MEMORIES

This year is passing so quickly, (or is it just the fact that I'm getting older?), but now we are in the middle of the year and in a month or so it will be harvest time. It reminds me of the time, when as kids, we used to go to the harvest fields.

Tractors had made their appearance and the driver often used to carry a shotgun, usually a "four-ten", so that if a rabbit popped out of the corn in front of him he could have a shot. We kids kept well clear.

We would walk down the corn side to see if there were rabbits about and if one should run out of the corn, we were after it. If you had a good dog with you, you left it to him.



Then there was "luance" time. The farmer's wife brought cheese or apple pie, sometimes bacon and egg pie, but very rarely as bacon was not in slices as it is nowadays and it was only if a pig had been killed on the farm.

I am talking about small farms, twenty or thirty acres, not the big outfits that were managed for a big land owner.

Combine harvesters were just coming to the fore and were usually operated by someone who went from farm to farm doing the work in a much shorter time and the fun went out of it for us kids. The times were difficult if the weather turned awkward and sometimes it took a long time for all to be safely gathered in.

I enjoyed my time on my uncle's farm but it turned me off farming – I went to sea!

We have recently had door step callers in areas where offences of different natures have been reported. When persons have been stopped by Police Officers to check whether they have a genuine Hawkers Licence, they have produced A4 size laminated sheets with their photographs on. THIS IS NOT A VALID LICENCE, THEY MUST HAVE A PEDLARS LICENCE which is issued by the Chief Constable of the area that they reside in. An example of a valid Pedlar's Licence is attached. If they do not have a licence they can be reported or arrested.

If you have reason to question whether a door step caller is genuine, they must have the following:-

A Pedlar's Certificate as required under the Pedlars Act 1871 and which is not to be confused with a self made cornflake packet, laminated with their name and photograph on, as this is not a licence

The Licence **MUST** be issued by the Chief Constable of the home Force (in which they reside)

If you are approached by a pedlar and he produces some identification purporting to be a licence, consider gleaning what details you can from it and contact the Police if you are unsure. These certificates are numbered, are valid for a period of 1 year.



COUNTY COUNCILLORS

Earlier this year we wrote to all the Parish Councils in the East Wolds & Coastal Ward inviting them to let us have, in writing, information about any issues which they felt were of local interest or concern. We then arranged a meeting which took place at County Hall, Beverley in June and invited representatives from the councils who had contacted us along with the relevant Directors or officers to answer the issues raised in person.

Two North Frodingham parish council representatives attended the meeting and in particular asked for an update on flood issues relating to the River Hull & Barmston Drain, the response received is as follows.

Barmston Drain

As Lead Local Flood Authority East Riding of Yorkshire Council are not presently aware of any specific problems with the Barmston drain.

The Beverley and North Holderness Internal Drainage Board (IDB) exercise their permissive powers to carry out maintenance works on the Barmston Drain, and as a Flood risk authority they are also responsible for the water level management in the Barmston Drain.

The Council work with the IDB and with the Environment Agency to reduce the Flood Risk in the East Riding of Yorkshire

River Hull

Over the last few years the East Riding of Yorkshire Council, the Beverley and North Holderness Drainage Board and local residents have expressed concerns about proposals set out in the Draft Environment Agency River Hull Strategy, a document that sets out plans for maintenance and investment on the River Hull and associated watercourses. The locally held view is that the EA strategy proposes unacceptable measures that may actually increase flood risk whilst not recognising the importance of the local economy in respect of future infrastructure investment.

The EA have now agreed to suspend the strategy and in order to seek resolution, Graham Stuart MP has agreed to chair the River Hull Advisory Group with representation from local authorities, the Environment Agency, Internal Drainage Board and the local population. In turn it has been agreed that an officer led multi agency project group will revisit the work undertaken by the Environment Agency and carry out additional work to possibly improve understanding of flood risk. It is believed this work may more accurately represent the need for increased maintenance and investment.

It is intended the Advisory Group will report on its findings in Summer 2014

Social Centre (SC)

By now the litter bins, benches and picnic tables for the playground should have been installed and the roadside gate repaired, thanks to Hannah Walker and her husband.

The Chairman and Secretary have repaired to shed and the outside furniture was installed after the summer fair, which was held 27^{th} July from 2-4pm. Social Centre proceeds from the fair will be put toward the cost of a new front door; a grant may need to be applied for to subsidise the collection.

The SC committee is still hoping that someone will come forward to re-open the youth club and that some community-minded people will join the Social Centre Committee to help keep this important village asset functioning smoothly, we promise you that no-one is dragooned into hard labour, mostly it involves a short meeting once a month to discuss and agree what we do next.

Finally the Committee extends its congratulations to its Chairman, Paul Jones, who is now the Yorkshire Archery Champion. Let's hope he is equally successful when he goes for membership of the national team

Parish Council (PC)

The matters dealt with by the councillors during June and July meetings of the Parish Council were as follows:

The church hedge: failure to obtain approval from the diocese for a low fence, the Council has decided to have the existing hedge uprooted and replaced with a new hedge between Church End Bridge and the gate. Tenders are in the process of being requested and the work should be undertaken during the autumn.

The police have indicated that we have had a very low incidence of reported anti-social behaviour, over the past few months. Let us hope this continues throughout the summer.

The June meeting started with the AGM at which the Chairman, Cllr Kell was able to report a successful conclusion to many of the matters raised by Council over the past year. Yorkshire Water cleared a problem with the surface water drains in Main Street, The Internal Drainage Board have completed work on Frodingham Mill Drain, ERYC Highways Department have helped to reduce HGV traffic on Grange Road by erecting 'not suitable' signs, although this did not prevent one driver smashing through White Bridge! The problem of the school bus stopping at Grange Road corner has been resolved and the flashing 30mph sign finally returned to the west end of the village. Following the resignation of Phil Pearson and Alan Simmons, Council co-opted two new members, Adrian Wilson and David Stead, to fill their shoes.

Residents may have noticed that repair work at the Millennium Garden has been completed and that a new ride-on mower has been purchased for the cemetery.

Council has had a few planning applications to consider over the past two months, and has been careful to adhere to the guidelines outlined by ERYC. Among which it states that whilst access, traffic generation and loss of privacy MAY be considered; loss of value to a property, private rights to light and encroachment of a boundary CANNOT normally be considered. The Government has made many changes to Planning Law to speed the process, and even some reversals of those changes, all of which has made it quite difficult for local councillors keep up to date with. They have been greatly assisted by members who have given their time to attend meetings in Beverley and subsequently update their colleagues..



History Group

At the May meeting Rachel Walker and Elaine from the Goole Waterways Museum gave an unusual and very interesting combined talk about the waterway boats and their demise. Rachel started the talk with a summary of the various types of craft, keel boats, sloops, tugs etc. She explained the differences between them and outlined the historical development from flat-bottomed square-sail boats suitable for river and canal work, to the triangular sails of the coast running sloop through to the installation of diesel engines and loss of sails as bridges were built over the rivers and canals which limited the headroom for sails. Rachel's part of the talk was accompanied by a slide presentation including some lovely watercolour paintings of the various craft.

Elaine then took over the narrative and gave us a picture of life as a boatman's wife. Her husband Godfrey (Goff) was in the audience along with Rachel's mum. A very relaxed speaker Elaine managed to convey the hard life she had led, raising five children, with her husband constantly away from home sailing along the Aire & Caulder waterway, and up and down the Humber. A clear impression was given of how Eileen had worked to overcome the stigma attached to boatmen and their families in the 1940's 50's, so that her children would not suffer in the same way as she had. There is no doubting the pride with which this lady made the point that all of her family had been educated and 'had done well'.

Both speakers invited us to visit the Museum and explore the beautifully renovated craft, an offer that we will keep in mind for a future outing.

The talk finished with a short video of the craft at the Museum and was applauded by the audience. Polly Stead, chairman, gave the vote of thanks after which members were able to enjoy light refreshments and a good gossip amongst friends.

Distribution of the 'History of Frodingham' has continued steadily as residents became aware of its existence. There are copies still available for any household that has not had a copy as yet, simply contact one of the Group members or call at 89 Main Street, copies are free to residents or a donation to the group would be welcome from non-residents.

The History Group was saddened to hear of the sudden loss of Colin Axford. A friend and supporter of the group who had comprehensively researched land tenure in Frodingham Parish from 1808 to the present day and had made a copy of his work freely available to the group.

The July meeting of the History Group will be an outing to Thornton Abbey, whilst for the September 19th meeting Mary Carrick will be talking about Meaux Abbey.

Turning left along the Pocklington road to find the Minster Way, we made our way to the church at Givendale and its pond (the scene for Robert Fuller's early signature work "Geese at Givendale") then on to the Chalkland Way. Emerging from Grimthorpe Wood, we were guided by the distant Pocklington Church towards our final turn back to Millington. An enjoyable though chilly day with plenty of colour from trees just bursting into leaf.





The June walk was a return to Castle Howard estate, starting from Welburn. Going through woods with their glades of bluebells, we made for the impressive bridge from which we had splendid views to Castle Howard on the one side and the Mausoleum on the other. Passing the Temple of the Four Winds, we headed for the aptly named Bog Hall (fortunately it was dry underfoot today), turned towards Coneysgarth for a while, among majestic oak, chestnut and

sweet chestnut and then away to the little graveyard before coming back to Bog Hall. We were delayed briefly while a partridge led several newly-hatched little fluff balls to the safety of some long grass, then carried on to Gaterley Farm. The path rose and fell several times, giving us fine views of the surrounding area, passing through several fields of beans coming into flower with their heady scent. After regaining our cars, some of us made for the tearoom at Castle Howard where we had the additional and unexpected



pleasure of songs from Les Miserables performed live in the courtyard.

hope to alleviate the pressure on Friday's appointments by moving the half day


to the middle of the week, thus making it easier for patients to get an
