#### Serves 4

1Lb of lamb mince £4

1 Large onion £0.09

1 Aubergine £0.80

2 Cloves of garlic £0.16

1 Tin of chopped tomatoes £0.28

2 Potatoes £0.25

2 Packets of cheese sauce £1.60

1 Cube of lamb/chicken stock £0.19

½ teaspoon of ground coriander

½ teaspoon of ground cumin

½ teaspoon sage

½ teaspoon of paprika

½ teaspoon of ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon oregano

½ teaspoon parsley

- Boil potatoes until soft enough to slice
- Chop and fry onion and garlic in spare pan
- Fry mince, add to onion and garlic and mix with tin of tomatoes.
- Dissolve stock cube in a quarter pint of boiling water and then add herbs/spices. When mixed at to main mixture.
- Slice and fry aubergine enough to soften and spoon your main mixture into a large casserole dish adding layers of aubergine and sliced potatoes.
- Make sure you leave enough mixture to add 2 cheese sauce mixes to finish.
- Cook for around 30 minutes at 180/gas 4 until bubbling at edges
- Serve with garlic bread, salad or whatever you would like!

## THE CRUELLEST MILES Gay and Laney Salisbury

This is a true story of how men and husky dogs raced across Alaska to deliver Diphtheria Serum to a village that was isolated. It was 1925 in Nome Alaska which is 2 degrees below the Arctic Circle. Winter had arrived which meant that the sea had frozen and planes couldn't fly in the blizzard conditions. It was an exceptionally bad winter, the worst for 20 years.

The town's GP Dr Curtis Welch noticed that the town's supply of diphtheria serum was out of date and ordered more. The new shipment did not arrive before winter set in. There was illness among the local native population and among the town's children. He at first thought it was tonsillitis. He then suspected diphtheria. He had no laboratory facilities for testing. As fresh supplies of the serum had failed to arrive he tried the out of date serum on a young boy, but to no avail, and he unfortunately died. Dr Welch had a meeting with the Mayor and Town Council and the town was put into quarantine on 21st January. A telegram was sent, asking for help.

This story is primarily about the race to get the diphtheria serum to Nome from Nenana. There was serum in Anchorage which was 1,500 miles away.

This could go by train to Nenana, but no further. As the weather was so bad it was not safe for planes to fly. This was early in the era of flight. The only way was to use the dog sledges.

The serum was wrapped in glass vials, then padded quilts, and finally a metallic cylinder weighing a little more than 20 pounds.

The distance between Nenana to Nome was 674 miles. Dr Welch estimated that the serum would only last six days under these very harsh travelling conditions. The serum was taken from the train and given to the first dog musher who set out immediately This was 'Wild Bill' Shannon with his lead dog Blackie. It was 9pm and the temperature was minus 50F degrees.

There where 20 mushers and over 120 dogs involved in the race to Nome. The weather was often minus 50F degrees, and occasionally minus 60F degrees. The blizzard conditions meant snow drifts. On one occasion the cylinder fell into a snow drift and the musher suffered frostbite as he used his hands, without gloves, to find the cylinder. The book details the various dogs and their personalities and their mushers and their personalities. There was a very close bond between the two. The dogs on occasions would not follow instructions realising that the way was too dangerous. The mushers would allow the dog to choose the safer way.

After 5 and half days of an incredible journey the serum arrived at 5.30am 1st February. Gunner Kaasen with Balto as the lead dog arrived in Nome. By noon the serum was at the right temperature so that treatment could begin. The dog Balto travelled the last 53 miles. The dog that travelled the longest was Togo with his musher Leonhard Seppala 91 miles. There is a statue of Balto in Central Park, New York. Many thought that Togo should have been the statue in Central Park as he had travelled nearly double the miles of all the other dogs. A very good read.



### Local group wins grant from Scottish Government

Lairg and District Learning Centre have been awarded a grant of £183,016 through the Scottish Government's Climate Challenge Fund (CCF).

The CCF is a Scottish Government grant programme, managed and administered by Keep Scotland Beautiful. It provides funding and support for community groups to help tackle climate change by running projects that reduce local carbon emissions.

The project, "Seasons of Change", will run for two years and begin on April 1st 2020. It will to help Sutherland and Ross-shire reduce waste and increase levels of local food growing and cooking. Project activities will include a community tool library and workshops to repair and upcycled wood and textiles saved from landfill, in addition to sessions covering cooking and growing seasonal produce.

Rhionna Mackay, Manager of Lairg and District Learning Centre, said "We're delighted to have been awarded a grant which will enable us to build upon the success of previous CCF funded projects and to expand into new and exciting areas. Although the Learning Centre is closed just now because of the coronavirus, the team are working hard at home to build a wide range of classes and workshops for the community, which will be launched as and when they can safely be attended. We are also going to be offering Carbon Literacy Training workshops, accredited by the award winning Carbon Literacy Project, for individuals and communities in Sutherland and Ross-Shire. With restrictions likely for some time, we will aim to prepare a series of courses which can be delivered remotely. These will have the dual benefit of providing constructive activities for people who may be confined to their homes, while also reducing our local carbon footprint."

<u>Fiona Cunningham</u> at Keep Scotland Beautiful said, "We congratulate Lairg and District Learning Centre for securing funding from the Scottish Government's Climate Challenge Fund and encourage the local community to take advantage of support available through the "Seasons of Change" project. We look forward to supporting the team as they implement their project and empowering many more communities to take action on climate change. We see it as part of our work to make Scotland clean, green and sustainable."
