Winterfest is back!!!

Lairg's annual 'Winterfest 2022' is taking place once again on Saturday 3rd December.

Now in its sixth year, (after a 2-year hiatus due to the pandemic) 'Winterfest' is a wonderful family day out that will get everyone into the Christmas spirit!

The day will kick off at 12pm with Church bells ringing to open the Festive Parade – come and see the real reindeer from Cairngorm Reindeer Centre pulling Santa's sleigh along the Main Street to the Community Centre (where the rest of the activities are based).

Ferrycroft Consultation

LDCI has had a very good response to our community consultation on the development of the playpark at Ferrycroft, and the closure and potential community asset transfer of the playpark at Ord Place.

There was overwhelming support (over 90% in both cases) for a new, all-abilities playpark at Ferrycroft, and for investigating a community asset transfer of the Ord Place site. Many people felt that developing an improved and upgraded playpark at Ferrycroft would complement the Visitor Centre, and thus attract tourists as well. Overall, the responses showed a strong public desire to provide modern play and recreation facilities in Lairg for children of all ages and abilities, including older children and young people.

Although there was regret that Ord Place would have to cease to be a playpark if Ferrycroft was to be developed, there were many suggestions as to what might replace it, including picnic tables, a wildlife garden, a community vegetable and herb garden, gym equipment, and so on.

LDCI will now be working with parents, carers and the Community Council, with the support

and advice of Highland Council, to take the Ferrycroft project forward. We'll be contacting other local community groups who have managed successful playpark projects, to learn from their experience and best practice, and identifying possible sources of funding. We'll also be following up a community asset transfer of the Ord Place site, provided of course that it proves to be sustainable and financially viable.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to respond to the consultation, and for giving us so many comments and ideas.



8th November 1847, first baby born with the aid of anaesthesia.

Sir James Young Simpson



Born 7th June 1811 - Died 6th May 1870

Sir James Young Simpson delivered the first child to be born with the aid of anaesthesia.

Born in Bathgate near Edinburgh, Scotland, he trained as an Obstetrician becoming Professor of Midwifery in the University of Edinburgh. He was the first to use ether in obstetric practice in the UK on the 19th January 1847.

Simpson, together with his assistants Matthew Duncan and George Keith, was in the habit of experimenting with chemicals in his dining room to see whether they had any anaesthetic effect. On the evening of 4 November 1847, they tried chloroform, a substance they had previously ignored as unpromising.

He first introduced chloroform on November 8, 1847, when delivering a child to Wilhelmina Carstairs.

In 1848, all three conferred with John Snow, possibly at the urging of Prince Albert who expressed interest in obtaining anesthesia for his wife, Queen Victoria. In keeping with most families of her time, Victoria and Albert had many children, nine in all.

He was harshly attacked on moral rather than theological grounds for its use in relieving the pain of childbirth and it was not until Dr. John Snow administered chloroform to Queen Victoria for the birth of her 8th child (Prince Leopold) that the seal of respectability was set on the relief of pain in childbirth by anaesthetic drugs.

Simpson died at the age of 58 and the day of his funeral was declared a day of holiday in Scotland, with more than 100,000 people lining the streets of Edinburgh to see the funeral cortege pass by on its way to the family grave at Warriston Cemetery.
