The wood is now about 64 years old and composed of Scots fir, larch and patches of hardwoods: Beech, Oak, Ash & Elm and also a few clumps of Spruce. The fir and larch are very well grown and clean timber – with fine long straight poles and some very heavy especially amongst the hard woods; but as a rule there is a large amount of ?.... The Scots firs are sound and good quality. The oak and other hardwoods are on indifferent.

There were 3 lots sold in this wood during the year to Messrs Morrison & Laurence, Timber Merchants Inverness. One piece 25 to 30 acres was clear cut opposite and adjoining Cnocrash and Drumour fields another piece about 8 acres in extent nearer to Blackrock, and thinnings throughout all the wood. 
