
# Recipe of the week

### Ingredients

Serves: 12
125g (4 1/4 oz) plain flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
150g (5oz) caster sugar
2 tablespoons cocoa powder
120ml (4 fl oz) milk
2 tablespoons butter, melted
225g (8oz) brown sugar
4 tablespoons cocoa powder
400ml (14 fl oz) hot water

### Method

Prep: 5 min > Cook:45min > Ready in:50min Preheat the oven to 180 degrees C (gas mark 4). Grease and flour a 23cm square tin.



Bake for 45 minutes in the preheated oven. The cake is done when the cake part is on top and the bottom is a runny chocolate sauce.

### **Lairg Aire Project**

In the last issue of the Lairg Magazine we published information regarding LDCI's proposed 'Aire project' to provide regulated facilities for overnight vehicles to dispose of chemical waste and litter. As many of you may have noted – there have regularly been motorhomes parking overnight in the Ferrycroft area over the summer, and this project aims to ensure that if people do park there – there will be infrastructure further back from the Loch to allow them to park responsibly.

We invited people for feedback on our proposal and we are pleased to say that there were over 100 responses to the online consultation. Thank you to everyone who responded.

The online survey has now closed, and all the comments have been submitted as part of the funding application to Visit Scotland's Rural Tourism Infrastructure fund. In addition, LDCI has applied for planning permission and for a Community Asset Transfer. We will update you in due course if the applications are successful.



### SSE Renewables invests over £300k in the Lairg and Kyle of Sutherland communities in 2020/21

In 2020/21, over £300,000 has been invested across the Ardgay and District, Creich and Lairg communities from the Achany Wind Farm Community Fund - bringing the total value of projects supported to £1.4 million since the fund was established in 2010.

In addition, the fund delivers an apprenticeship scheme as part of its efforts to ensure wide ranging and long-lasting local impact. To date, the Kyle of Sutherland Apprenticeship Scheme has supported 26 apprentices in 18 businesses across the three communities.

SSE Renewables' proposed extension to the Achany wind farm will also include a community fund which would bring further benefits to the three local communities and through SSE Renewables' regional Highland Sustainable Development Fund. As a developer, constructor and operator of renewable energy assets, SSE Renewables works with communities for the long-term. Since the Achany Wind Farm Fund was established over 10 years ago, the communities have grown, and priorities have changed. The communities now have their own community and development trusts which are delivering and supporting initiatives locally.

Working with the Community Councils, Kyle of Sutherland Locality Group and local Lairg stakeholders, SSE Renewables intends to support their desire to create a development plan for the area. By carrying out a widespread community consultation across the Lairg and Kyle communities, every local resident will have the opportunity to have a say on what local issues are important. The result will be that Wind Farm money can be used in a targeted way to address the priorities that are important to local people. Although SSE Renewables will fund an independent consultant to carry out this work, the consultation will be driven and managed by local people through the Locality Group and a steering group made up of

representatives from the Lairg and Kyle communities. This consultation will ensure a model is developed that will meet the communities' current and future needs and set out the priorities in an ambitious local development plan.

Applicants must live within Lairg Community Council area. Applicants with more than £2000 savings are not eligible. Applicants should be in receipt of one or more of the following benefits: Universal Credit, Income Support, Child Tax Credit, Pension Credit, Income based Job Seekers Allowance, Employment Support Allowance, Housing Benefit/Council Tax Reduction. If you live outside the Lairg Community Council area we will pass your details on to the correct group for your own area.

Walking regularly offers so many health benefits - it can help reduce the risk of heart disease and osteoporosis and there is lots of research to show that it can also improve your mental health...





**UHI Lecture:** Last week I attended the UHI Annual Lecture with the keynote speech from Professor Jeffrey Sachs. He spoke frankly and honestly about where we are in the world regarding what we need to do to reverse, or stabilise, the impact that we've had on global warming. He hopes that COP26 will include improvements that

- ensures all regions of the world commit to the Paris Agreement
- involves world wide collaboration regarding technical innovations
- ensures that land use is incorporated fully into national plans
- address finance such that it deals with the issues between developed and undeveloped countries (developing countries are suffering the effects of the climate crises significantly more than developed countries)

### **Craftivism for Climate Change**

With the Lairg & District Learning Centre

This month, we are getting involved with Stitches for Survival, a "craftisism" movement. Combining activism and crafting, this is a climate change focused campaign by knitters, crafters, stitchers and crocheters across the UK.

This aims to influence the decisions made at COP26, a climate conference to be held in Glasgow this November by making a 1.5-mile-long scarf representing the target to keep the rise of global temperatures below 1.5°C as per the Paris Climate Agreement. Once the event has finished, the completed scarf will be made into blankets and donated to aid refugees.

There are two ways you can get involved in this campaign: either to make a scarf yourself to send to us or to come along to our stall at the Lairg Community Market to join our sewing tutor Jo.

If you are a crafter, please get involved in this campaign by creating your own scarf. This can be made by knitting, stitching, crafting, crocheting 100cm by 60cm scarfs in blue or green. Your pattern can be as basic or as intricate as you would like, and you are welcome to include endangered animals or plants. You can also create as many scarves are you would like.

Please send to or drop off all creations at the Lairg & District Learning Centre by the 30th of September. We will then send them to Stitches for Survival where they will be put together to contribute to the 1.5-mile-long scarf!

Snippet: September 21, is the Autumnal Equinox. Stone Circles may have marked this Equinox.

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## Equinox, Summer & Winter Solstice ======== Stone Circles

The Spring Equinox was on 20th March. It is known as the Vernal Equinox. Vernal means Sunshine. The Autumn Equinox will be on 21st September. It is known as the Autumnal Equinox. Equinox is Latin: Equi [equal] Nox [night].

Spring and Autumnal Equinox are only two days in the year when the Sun rises and sets overhead at the equator and stays overhead for the complete 12 hours. A person at the equator on these two equinox days will not have a shadow.

The Summer Solstice was on 22nd June giving the maximum amount of time between Sunrise and Sunset. In Lairg it was for 18 hours 11 minutes.

The Winter Solstice is on 21st December and is more important than the Summer Solstice because it marks the gradual increase of Sunlight.

Callanish, Stone Circle, Isle of Lewis

These Stone Circles might be Neolithic and date before 6,000 BC. These Stones were erected long before the Viking invasions. Their reason is open to wide speculation. The Egyptian Pyramids were built 4,500 BC. These ancient monuments have one thing in common, total dark skies. A great deal of study has been done in Egypt and it is certain that they are astronomically aligned. Are the stones of Callanish astronomically aligned? Some Cave Paintings in Lascaux, France, date back to 12,000 BC, depict the phases of the Moon.

The melting of arctic ice raised the sea level to its present mark, and the land bridge across the Strait of Dover was submerged about 8,000 years ago. Neolithic Man [Middle Stone Age] could have migrated as far as Ireland.
