TV programme inspires local woman to set up her own business

Back in September 2021, BBC DIY SOS, The Big Build chose to lend a helping hand to The Pinewood Trust Activity Centre in Brandesburton, for their Children In Need Project. The charity was using a small piece of land painstakingly cleared by owner Mat, into a flat area within the brambles and willows, to allow children to explore the outdoors and get muddy. What they said they could really do with was running water and a loo ideally. Enter the DIY SOS team.



This is what happened.....

Over 11 days, tradespeople and volunteers from all across the UK came to give up their time to be part of the amazing project and enjoy fantastic community spirit, and the food was great too! They created a safe bicycle track to whizz through the trees, a climbing frame only imagined in children's dreams, and a utility cabin with hot and cold water and two toilets!

I was blessed to be able to join them for four days during the build, in which I spend most of it in the woods getting bruised, battered, exhausted and very Continued opposite page



muddy- but had the time of my life! One of the days it rained so much we were washing mud off our tools in the stream of water coming down a tree trunk!

The experience was like no other, and it planted the seed that rather than waiting for the weekend to be outdoors, I could follow my passion and do it every day- come rain or shine!

Since the Big Build I have been working with the Pinewood team (Mat and Jo) to get the site ready to receive their first groups this spring. They will bring the children they work with in Hull to experience the great outdoors, as well as the site being available for organised groups from around the East Riding. The site is perfect for kids of all ages and abilities as well as adult groups too, now we have fully tested the kettle!

The experience led me to decide to set up my own business, Little Wren Services. I am now on a mission to maintain green spaces that everyone can be proud of and enjoy, in an efficient and respectful way, and always with a smile. Little Wren Services is happy to provide regular or occasional appointments to maintain any outdoor or green space. Normally I champion taking away memories and leaving only footprints, however, our own volunteering days aim to give a little back to the local community too. East Riding of Yorkshire Council Update

Budget setting never gets easier, in late December the council received notification of the government's settlement for this coming year. Council tax helps make up the shortfall to enable the council to deliver the important services for residents in the East Riding of Yorkshire.

To enable us to address some of our greatest pressures in Adult Social Care it has been necessary to set the Council Tax rise at 3.99% this year

Apart from the services we all are aware of emptying bins and maintaining 355 kilometres (2206 miles) of roads, the council also provides a multitude of other services ranging from caring for the most vulnerable in our society to investing in infrastructure & flood prevention schemes, libraries, leisure centres, taxi licencing, the list goes on.

During the worst of the pandemic, our communities' responses proved vital and we do not wish to lose the lessons learnt. We believe there needs to be a move towards helping volunteers & community organisations to continue to deliver community schemes. Below we list a few of the things we have included in this year's budget whilst still managing to maintain other services.

- COMMUNITY WEALTH FUND, this initiative will help support community, VCS and anchor organisations to develop small initiatives that can become more sustainable, it may be caring for people in the community through a micro care provider scheme.
- We are introducing over 100 electric car charging points over the next 18 months
- Winter Gritting, to change the trigger time from noon to 8 am on secondary routes, to give assurance to rural routes
- Provide gap funding to protect subsidised services until government support we hope will come through later this year.

In addition, the government has indicated it will be putting in place some financial support schemes for those on incomes that just won't cover the rise in the cost of living & ERYC will be playing its part in administering that support.

After rebuilding the wall and removing the hedge to be replaced with railings last year, the cemetery perimeter has been completed by the fitting of the refurbished gates.



Parish Council Village Improvement Committee Report

The Parish Council has been working hard to improve the village and you may have already noticed the new noticeboard in the Millennium Garden and a new smaller noticeboard on the wall opposite the Blue Post.

More recently, the Parish Council created a sub-committee of their Councillors to explore ways of improving the physical image and appearance of the village by using funding grants. Villagers were asked to suggest ways of improving the village and Parish Councillors also put forward their own ideas.

Funding applications were submitted to the Lissett Wind Farm Fund and The Sandsfield Community Fund for work focussed on the cemetery in South Townside Road. The Lissett Wind Farm Fund covered replacing the hedge on the northern boundary with metal railings and repairing the entrance gates. The Sandsfield Community Fund covered the purchase and installation of two new noticeboards, one for the chapel wall for use by the history group, and one for the cemetery entrance, and the purchasing of a new ride-on mower to maintain the grounds.

All of the work at the cemetery was carried out by local volunteers and the Parish Council would like to thank; Ex-Cllr Brian Rookes for leading the work and Alan Rookes, Geoff and Gary Rudd, Cllr Mike Doyle, Paul Wright, Andy Wilson, and Barry Clarke for their considerable assistance.

The Parish Council are already investigating options for the old allotment site opposite the Church and improvements to the village entrance on the B1249 from Driffield.

Please get in touch if you have any suggestions or are willing to volunteer on future projects.
