



History Group

In July the History Group enjoyed its annual outing, this time to Thornton Abbey in Lincolnshire. Those of you who have glanced at the 'History of Frodingham' will know that the parish was given to the Augustinian priory by William le Gros, Earl of Yorkshire as part of large endowment of lands in the area. We remained under the ownership and control of the Abbey until 1539 and the History Group members felt that as their Frodingham predecessors had contributed towards the cost of maintaining the priory, they should become better acquainted with the property.

It was a lovely day as twenty nine members made their way across the Humber and through the narrow, winding lanes of north Lincolnshire to the Abbey. Once there they could choose to investigate the display in the Great Hall above the gatehouse, walk across the fields to the remains of the Abbey buildings, watch the archaeologists emulating 'Time Team' at various points around the grounds, or simply sit in the sun with an ice-cream and enjoy watching the world go by.

A word of acknowledgment for the 'diggers' organised by Sheffield University, they were so helpful and willing to answer the group's questions, explain what could be seen, and the 'top man' even donated a brick from the Abbot's lodging for our own little museum.

The outing was rounded off by a stop in Barton for tea and cake before crossing the bridge again and returning safe but tired, to Frodingham.

The highlight of our walk was to find in Nettle Dale one of the localised populations of Marbled White butterflies. They were all round us in great numbers. Turning here, we headed back along the Huggate Sheepwalk, making a detour to take in Glebe Farm.



The August walk was very well attended with 17 of us: 13 doing the full 8.5 miles .It was a walk to stir old memories – we started at Centre Farm, North Dalton, where Barbara had spent her childhood, and followed the Minster Way west to reach Blanch Farm where Joan had grown up (and done her courting). Turning eastward, we walked through Deep Dale, enjoying Wolds countryside at its best, before heading south to North Dalton.This fine walk was rounded off by a splendid cream tea at Barbara's home, where we all admired the fine job she'd made of landscaping her garden.

The price of the newspaper was $1\frac{1}{2}d$ – a penny ha'penny. (There is no longer a modern equivalent, it's less than 1p).

If you had wanted to live on the outskirts of Hull, a nice three-bed villa, with low rates, would have cost $\pm 3-5s-0d$ (± 3.25) per month to rent.

To buy a modern three-bed semi in Leeds would cost £595.

Someone in Hull wanted to buy a portable copper? (A copper cauldron, often with a gas ring underneath, to do the laundry – Ed.)

A woman in Filey was fined £3 for showing a light during the blackout – that was an expensive light! Showing at the CECIL and DORCHESTER: "Drums Along the Mohawk" – a beautiful romance,

glorious spectacle and throbbing with adventure...... There were 23 cinemas advertising in this issue of the Mail.

We have received reports of companies contacting persons regarding the illegal usage of internet facilities and offering to track the persons concerned down for you for the sum of GBP100.00. (We've most likely all been contacted at some time or other in recent months regarding PPI claims, there are so many companies now offering the service, it now appears illegal usage of the internet is another tactic).

Reports of ATM's in the area being targetted by card fraudsters have raised their head again. The latest report being in our area outlining an ATM in Driffield at which a member of the public reported the machine had had small dots attached to the top of its frame. The matter was reported to the relevant persons, who arranged for the ATM to be checked - no offences have been reported at this time, but please be mindful when using ATM's - check for such dots/anything untoward around the framework of such machines and always protect your PIN number from persons standing behind/near you. I see so many people using these machines who input their PIN numbers openly, whilst people are in close proximity to them. Don't assume other persons are as honest as you are, shield your PIN number.

There have been a number of reports relating to the theft of scrap metal and tools from vehicles overnight. If you carry tools in your vehicle, please ensure they are out of sight/the windows are suitably covered/obscured and the vehicle left secure.

Reports of the theft of steel castings and plumbing equipment have been received, these having been stolen from vehicles during normal working hours, whilst vehicles are being loaded with products enabling persons to carry out jobs that day. As the vehicles are parked on business premises in daylight, people become complacent and do not secure the vehicles each time they go in/out of their warehouses to obtain further parts. This is a daily occurrence and it appears it has been duly noted by persons unknown.

The Parish Council have asked for the inclusion of three 'warning notices' in Village Voice.

- Concerning illegal parking in Foston Lane close to the junction with Main Street (probably for access to the Post Office). There has been one accident already between a lorry, a parked car and a satellite dish. Also cars should not be parked on the pavement (I know this is to get out of Max Winter's way but) it is illegal and the police are now aware.
- The other concerns whosoever it is who persistently drops litter at the corner of South Townside Road/Main Street near the bus stop. Youngsters waiting for the school bus are suspected of having their breakfast while they wait
 but please can they take their litter home or find a bin to place it in.
- 3. Dog waste more information than warning. tied bags of doggy poo can be placed in the public litter bins (not those in the children's playground) and private green bins. We cannot place Dog Waste Bins all over the village because they cost a lot of money and are infrequently emptied, really the best option is to take it home and put it in your own green bin.

Social Centre (SC)

The SC committee is hopeful that someone will come forward to re-open the youth club and that some community-minded people will join the Social Centre Committee to help keep this important village asset functioning smoothly, we promise you that no-one is dragooned into hard labour, mostly it involves a short meeting once a month to discuss and agree what we do next.

The Summer Fair was a success with £140 raised towards the cost of a new front door; however as an anonymous person kindly broke a window in the Main Hall, funding the door may have to be postponed whilst the cost of repairing the window is raised. It seems that some of our young people still are intent on damaging the Village Hall from the imprints on the windows of the meeting room they seem to have been kicking a football against them as well. Perhaps you don't appreciate that the hall belongs to you the residents in the village and that it may be your son/daughter who is damaging your property.

Once again the small Social Centre Committee is asking for volunteers to help with running the Hall and Playground, particularly after the untimely death of one of the Trustees of the Centre. Just come along to one of the meetings (see the diary) and find out what goes on.

A treasure hunt (including a few refreshment pit stops) was completed and eventually the victorious team was named as John and Nancy Rookes.
