the Llanwnog road, you cross a rather innocuous looking stone bridge over the Nant Rhyd-ros-lan at Rhydlydan. Its parapet, made up of regular shaped stone blocks, is relatively recent. However, if you (carefully!) lean over the parapet you will see a graceful single arch spanning the stream. This dates back exactly 190 years to 1831 and was designed by a gentleman named Thomas Penson. Only three years earlier, he had also designed what is now The Old Rectory in the village, an elegant Regency villa in a striking location.

Penson was born in 1790 at Wrexham and was a member of a significant local dynasty of architects. His father was County Surveyor for Flintshire and two of his sons also followed him into the profession. Penson himself occupied the posts of County Surveyor for Montgomeryshire and Denbighshire as well as being Surveyor for the Montgomeryshire Turnpike Trust. In hindsight, Penson can be seen as an innovative and imaginative architect who left his mark very clearly on the buildings of mid and north-east Wales. His architectural legacy in Montgomeryshire is a particularly rich one. Public buildings he designed include the County Gaol in Montgomery, workhouses in Llanfyllin and Caersws (Plas Maldwyn) and, perhaps his most impressive, the old Flannel Exchange in Newtown (now the Regent Cinema). To the extent that Penson is remembered today, however, it is as a designer and builder of bridges. By one estimate he was responsible for as many as 62 bridges in Montgomeryshire alone. Early in his career he concentrated on elegant and strongly built stone bridges. Locally, as well as Rhydlydan, these include Caersws Bridge, Wig Bridge just off the Caersws-Trefeglwys road, Long Bridge, Short Bridge and Felindre Bridge in Llanidloes, and perhaps the best knows, Newtown Long Bridge. This three-arched stone bridge was built in 1826/7 and replaced a dilapidated wooden one nearby. To save money however it was narrower than recommended by Penson. His concern proved justified when in 1857 a lady pedestrian was crushed to death by a carriage. As a result, the existing footpaths supported by iron arches were added.

It was his work on churches however which allowed Penson to express himself to greatest effect. In the mid 1840s for example he was responsible for rebuilding St. Agatha's in Llanymynech – for which he chose a striking use of the popular Neo-Norman or Romanesque style – as well as Christ Church in Welshpool, best known for its innovative use of terracotta for the arches and ceiling vaulting. Around the same time, Penson was also busy designing a new church for Newtown. St. Mary's was badly sited and subject to flooding and had become too small for a growing industrial town. The result – St David's in New Road – was a large, light and powerful-looking church built with buff bricks in the Victorian Gothic style. Sadly of course, it has remained empty since 2006.

Papers in the Vaynor estate archive (now in Powys Archives) indicate that towards the very end of his career – and life – Penson returned to Aberhafesp to design a substantial rebuild of St Gwynog's church. The old building had only a single 'chamber' with a low west tower surmounted by a wooden belfry. Penson's design is generally considered to be of good quality and to show real sensitivity in its execution. He refaced the old walls, added a chancel and crowned the tower with mock battlements. The church was also embellished with some beautiful windows, particularly the unusual straight-headed ones in the nave. Perhaps Penson's masterstroke however was to retain and carefully repair the lovely early 15th century roof.

Thomas Penson died suddenly on 20th May 1859. He deserves, I think, to be better remembered than he is, so give him a thought the next time you pass through the village. *Peter Francis*.
