# Recipe of the week

Make a fresh and colourful Greek salad in no time. It's a great summer dish to serve with grilled meats at a barbecue, or on its own as a veggie main.

#### Ingredients

- 4 large vine tomatoes, cut into irregular wedges
- 1 cucumber, peeled, deseeded, then roughly chopped
- ½ a red onion thinly sliced
- 16 Kalamata olives
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 85g feta cheese, cut into chunks (barrel matured feta is the best)
   4 tbsp Greek extra virgin olive oil

#### Method:

#### STEP 1

Place 4 large vine tomatoes, cut into wedges, 1 peeled, deseeded and chopped cucumber, ½ a thinly sliced red onion, 16 Kalamata olives, 1 tsp dried oregano, 85g feta cheese chunks and 4 tbsp Greek extra virgin olive oil in a large bowl.

#### STEP 2

Lightly season, then serve with crusty bread to mop up all of the juices.

July Snippet: Sir Arthur Conan Doyle died on the 7th July 1930.

#### Sir Arthur Conan Doyle

Arthur Conan Doyle was born in Edinburgh, on the 22nd May, 1859. He was a British writer and physician. He created the character Sherlock Holmes in 1887 for *A Study in Scarlet*, the first of four novels.

Fifty-six short stories about Holmes and Dr Watson, and the Adventures of Sherlock Holmes were published in The Stand Magazine, from 1891 to 1893, giving him immediate fame. The Sherlock Holmes stories are considered milestones in the field of crime fiction.



#### The Lost World

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle wrote the book *The Lost World* in 1912 when dinosaurs were not known by the general population. This book inspired a lot of novels and movies. Today, dinosaurs are very popular toys for young children.

In 1925, one of Doyle's friends, Percy Harrison Fawcett, who was an explorer, along with his eldest son Jack, disappeared during an expedition to find an ancient lost city which he believed existed in the jungles of Brazil.

In 1896 Doyle became a war correspondent in the Sudan. He also served as a doctor in the 1899-1902 Boer War in South Africa. He was knighted in 1902 for his service in that war. He wrote a history of the Boer War and as a war correspondent he later wrote an account of the British campaign in France and Flanders.

He volunteered as a surgeon on a whaling ship and it was this experience which inspired him to write one of his stories: *The Captain of the Polestar*.

Conan Doyle was also an enthusiastic investigator. One of his investigations which gained much popularity was when he successfully got Oscar Slater released from prison who was wrongly convicted of the murder of an 82-year-old woman In 1927.

The Sherlock Holmes stories were published as "The Case-Book of Sherlock Holmes."

Doyle was married twice and died in Crowborough, Sussex in 1930.

This is a global promotion which helps everyone to focus on plastic use and reduce our reliance on, particularly, single use plastic. The last year has been truly difficult with all the Covid protection gear that we've needed. Supermarkets and shops have had to revert to using more packaging to keep food from being handled and breathed upon. And, sadly even our recycling opportunities, such as our crisp packet collections had to stop.

So, July is a time to re-focus and re-group. What can we all do to reduce our plastic use? Please do share your ideas on our



Facebook Group (https://www.facebook.com/groups/PlanetSutherland). As a starting point, we've found that it's helpful to review different rooms and aspects of our lives:

Kitchen fixes: home baking, home growing and making or refilling cleaning products.

Bathroom: using shampoo bars, and making or refilling cleaning products, buying non plastic wrapped eco friendly toilet roll.

Garden: reuse compost bags to line walkways, make your own compost, pass on plant pots in the buy swap & sell groups or contact us for collection.

Kids: toy sharing and reviewing all the plastic in kid's lives, from fruity juices and sweeties to plastic toys, packaging and knick knacks.

Tech: make good use of all the small electrical recycling places in our recycling centre or pink bins or look at laptop reboot programmes.

But with so much potential, it's easy to get overwhelmed. So please do join us where we'll focus on one topic each week. These small changes have a big impact when we all work together.

#### A Very Hungry Caterpillar - Article by Sarah Forrest

During a recent clear out we came across one of our daughter's favourite childhood books, Eric Carle's "A Very Hungry Caterpillar". The story opens with a tiny egg alone on a leaf in the moonlight. Then a small caterpillar emerges and begins eating its way through every child's dream food. Finally, it is no longer ravenously hungry and no longer small. The big fat caterpillar builds a cocoon around himself and emerges as a beautiful butterfly. Why a cocoon and not a chrysalis? The scientific explanation is that there's a rare genus, a Parnassian, that pupates in a cocoon. I prefer Carle's reasoning, "when I was a small boy, my father would say, Eric, come out of your cocoon. He meant I should open up and be receptive to the world around me. And so, poetry won over science!"



Carle, who died in May this year aged 91, wrote and illustrated more than 40 children's books, writing about brown bears, quiet crickets, grouchy ladybirds, and very busy spiders. He was introduced to the natural world by his father who took him on long nature walks, "When I was a small child, as far back as I can remember, he would take me by the hand and we would go out in nature. And he would show me worms and bugs and bees and ants and explain their lives to me." (New York Times)

Worms, bugs, bees, ants, caterpillars and butterflies. Our garden is teeming with them. Taking a leaf from Carle's love of nature and inspired by The Learning Centre's climate change project, "Seasons of Change", we have tried really hard to create a wonderful wildlife and insect friendly garden. Instead of buying decking for the side of our new pond, we lay down old birch logs, a perfect hotel for bugs. We've encouraged the foxgloves and clover, and planted comfrey and buddleia to encourage bees and other pollinators, providing them with the nectar and pollen they need to thrive.

We were rewarded by the first dragonfly visit this week, shimmering azure wings and fast flight. Pond skaters dart about all day and in the evening the swallows dive down catching midges and



other insects as they gather above the pond, joined later by bats as dusk falls. We learnt how to create our garden with help from Sarah Whealing from Corry Croft Nursery in Rogart. Her wonderful short film, made during lockdown, is a visual treat and will give you a great insight into how to create a biodiverse garden. <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ypHdlg7H">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ypHdlg7H</a> bY&t=35s
