My young grandson, Jonny, has recently been enjoying his first visit to Australia and as a rite of passage his Aussie relatives introduced him to that popular '60s song, "My boomerang won't come back" by the late Charlie Drake. As he told me about it, I was reminded of the occasion when I got into some trouble in chasing my own boomerang when it didn't come back.

Let's go back a bit. In the mid-1960s I bought a new Gray Nicholls cricket bat from Lillywhites of Piccadilly - THE shop for sporting goods in London. At the time I was on two years' exchange from the RAN in the Royal Navy and my ship, HMS Rothesay, was about to sail for the West Indies for a year. It was the time when Caribbean cricket had an immense reputation and I needed to be ready for everything that local teams we would be playing -Island, Fire Brigade, Police or Army – would throw at us. Teams from visiting British frigates were usually easy meat for West Indian sides, but in our case a forward-thinking Captain had arranged that our complement of midshipman should all be members of the Dartmouth cricket team. The First Lieutenant was a Navy cricketer, the Captain a Navy hockey player, and there were several other useful cricketers in the ship's company.

But while I was at Lillywhites, I spotted a boomerang for sale, and on impulse, added it to my shopping list. It was a purchase that was to get me into trouble later on.

We spent some time doing necessary maintainance in the lovely naval dockyard in Bermuda. It had been used by the Royal Navy for hundreds of years and to add to its historical significance we were all aware that Nelson had spent time there.

One afternoon, my colleague Bill and I decided to try out my new boomerang in a nearby sports field. As a light breeze came up we had some success in getting it to return in the great tradition of the Australian Aboriginals. But then the breeze began to strengthen and after one throw the boomerang returned but this time just kept going. It ended up flopping gently into the sea about 50 yards out. We became concerned when the wind and tide began to take it rapidly out to sea - the next stop would be South America unless we acted quickly.

In a nearby inlet we spotted a small boat, and fortunately the owner had not removed the oars. Without further thought Bill and I launched it and proceeded to chase our wayward boomerang out to sea. Bill was not so proficient at rowing and our journey was delayed by many crabs and splashes. Fortunately we were eventually able to rescue my precious boomerang and headed back to shore. The wind had now increased to a good force four and our return journey took some time. As we approached the shore a man took our line and secured it as we disembarked. I then noticed he was in the uniform of Sergeant of the Bermuda Police. 'What', he demanded, 'did we think we were doing?'. It appeared that he was responding to a report that two sailors had been seen stealing a boat.

I could see the headlines in the local paper: 'British naval officers arrested for boat stealing.' Just the previous week the local paper had carried a story: 'Bench heeds when officer speaks for sailor'. The sailor was one of my division and he had been charged with stealing a bicycle. The officer was me! As a devotee of Perry Mason I had put up a good case and my client was given an absolute discharge. I remember it was during the same proceedings that a local man had been charged with being drunk in charge of a horse. Crime was pretty low-key in Bermuda.

In this case, Bill and I were as contrite as possible, and after being told not to do it again the Sergeant decided to take no further action. After this I discovered that he was the secretary of the local police cricket team, and so I was able to arrange a match for the following week. I forget the result but I did make a few runs with my new bat. I didn't take my boomerang to the match however!

As a post script to my tale, after our return to the UK, Bill gave me a real boomerang and a nullah nullah (an Aboriginal throwing stick) that had been in his family.

They still both sit today on my hall table, highly polished, and looking very business-like. On the opposite side of the hall, under the hat stand, and together with umbrellas, a Crummock, my fishing rod, and camera tripod stands another Gray Nicholls cricket bat, a successor to the Lillywhites bat of nearly 60 years ago...
