New Funding for Paddleboarding Project

LDCI are delighted to report that we have received funding from the Highland Whole Family Wellbeing Programme (WFWP) through the Highland Council, which will allow us to work in partnership with the Sutherland Adventure Company (SAC). SAC who are based in Brora, have previously run some 'Sutherland Girls on Boards' sessions on Little Loch Shin. This collaborative project will allow SAC to increase the number of paddleboarding activities that they can offer for young people in Lairg.

LDCI will purchase a container that will allow SAC to set up a base in Lairg, and the WFWP funding will go towards purchasing paddleboarding equipment and wetsuits that can be stored locally.

The funding will also allow SAC to deliver a free weekly 'Teens Club' on the loch starting in May 2026. (Weather permitting!)

If you are a young person (- or if you are a parent/carer of a young person) that would like to sign up for the Lairg 'Teens Club' - we will keep you updated closer to the time. Please keep checking the LDCI Facebook page and this magazine for notices.

Outing to Strathnaver Museum





Last Saturday we enjoyed a wonderful day out, travelling north via Tongue to the Strathnaver Museum in Bettyhill.

Along the way we stopped at the Pillars at Altnaharra, where Shirley shared the story of her great-great-grandfather, Donald Macpherson, who around 1850 was sent by the Duke of Sutherland from Tongue Mains Farm to the quarry at Glencraggach on Drumholistan, transporting the two huge blocks to Altnaharra.

The museum itself, housed in the old parish church with a fairly new annexe, offered plenty of interest for the group.

After a tasty lunch at The Store Café, served by friendly staff, we returned to hear an engaging talk by Fiona Mackenzie on the Clearance village at Rosal.

Fiona also displayed a number of fascinating artefacts discovered at the site.

Our journey home took us through Strathnaver, passing the memorial to the raising of the 93rd Sutherland Highlanders and the Dalharrold Battlefield, among other notable places.

Calum, our helpful and attentive driver from MacLeod's Coaches, took us all safely back to Lairg.

There is a quiz night scheduled once a month, on the third Tuesday, which raises money for local good causes.



October's Time Warp: An Extra Hour of Daylight Saving

Ready to embrace the cosy season?

On Sunday, 26th October, at 2am, the clocks will turn back one hour to 1am, marking the end of British Summer Time (BST).

This change brings the country back to Greenwich Mean Time (GMT) and provides an extra hour of daylight in the morning.

While the evenings will become darker sooner, the adjustment signals the official start of winter time, giving everyone a little extra time in bed on Sunday morning.

In Scottish Mythology, the one-hour change is not a loss of light, but a gift—so, when the clock strikes 2am and gracefully returns to 1am, listen closely. It is not the sound of gears turning, it is the hum of the faerie mounds being sealed. It is the Cailleach bringing her first breath of winter. It is Scotland itself, telling you to light the fire, pour a dram, and settle in. For in this extra hour, we are not just gaining sleep; we are connecting to a time far older than memory itself.
