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## **Lairg War Memorial Centenary**

At 11am on Friday the 30th September 2022, over 100 people gathered on a wild and stormy day to mark the 'Rededication of the Lairg War Memorial' on the 100th anniversary of its unveiling.

Lairg & District Community Initiatives (LDCI) worked with Deputy Lieutenant Sheila Stewart and with other partners including the local churches, Lairg Primary School, Lairg & District Learning Centre and the local branch of the Royal British Legion Scotland to coordinate the celebration. As part of the event a beautiful, dramatic poppy cascade was displayed which features hundreds of hand knitted and crocheted poppies created by local people but also by people from much further afield who wished to take part. ## Recipe of the week

Pumpkin Soup

If you are carving pumpkins for Hallowe'en - don't throw away the flesh from the inside - why not try making this delicious Autumnal soup?

#### Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 2 onions, roughly chopped
- 2 carrots, diced
- 2 sticks celery, diced
- 2 cloves garlic, roughly chopped
- 1kg after peeling pumpkin or butternut squash, cut into chunks
- 1.2 litres chicken or veg stock
- 150ml double cream
- for grating (optional) nutmeg

Heat the olive oil in a pan and fry the onions, carrots, celery and garlic until soft. Add the pumpkin and cook for 5 minutes, then tip in the stock and simmer until the pumpkin is soft and you can mash it with the back of a spoon. Add the cream and cook gently for 2-3 minutes. Put everything in a blender and whizz until smooth (or use a stick blender). Gently reheat to serve, grating over a little nutmeg, if you like.

## **Lairg Health Walks**

For September's Health Walk we were delighted to be joined by Charlotte, the HTSI Health Walk coordinator for the Highlands. She is also an artist, so she brought along creative packs for the walkers to try our hand at watercolour painting. Jan Blackwell—this Magazine's resident artist - and one of the Walk Leaders was also able to provide us with advice on techniques!

Please note that the next Health Walk will take place on a different day - we will hold it on **Thursday 27th** 

October - at the same time of 10.30am. We will go for hot drinks after as per usual. All welcome.

Piper Layla Dalton led in those attending, including descendants of people named on the memorial. The service was led by Sandy Sutherland of Lairg Christian Fellowship, with contributions from Rev Hilary Gardener, Jeff Norrie, Jonathan Brett Young, Irene Grant, Sheila Stewart DL, Angela Sutherland and Rev Ben Fiddian.

In her speech, Angela Sutherland quoted from the Northern Times issue of the 5 October 1922 which reported on the Unveiling and Dedication Ceremony, noting that, "The Northern Times report of 1922 tells us of the weather on that day 100 years ago; it tells us about some of those who attended – what they



did and what some said; it tells us of the design and material used in the construction of this memorial ... BUT ... it does not, and could not tell us, of the depth and magnitude of the collective grief and pain that filled the hearts of the gathered people as they mourned the deaths of their children, family, friends and neighbours. We all know what it is like to know the pain of grief at the loss of loved ones, but as we stand here today, we cannot begin to imagine the corporate grief felt by the folks of this community, remembering 55 souls who had been cut off in the prime of their lives, as this broken column signifies (...) We rededicate this Memorial, with thanksgiving and appreciation, to the memory of those who gave their all, let us live as good neighbours, caring for those in need, and living at peace among ourselves and with all people."

Following the poignant service, all the attendees were invited to Lairg Community Centre for lunch and to warm up, and were able to come together to share stories, photographs and memorabilia from their own or from their relatives' military service.

Commenting on the Rededication Ceremony, LDCI Chair Kaye Hurrion said, "The weather might have been against us on the day, but we only stood there for about an hour – when you think of what conditions those service men and women had to endure during wartime - an hour is nothing for us to give to pay our respects ..."

Deputy Lieutenant Sheila Stewart added, 'It was an amazing day and so uplifting seeing the support from the community and further afield. (...) It was very emotional as Irene Grant read out the 66 names of the Fallen, and their descendants or Lairg Primary school children placed a cross in their memory. The service followed that of 100 years ago and Angela Sutherland had carried out a great deal of research from old archives and delivered a very moving tribute and rededication. It felt like such an honour to be laying a wreath. Many of those taking part told me that was indeed how they felt. Thank you just doesn't seem enough to all the people who not only made it happen but came along to support on the day. Thanks also to those who made poppies, we couldn't have done it without you. The poppy tribute is stunning. A fitting and poignant tribute to our Fallen. We Must Always Remember Them..."

The poppy cascade will be displayed at the Lairg War Memorial until Remembrance Day in November. If people wish to view the recording of the service which was live streamed, it is available on the Lairg Sutherland Facebook page and will be made available on the LDCI website shortly. #### **Planet Sutherland**

Our September Carbon Cafe in Lairg focussed on fuel and money, and we did manage to have some good laughs thinking about interesting ways to save energy and money! Some press articles and stories around the place would have us thinking against saving fuel. But, being economic with energy use is probably a natural plan for most of us in the Highlands anyway. It's crazy to think that we have all this free energy being created all around us, yet, reducing power use is something that most of us can do easily; and in turn help with our bills and the climate crisis.

Our Energy Saving Carbon Cafe covered a wide range of topics moving away from the usual – turn the heat down 1 degree and install insulation etc. Here are some of the ideas we came up with:

Hay Box or Wonder bag cooking - essentially energy free slow cooking.

Spending more time outside - gardening, walking or cycling; the more time we spend outside, the warmer we'll feel when we get inside again.

Casserole & Soup Club - get together with a neighbour or friend. Batch cook some food, but swap dishes to help with variety.



#### LDCI COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

Thank you to everybody who has responded to our survey regarding the future of Playpark provision in Lairg. Out of the 45 responses we received 42 - (93.3 %) were in favour of the proposal to create a new upgraded playpark at Ferrycroft with equipment to suit all abilities, and to close the Ord Place playpark. Information has also been gathered from respondents about what people would like to see instead of the Playpark at Ord place. The results will be published in more detail in the next magazine.
