Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

The aims of the company include:

- 1. To manage community land and associated assets for the benefits of the community of Lairg and district, and the public at large.
- 2. To provide, or assist in providing, recreational facilities and/or organising recreational activities to improve the conditions of life of the community and following principles of sustainable development.
- 3. To advance community development, including urban and rural regeneration.
- 4. To advance the education of the community about its environment, culture, heritage and history.
- 5. To advance environmental protection or improvement including preservation and conservation of the natural environment, the promotion of sustainable development, the maintenance , improvement or provision of environmental amenities for the community and/or the preservation of buildings or sites of architectural, historic or other importance to the community.

Significant activities

Lairg & District Community Initiatives (LDCI) has continued to receive funding from E.ON Rosehall Community Fund and SSE Achany Community Fund for the Development Officer post.

Our Development Officer continues to be employed on a part time subcontracted basis from the Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust. This arrangement continues to be very beneficial for the LDCI as we are able to utilise the vast experience and knowledge of the bigger trust and its manager and directors.

We have also received further funding from various other organisations, trusts and foundations, as well as donations and sponsorship which has allowed us to continue with our existing projects as well as starting new ones.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities The projects the LDCI are working on

Lairg Community Housing Development

This project is now complete. Eight new houses on 'Sutherland Arms Way' are the result of a partnership project between Lairg & District Community Initiatives (LDCI) and Albyn Housing Society. The houses are the first investment in social housing in Lairg since the 'Glenburn' houses were constructed in the mid-1990s.

The houses are built on land that was formerly the site of the Sutherland Arms Hotel. The hotel was demolished in 2007 and the site lay empty for many years. LDCI purchased the land in February 2018 - bringing it into community ownership.

In the years that followed LDCI worked with Albyn Housing Society through the complexities of the planning process, sourcing funding and the setback of the Covid 19 pandemic. The aim of the project was to create affordable, accessible housing that would allow people with health conditions or higher levels of support needs to live independently in their own community instead of being forced to move away for adequate housing.

The project has attracted the highest level of public sector funding seen in Lairg for a very long time. The bulk of the total project cost of £2.3 million (which was managed by Albyn Housing and therefore does not come under these accounts) came from the Scottish Government, who made £1.3 million available from the More Homes Division. Albyn Housing Society contributed £600,000, and Highland Council contributed £200,000 from its Infrastructure fund, and a further £200,000 from the City Region Deal funding.

LDCI donated the land on which the houses stand, and the surrounding parking and access areas at an indicative value of £90,000. The financial leverage this donation has achieved is therefore very substantial. The rest of the Sutherland Arms site remains with LDCI, and therefore in community ownership.

The houses were finished ahead of schedule and Compass Building & Construction Services handed them over to Albyn Housing Association in March 2024.

All eight houses are now occupied with local people. This has been an amazing achievement for LDCI, to deliver the first social housing in Lairg for over 30 years.

LDCI is very grateful to all the funders mentioned above, to Albyn Housing Society, Compass Building & Construction Services and to everyone who has contributed to the project over the years, including employees, contractors and previous board members who were involved in the early stages.

We still own the rest of the Sutherland Arms site. We have allowed two community groups to build shelters to keep and store their items there, saving them money on rent. We will continue to look after this site and look at how we can maintain and improve the area for the community.

Community Magazine

Report of the Trustees
for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

The Lairg Magazine continues to be a very popular asset to the community with over 160 hard copies being delivered, some through the local shops and some that are hand delivered by volunteers. We are working with the Lairg & District Learning Centre who now prepare and publish it for us. We retain editorial rights, and we publish it on our website and on our social media channels as well as emailing it to all of our members. The number of pages has grown over time with so many of the local groups and the Lairg Primary School submitting articles. We were unsuccessful with an application to Lairg Windfarm to fund the magazine, so we have been using unrestricted funds along with donations we have received. We feel the magazine is a very important project for our older members of the community who are not on the internet and are isolated.

Ferrycroft Playpark

LDCI is continuing to work towards the installation of a new playpark at the Ferrycroft Visitor Centre in Lairg. Since 2021 we have been working in partnership with the Highland Council, the Lairg Community Council and a group of local parents who were keen to address the lack of play facilities for children in the area. A community consultation held by LDCI showed widespread support for the creation of a new playpark on the site. We have already secured some of the funds needed to deliver this project with £10,000 having been received from the Westminster Foundation. The remaining balance (from the Highland Council Community Regeneration Fund, SSE Renewables (Achany Community Fund) & RWE Rosehall Community Benefit Fund, and Lairg Community Windfarm Fund) has been committed (but the funds have not been received in our account as at 31.03.2024.) LDCI will also pledge an additional £6516 through community fundraising towards the total project cost.

Helping Hands Fund

We have received three years funding from The Robertson Trust for this project to continue. Residents within the Lairg community who are struggling with the cost of living can apply to this fund annually, to receive £250 towards heating costs, providing they are in recent of a benefit. The project is administered by Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust (KoSDT) on our behalf.

Food Larder

We continue to deliver weekly parcels from our Food Larder to those who have asked us for help. Our larder supports around 50 people locally who find themselves struggling with the cost of living. We are continuing to work with CFine and Fairtrade to deliver this project by redistributing supermarket surplus products. The funding from The Robertson Trust (mentioned above) also goes towards helping us to purchase stock the larder for the next three years. We have successfully worked with our two local shops this year to provide food vouchers for those residents we support through the larder. We have great support from the Church of Scotland who give us food parcels on a regular basis, and the chemist very kindly have a donation box which is always full to the brim. We receive referrals for this project from East Sutherland Citizens Advice Bureaux, Social Services and other agencies that ask us to help. We also work closely with the Lairg Learning Centre where we leave stocked shelves - people can drop in to pick-up stock when it suits them - this ties in with the Centre's Highland Waste Management Project to reduce the amount of waste that ends up in land fill. Over the past year funding has also been received from the Highland Council Ward Discretionary Fund to deliver the food larder.

Winterfest

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

Winterfest is our annual family friendly Christmas festival which involves a reindeer parade, Christmas market, funfair, café, music, children's entertainment and arts and craft activities. Last year was a huge success, we worked in partnership with the Lairg Learning Centre, the Community Hall, the Crofters Show, the Primary School, and the local Fire Brigade to deliver a wonderful day. We are so well supported by the community on this day and could not do it without all the volunteers who give up their time to support us. I also have to mention that there are number of local estate landowners and businesses that support us with generous sponsorship and with gifts for our raffle. This has meant that we have not applied for any funding for this event from local Wind Farm Funds now for over six years.

Lunch Club

We are continuing to run the Lunch Club for elderly members of the community. We work with the NHS Highland and the Highland Council to provide a hot meal once a week at Thursday lunch time. The club runs during school term time and the meals are supplied by the Lairg Primary School. The original transport was supplied by The Highland Council, but unfortunately that is no longer the case, and we had to get funding for the bus from Lairg Windfarm farm. The club has a team of volunteers who work on a four weekly rota to help collect and serve the meals in the Community Hall. The club has had two outings this year the first was a Christmas dinner to The Pier restaurant, and the second was a summer lunch at The Achness Hotel.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

At the balance sheet date there are total reserves of £260,460 (2023 - £219,161) of which £149,723 (2023 - £155,123) represents unrestricted funds.

Cash at bank is £135,750 of which £37,224 is unrestricted (2023 - £98,922).

Reserves policy

The directors regularly review the future financial requirements of the company. They have a policy whereby the unrestricted funds held should be at least six months of net general expenditure.

FUTURE PLANS

I am confident that we have set the LDCI on the right road and that we will continue to work for the benefit of the whole community.

This is my last year in the chair and I have really enjoyed my five years. I will be stepping down at the next AGM.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The governing documents of the charity are the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company, which was incorporated on 30th April 2002 as a company limited by guarantee of £1 per member.

The names of the persons who served as directors during the year and up to the date of this report are as listed.

The charitable company obtains funding and assistance from various sources, including the Highland Council, Highland & Islands Enterprise, Foundation Scotland, and by its own fund raising.

Its aim in recruiting new directors is to have as broad a skill base as possible. This means that much of the day-to-day administration can be done by a director.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES 1.

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 5% on cost

Office equipment - 33% on cost and 25% on cost

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
