The North Frodingham Corps of Drums is returning.


Snare drums and drum kits available, along with tuition from an experienced and enthusiastic tutor. All ages welcome.

Over recent weeks we have received a considerable number of reports appertaining to hare coarsers on farmland across the county. If anyone sees vehicles traversing farmland/parked in farm gateways, please contact us on 101. Do not approach the persons, but if you are able to pass their vehicle details to us (make/model/colour/registration number), we can undertake the necessary checks.

Albeit a rare incident in North Frodingham, the chances of opportunist burglars striking in our area is always a feasibility. Make life as difficult for them without going to great expense. Below are a few options which don't need to cost a lot but could avoid a lot of heartache and inconvenience:-

Secure your gardens with a fence and lockable gate

Consider lightweight trellis on top of the fence, to hinder climbing

Keep bushes/trees cut down - don't let them shield burglars from view. They don't like being watched!

Don't leave tools or ladders in the garden to assist them

Fit an outside sensor light, it unnerves burglars Consider a house alarm with bell boxes front and rear. Burglars don't always use the front path!

Keep doors and windows locked even when you are at home

Don't leave keys in doors/window locks. On view they can be of assistance to burglars. Hide vehicle keys out of sight

Don't leave valuables on view through windows When you go out, leave a light on or a radio to make it appear the house is occupied, draw the curtains

Use time switches if you are going to be away from the property for a length of time (holiday/overnight)

Mark valuables with house number and postcode. Free UV pens are available at main police stations in the East Riding of Yorkshire

Ask a neighbour to keep a watch on your property if you are going away on holiday and ask them to move the post from the front door - if a glass front

door is fitted, this is a give away to a would-be burglar

Another matter which is prevalent at this time is internet crime and fraud. Due to our busy lives we purchase lots of items over the internet (particularly over the festive period), but some people are unfortunate to become victims of fraud. If you believe you have become a victim, scammed or ripped off, get in touch with Action Fraud, the UK's national fraud and internet crime reporting centre. Please visit them on www.actionfraud.police.uk or call them on 0300 123 2040 to report a fraud and to get help and advice





WOLDS WANDERERS



On a cold but bright day in November, Andrea led us from the impressive ruins of the Augustinian priory at Kirkham Abbey along the banks of the River Derwent towards Howsham. We passed under the sombre walls of Howsham Hall, built apparently from stone robbed from the priory, before turning away from the river to climb up to Crambe Grange. Here we found a sunny spot to eat our lunch under the watchful eyes of the Fowberry



alpacas. Continuing on up Crambe Bank, we enjoyed wide views across the Howardian Hills before heading towards the busy A64 and its continuous dull roar of traffic. Turning again, we made a leisurely descent down a quiet lane to Kirkham.

We stayed much closer to home for the December walk. Meeting at the old market cross at Brandesburton, we set off towards Leven passing Coneygarth Pit. During the extraction of gravel, prehistoric remains including a mammoth's tusk were found here. Turning right along Heighholme Lane, we passed through Star Carr which, prior to extensive drainage work was no more than a "drowned ground". Heighholme Hall (holme means a higher area of land in a water meadow) is the site of an earlier Grange which had belonged to Meaux Abbey. From here we made our way to Burshill, once part of Lady Dacre's 3000 acre estate which had been used to fund almshouses in Westminster. Continuing north we had fine views of the low carr lands of the upper River Hull valley. Joining Westfield Road for a while, we then took the bridleway through the former hospital grounds to arrive back in Brandesburton. Against all expectation, the weather stayed dry overhead and all enjoyed a walk full of local interest.

Parish Council:

An Agenda for each meeting of the Parish Council is posted on the Village Notice Board prior to the event in accordance with established procedure. Residents are reminded that meetings are open to the public; however anyone wishing to address the Council is asked to notify the Clerk prior to the posting of the Agenda.

The November meeting opened with Emma Simpson, ERYC officer, offering the parish a chance to try some free 'taster' sessions in the Village Hall, for the more mature residents. Having successfully 'tested the water', through the last Village Voice, plans are in place to organise some of these sessions in the near future, details will be placed on the Notice Boards around the village.

The remainder of the meeting followed the published Agenda, our police representative reported few problems within the village, but an escalating problem on farm land where poaching and hare-coursing is increasing. Everyone is asked to report, on the non-emergency number, any unknown vehicle parked at a field entrance or sight of any strangers with dogs walking across the fields.

The Parish Council has continues to support the Twilight Bus, enabling our young people to attend after-school activities and get safely back to the village.

Councillors were informed that repairs to Church Bridge are in hand and that it is likely traffic signals will be in place whilst the work is carried out. Repairs to the length of Grange Road are planned for late February or March 2014, during which time the road will be closed to traffic.

In December a complaint was laid against the Parish Council, and whilst deeply regretting the distress caused to the complainant, the Parish Council believes that it is important to remind vehicle users to park with the safety of pedestrians in mind. Please do not park over the footpath ramps for the disabled, avoid parking on blind corners, and try not to park on grass verges if at all possible. You may only be stopping for a

minute, but an accident can take less than a second.

Some good news, the Parish Council lowered its Precept demand for the second consecutive year despite the high cost of replacing the Church hedge; which will eventually greatly improve the appearance of this entrance to the village. The Precept is the charge added to each Council Tax bill to maintain and improve all village assets, including the Cemetery, Church Millennium garden, War Memorial, and public benches etcetera, your next Council Tax bill will be slightly less because of careful management of the Parish finances.

Two other decisions were taken at the December meeting; one was a request that the East Riding Scrutiny Group review communication between the IT and Planning Departments, with the objective of improving the posting of planning data on the Council web site. The other was a decision that councillors to continue to declare both pecuniary and non-pecuniary interests prior to the commencement of each meeting, to ensure an open and transparent conduct of village affairs.

The December meeting closed with Councillor Kell wishing all members a Happy Christmas and a Peaceful New Year, a wish that the whole Parish Council extends to all residents.
