Menu for Under £5
One Pot Chicken & Rice



INGREDIENTS:

5 Chicken thighs £2.60
200g Easy cook long grain white rice £0.36
500g Passata with garlic £0.40
500g Frozen mixed vegetables £0.90
Fresh coriander £0.48
1 Onion, finely diced £0.26
2 tsp Paprika
Optional sprinkle of chilli flakes
700ml Chicken stock (2 cubes)
Total £5.00

METHOD:

Add the chicken thighs to a large frying pan on a medium/low heat. Leave to gently fry for 10 minutes, until the fat renders from the chicken skin, turning the skin golden & crispy.

Next, set the chicken aside. Add the onion to the pan and cook in the chicken fat. Once softened, add the paprika and fry for a minute before adding passata, frozen vegetables, rinsed rice and chicken stock. Stir to combine and place the chicken into the pan without submerging the crispy chicken skin. Cook for 18 minutes. Remove the chicken thighs and stir one last time. Top with the chicken thighs to serve, a sprinkle of fresh coriander and an optional pinch of chilli flakes.

Lairg & District Community Initiatives (LDCI) is working with Deputy Lieutenant Sheila Stewart and with other partners including the local churches, Lairg Primary School, Lairg & District Learning Centre and the local branch of the Royal British Legion Scotland to coordinate a celebration to mark the 100th Anniversary of the Lairg War Memorial.

The event will take place on Friday the 30th of September 2022 with a service commencing at 11am. The service will honour the fallen of both World Wars. For each of the people named on the memorial, a commemorative wooden cross will be laid by a descendant (if known) or by P6 & P7 children from Lairg Primary, and their names (along with the regiment in which they served) will be read out. Wreaths will also be laid by the Deputy Lieutenant, the Community Council, the Royal British Legion, by a Veteran and a Serving Officer representing the battalions and by Angela Sutherland who is Rededicating the Memorial.

The community has already been very involved in preparing for the event, with many local people, (and even tourists and people from much further afield) helping to make hundreds of beautiful hand-knitted and crocheted poppies for a cascade which will be displayed at the War Memorial from late September until Remembrance Day. The Lairg Primary pupils will also paint wooden poppies that will go on display throughout the Church Hill woods. LDCI would like to thank everyone who has taken the time to make poppies for this installation.

Commenting on the celebration, Deputy Lieutenant Sheila Stewart said,

"Everyone is very welcome to attend the service. We are particularly keen that descendants of

those whose names are listed on the War Memorial, and both retired and current serving service men and women take part by laying a cross. Please contact me by emailing: projectofficer@lairginitiative.co.uk if you would like to do so.

After the service has taken place – refreshments will be served in the Community Centre. Please bring along your photographs, letters, medals or memorabilia relating to either your own on your relatives' military service (including more recent military campaigns) to share with others as part of a temporary display on the day. In the run up to the event wooden crosses will also be available to purchase in the local shops for a donation towards the Royal British Legion Scotland – this will allow people to write their own messages.

Lairg & District Learning Centre is independent learning centre with charitable status based in Lairg, Sutherland. LDLC offers learning opportunities to people of all ages, across the rural communities of Sutherland and since 2020 has been delivering learning opportunities online which have reached learners all around the world. Our programme is updated on a regular basis via Eventbrite which you can find by searching **Lairg & District Learning Centre** or scanning the QR code at the bottom of this page.

The following sessions are coming up this Autumn:

There will also be a selection of storytelling sessions as part of Scotland's Year of Stories, foraging walks, woodworking classes and thrift flip workshops as part of the Highland Community Waste Partnership Project.

In August 2022 we launched a new **Time Together** project thanks to funding from Sutherland Cares Mental Health & Wellbeing Fund through Highland Council. This is a collection of free learning opportunities focused on bringing young people and their families together to participate in activities, building confidence and social skills as well as new skills in growing, cooking, storytelling and crafting. The project kicked off the following activities:

- Mini Makers An afterschool craft club for p4-7s. A great opportunity to learn new skills and make some new creations 3.15 - 4.15 on Tuesdays during term time at LDLC.
- Digital Skills Club A space for teenagers to come together to explore coding, photography, gaming, video editing and other digital skills .2.30pm 4pm on Fridays during term time at LDLC.
- Cook Together! Fun cooking sessions for families. An opportunity to learn new skills, recipes and how to cook on a budget Tuesdays 4pm 5.30pm at Lairg Community Centre.

LDLC is one of the community partners supporting the delivery of the UK National Databank which brings free mobile internet data to people who can't afford it and who are often also experiencing multiple inequalities in today's society. It's like a food bank but for internet connectivity data.




2nd August 1922, Alexander Graham Bell died in Nova Scotia.

The illustration below is of a commemorative bank note marking the 150th anniversary of the birth of Alexander Graham Bell at 14 South Charlotte Street, in the west end of Princes Street, Edinburgh.

Alexander Graham Bell Inventor

Alexander Graham Bell's father and grandfather had both been involved in improving systems of communication for the deaf.

In 1870 after attending universities in Edinburgh and London, he emigrated to Canada before moving on to be Professor of Vocal Physiology at Boston.

His invention of the telephone was in pursuit of a device to help the deaf. He patented his early telephone in February 1876 - only days ahead of other rivals. But it was not until the 10th March 1876 that the famous words "Mr Watson, come here; I want you" were the first instructions transmitted by telephone. He formed the Bell Telephone company in 1877 and became rich as a result.

He continued to teach Helen Keller who was blind and deaf caused by an illness at the age of 17 months. Helen Keller is famous for her work with the handicapped. Bell also worked on inventions, including a universal phonetic language, phonograph and hydrofoils. He was also involved in genetics and invented a new method of sheep breeding.

However, he never liked his most famous invention, saying "I never use the beast" and stuffing the bell on his phone with newspapers. He moved to Nova Scotia and died there in 1922.





LDCI COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

Please give us your views on the future of Playpark provision in Lairg.

Over the past year LDCI has been working with a group of parents in Lairg to explore the possibility of regenerating the playpark at the Ferrycroft Visitor Centre.

This process has taken some time because, for historic reasons, Ferrycroft playpark is not included in the Highland Council Amenities budget, which funds playparks. Highland Council will only maintain and invest in playparks which are included in this budget. Moreover, any external funding for playparks which the Council might receive - from for example, the Scottish Government - is channelled through the Amenities budget, which also excludes Ferrycroft.

Due to budget constraints, Highland Council will not simply transfer Ferrycroft playpark into the Amenities budget. However, following negotiations, they have brought forward the the following proposals:

- 1. Ferrycroft will become an Amenities playpark. Highland Council will continue grounds maintenance, as at present. LDCI and the Ferrycroft Playpark Group will fundraise for new equipment in partnership with Amenities, who will provide advice to ensure that appropriate, accessible and good quality equipment is purchased. Highland Council will maintain this equipment.
- 2. Ord Place playpark will cease to be a playpark, although Highland Council will continue grass cutting as at present. The Council would consider transferring the site into community ownership if there was local support for this. (The playparks at Lochside and Clashbreac are unaffected by these proposals.)

LDCI, the Community Council, and the Ferrycroft group have discussed these proposals, and feel that the options offered by Highland Council provide the best outcome for playpark provision in Lairg. At Ferrycroft there is access to ample parking and public toilets, and having an attractive playpark could help ensure the future sustainability of the Visitor Centre.
