Chairman's Report For the year ended 31 March 2017

Once again, the past year has been successful with Lairg and District Community Initiatives delivering projects to improve social cohesion, community wellbeing and improved amenities. Our activity has led to a more vibrant community, actively engaging its local people through volunteering work and inviting their say in shaping development. This has helped to build a resilient, empowered and inclusive community, where every voice and opinion matters. We see our role not only as a catalyst of change but as a continuing force for improving the lives around us. We are confident we have the capacity to build on our work thus far and continue to be a positive influence in the years ahead.

The main focus over the last year was the proposed Lairg Care and Well Being Centre which took considerable commitment and effort but we succeeded in securing the all-important Scottish Land Fund Stage 1 funding together with vital contributions from the Highland Council and Lairg and Rosehall Windfarm Community Funds. These allowed LDCI to contract a professional consulting team to conduct a Feasibility Study and produce a Social Enterprise Plan, also to carry out a Housing Needs Survey. A six month public engagement process commenced in February 2016.

In addition, we also pursued the delivery of other community initiatives. We held our second Winterfest event during November's run-up to Christmas and it was enjoyed by the whole community and more. It was as big a success as the 2015 event with approximately 1000 people attending from across Highlands. Many local groups and numerous volunteers were involved in its preparation and running. Once again, emphasis was placed on family affordability. We received excellent feedback from the local community and beyond. Our intention is to continue to make the Winterfest an annual event.

When news broke that Lairg had been the epicentre of a massive asteroid impact 1.2 billion years ago we made contact with the scientist responsible for the discovery and begun the early stages of securing funding for a public exhibition aimed at explaining the phenomenon and explore ways and means of creating a lasting legacy for the village. As well as an academic presentation we had terrific visual display input from the Primary School thus placing as strong educational emphasis on the project. We also undertook significant landscape restoration work to the Church Hill path improving access to the viewpoint for local people and visitors alike. It has become a very popular attraction right in the centre of the village and allows more people to appreciate the fine views of the local area whilst contributing in its own small way to exposing individuals to fresh air and increased exercise.

Once again we organised several sessions where volunteers tackled various tidying-up activities around the village. Not only does this help present the village in a better light for visitors, it gives the community a good sense of participatory effort. Further research and consultation including a Scoping Report was carried out into the Community Broadband project and our ambition is to ensure the whole community has an equal chance to receive this increasingly vital technology. We continued exploring means of securing improvements to and extending the footpath link between the village and the railway

In all the aforementioned areas, work will continue to the benefit of the community, with Lairg residents kept fully engaged in all that we do

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow directors, our Development Officer and all our members for their continuous support and invaluable efforts. I would also like to highlight the contribution of Lairg Community Council for supporting us in our work. As elected but voluntary members of our community, they are due recognition for the significance of their input to village life and for that we continue to be grateful. I appreciate also the ongoing contributions of our Highland Councillors for maintaining effective links with the local authority and for vital strategic support.

Report of the Directors For the year ended 31 March 2017

The Directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2017. The directors who are also trustees of Lairg and District Community Initiatives for the purposes of charity law and who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Structure, governance and management

The members of the Board of Management function as Directors of Lairg and District Community Initiatives as a Company Limited by Guarantee under the Companies Act, also as Charity Trustees under OSCR (the Office of the Scottish Charities Regulator).

Governing Document

The governing documents of the charity are the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company, which was incorporated on 30th April 2002 as a company limited by guarantee of £1 per member.

The names of the persons who served as directors during the year and up to the date of this report are as listed on the previous page.

The charitable company obtains funding and assistance from various sources, including the Highland Council, Highland & Islands Enterprise, SSE Achany Windfarm Fund, Lairg Windfarm Fund, Foundation Scotland and by its own fundraising.

Its aim in recruiting new directors is to have as broad a skill base as possible. This means that much of the day-to-day administration can be done by a director.

Risk Management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

Investment policy

Under the Memorandum & Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees see fit. Funds are held in a mixture of current and deposit accounts to maximise accessibility and investment returns.

Objectives and activities

Objectives and aims

The aims of the company include:

- 1) To manage community land and associated assets for the benefits of the community of Lairg and district and the public at large.
- 2) To provide, or assist in providing, recreational facilities and/or organising recreational activities to improve the conditions of life of the community and following principles of sustainable development.
- 3) To advance the education of the community about its environment, culture, heritage and history.

The directors regularly review the future financial requirements of the company. They have a policy whereby the unrestricted funds held should be at least three (3) months of general expenditure.

Notes to financial statements For the year ended 31st March 2017

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year.

1.1 Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard FRS102 (effective January 2016), the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in July 2014 (SORP 2014) and the Companies Act 2006. Assets and Liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction valued unless otherwise stated.

1.2 Income recognition policies

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:-

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

1.3 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

1.4 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the Directors.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Designated funds are funds set aside by the Directors for a particular purpose.

1.5 Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items,

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates calculated to write off the cost less the residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:
