In memory of the Queen we thought that we would share this classic recipe that was developed for the banquet of the Queen's Coronation in 1953. Make a classic coronation chicken filling to serve with jacket potatoes or in sandwiches and salads. It's an excellent way to use up leftover chicken after a roast.

Ingredients

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- 6 tbsp mayonnaise
- 2-3 tsp mild curry powder, to taste
- ¹/₂ tsp ground cinnamon
- 2 tbsp mango chutney
- 1-3 tbsp sultanas, or to taste
- 500g shredded cooked chicken

Method

STEP 1

Mix the mayo, curry powder, cinnamon, chutney and sultanas together and season with black pepper.

STEP 2

Add the shredded chicken and stir to coat in the sauce. Stir in 2 tbsp water to loosen if needed, then season and serve as desired.

Glasgow Gas Street Lights went out on the 1st September 1971

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"LICHTIE"

The lamplighters - or *Lichties* - were a familiar sight on the streets of Glasgow as they dashed from lamp to lamp before dusk with their long ladders and lighting poles.



A Lamplighter

The 19th century began with the discovery of the illuminating properties of coal gas by William Murdoch paving the way for a transformation of night time in Glasgow. In 1817, the Gas Light Company was formed, and on the 15th September 1818 the first street light proper was lit.

The last remaining gas street lamp in the city, in North Portland Street, was ceremoniously lit *[for its last night]* on the 1st September 1971, by Lord Provost Sir Donald Liddle (picture below from *The Herald, Scotland*).



The Last Lamp

The *Lichties* kept the street lamps burning for more than 150 years with the last flame being snuffed out just 51 years ago this month. While the gas street lights went out in 1971, the Lichties still attended 12,664 gas lights in the city's stairwells and closes.

By then, the lamplighters took the more formal title of "public lighting maintenance engineers" with staff also looking after almost 150,000 electric stair lamps.

The first electric lights were introduced to Glasgow in 1893. By 1914 the Corporation Lighting Department was responsible for 19,437 gas and 1,541 electric street lights. As electricity became more popular, gas lights were phased out. By 1955 the Corporation maintained 7,723 gas lights compared to 33,186 electric street lights. In 2004 the once-familiar figure of the "Lichtie" has faded from the public memory.
