#### **LDCI Opens New Playpark at Ferrycroft Centre**

Lairg & District Community Initiatives (LDCI) is delighted to announce that the installation of a new playpark at Ferrycroft Visitor Centre in Lairg is now complete. Since 2021, LDCI has been working in partnership with the Highland Council, the Lairg Community Council and a group of local parents who were keen to address the lack of play facilities for children in the area.

A playpark had been developed at the Ferrycroft Visitor Centre in the 1990's but over time the equipment grew old and had to be removed, so the site lay empty for several years. A community consultation held by LDCI showed widespread support for the creation of a new playpark on the site, and this has now been achieved, with much of the new all-abilities equipment chosen by local children themselves. To celebrate, an informal opening was held on the 10th October in time for the school holidays. Around 70 children from Lairg and Rosehall Primary and Nursery Schools attended the event, which was opened by LDCI board member Annette Parrott MBE, who asked the children to join her in counting down from 10 before she cut the ribbon and declared the park open!

Alison Magee, LDCI's Vice Chair who worked on the project said, "It was wonderful to see how excited and enthusiastic the children "I am really grateful to have were to try out the new equipment that they had helped to choose! such a great park." We are also grateful to David Watson from Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust for assisting us to secure much of the £117,473 of funding required to build this new playpark, and of course we would like to thank all of the funders for their financial support."

LDCI received £60,000 from the Highland Council Community Regeneration Fund, £33,600 from SSE Renewables (Achany Community Fund) & RWE Rosehall Community Benefit Fund, £10,000 from The Westminster Foundation, £5000 from Lairg Community Windfarm Fund, £2357 from the North Highland Initiative, and LDCI also pledged £6516 through community fundraising.

Malcolm Macleod, Assistant Chief Executive at Highland Council said, "The new all abilities playpark at Ferrycroft is a very welcome development for the area and testament to the hard work of all involved. There is no doubt this will make a difference to the lives of young people in the area by meeting a need that has long been identified locally for more recreational facilities. I'm delighted that Community Regeneration Funding and working in partnership with Highland Council has enabled the community to achieve this long held aspiration."

David Shearer, SSE Renewables Community Investment Manager said, "The fantastic modern play facilities now available at the Ferrycroft play park, not only helps young people to thrive and develop, but also showcases Lairg as an attractive place for young families to live or visit. The need to address the lack of recreational play facilities in Lairg was a priority for the community and we are delighted that the Achany Community Fund has been able to support this worthy project".

Lesley Morrison, headteacher of Lairg and Rosehall Primary Schools commented, "The children thoroughly enjoyed the opening of the park, and I am sure it will be well used. They loved being involved in choosing the equipment. We want to thank all the people who made it possible."

They were the youngest retained brigade in the area and so this was an outstanding achievement, said Mr. Eric Macintyre, Northern area fire master, when he presented the trophies at a ceremony in Lairg Restaurant last Monday night.

#### The Battle of Bannockburn

On the 23rd of June 1314, a battle took place between Scotland and England at Bannockburn, immediately south of Stirling. Scotland tried to reclaim their land to get one step closer to independence.

Firstly Robert the Bruce was hiding in the forest with his army. Robert the Bruce knew he was outnumbered but he had a plan.

Then Robert the Bruce told the Scottish army his plan they were going to form three schiltrons (which the army called hedgehogs because their spears combined into an impenetrable wall) the Scottish courageously advanced to where the English were waiting. When the Scottish saw the English they engaged in battle, the battle of Bannockburn had begun. Once Scotland formed the schiltrons King Robert commanded Scotland to attack, Scotland charged and England was pinned back.

Next, the English archers fired at the Scottish army luckily the Scottish cavalry noticed and charged at the English archers, despite there being many more English archers they could not hold their ground and were defeated.

Lastly the Scottish tricked the English by civilians charging over the hill. The English retreated and Scotland won the battle and sent King Edward home to think again.


The Battle of Bannockburn was one of most brutal battles in Scottish history, over 500 soldiers laid down their lives for their home, Scotland.

On the 23rd of June 1314 a battle took place, not just any battle it was the battle of Bannockburn, it happened because the Scots wanted their land back from the English.

Firstly Robert the Bruce hid his army in the trees so they had the element of surprise although they knew the English army was about three times bigger than the Scottish army. They waited for his signal to charge.

Next they charged and formed themselves into a schiltron, they called them hedgehogs because they held their spears up and it looked like a hedgehog, using the schiltrons the Scottish pushed the English back. They were stunned, they didn't expect a smaller army of men on foot.





After the schiltrons formed the English charged, they had much less room to come forward, the Scottish schiltrons pushed on so that the English were trapped.

The English archers shot arrows at the Scottish but calvary chased them away, they kept pushing on until the English got pushed into the Bannockburn.

It was an intense battle and many men died but the Scots were victorious and they were one step closer to getting their land back.
