For the first time in the group's history, a walk was abandoned due to rain. Showers were forecast but within a short time of the start of the walk at Thixendale, we were all drenched by a sudden deluge. Discretion being the better part of valour, we called it a day: no-one willing to spend the whole day in clammy trousers!



We fared much better in August; an uncertain forecast turned out to be a mostly sunny day for a very pleasant circuit near Fadmore, west of Kirkbymoorside. Starting from Green Lane, we headed for Hagg Wood and moved in single file along the very tranquil Robin Hood's Howl. Reaching the road, we crossed the ford and made our way to St Gregory's Minster. This little gem was rebuilt in 1050, the original having been destroyed by marauding Danes. The porch contains the longest-surviving Saxon inscription together with a Saxon sundial.

Beyond the Minster, we crossed the beck, (fortunately subterranean here as the bridge had long since been washed away) to walk along its far bank through Thin Oaks Wood to reach High Caldron, a former mill. Following the path through the peaceful Brockhill Hagg, there was a steady ascent towards Sleightholmedale and the Green Lane where we'd started.

Garage and garden Security.

Considering the amount of time and money, people spend on home security it is truly astonishing to find that millions of homeowners across the UK don't treat the contents of their sheds and garages with the same caution. On average, UK sheds hold £2,000 worth of equipment, yet 10 per cent of homeowners do not bother locking them. 10 per cent might not seem like a huge percentage, but if you put that into context alongside UK population figures, you quickly realise that this 10 per cent equates to millions of homeowners, who are leaving their belongings unprotected against theft. Moreover, when you consider the high value nature of items stored in sheds – bicycles, lawnmowers, barbecues etc. – this lax attitude towards shed security becomes even harder to comprehend. It's not as if you need to break the bank to secure a shed. In most instances, the best course of action is a padlock.

Incorporating a steel body and a hardened Molybdenum shackle, this type are 20 per cent stronger than steel. Shed padlocks range from less than a fiver through to £125. Therefore, we suggest you look for a trusted brand. In contrast to sheds, a garage door always feature a lock of some variety, but just as with shed doors they're frequently closed, but left unlocked. Therefore our advice is simple - if in doubt always check. You wouldn't go to bed uncertain about whether your front door is unlocked; so why take the risk with your shed or garage?

Message from Ward County Councillors : Jonathan Owen & Jane Evison WINTER GRITTING

As summer fades into Autumn the councils preparations for the winter season are already underway to keep open the 3500 kms of roads. 21 gritters, quad bikes and salt spreaders, snow ploughs and 26 mobile snow blowers are all serviced and ready. This month a 60 strong team of gritter drivers have started their training so do not worry that winter has come early if you come across one! The council has storage capacity for 17,500 tonnes of salt. Local salt bins are being filled in preparation. It is impossible to cover every road in such a large rural area so certain routes (140 of them) are prioritised and grants have been made available to Parish Councils to use for local schemes to keep their streets clear where possible. Hopefully we will have a mild winter, but if not, the council is prepared.

BOUNDARY CHANGE REFERENDUM

By the time you read this the results of the referendum vote regarding Hull City extending its boundaries will be known, and although you may wonder why it would affect residents in Nth. Frodingham it has appeared on many parish council agendas for discussion and therefore we felt it worthy of a few words of explanation. We stress however, that whatever the outcome Hull & East Riding of Yorkshire Council have worked together well for the good of the whole area for a number of years now and will continue to do so. The referendum was put forward after Hull City Council established a 'Commission of Inquiry' to look into various options for the future without inviting the East Riding to be part. The 'status quo' not being one of their options and all options resulting in the city being given more 'power' over the future of East Riding residents. East Riding wanted its residents to have a say. There are two issues the referendum covers firstly around Hull Citys plans for a boundary change which would see a number of East Riding villages absorbed into Hull, this is where the numbers game kicks in and the loss of 70,000 population to ERYC would in fact make the running of the council financially unviable, hence the importance of those other Parishes, seemingly unaffected, like Nth.Frod. to consider having a say. The second question is whether Hull City Council should be allowed to build on the land it owns in the open green spaces of the East Riding on its boundaries.

One of the main options also being discussed by Hull City's 'Commission' is to consider the possibility of a combined authority, which in short would see a return to Humberside days and as Hull would be the authority absorbing the East Riding, North and North East Lincolnshire. All their staff would keep their jobs and ERYC staff would be out of work and have to apply for any vacancies offered. Regardless of what Hull would like to see happen, what is not allowed is a hostile takeover by any one authority of another and that was why the Council wanted to provide all East Riding residents the opportunity to make their views known so there can be no doubt about how our residents feel.



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

With Robert's guidance we gradually got our eye in and found several youngsters perched quietly in the tree tops. The owl family consisted of two adults and their four chicks plus a further <u>six</u> chicks that had been orphaned or lost and fostered on. Fortunately owls can't count, and these adults were rearing them all with the help of Robert's supplementary feeding.

Before the light went, we moved on to Givendale to watch a badger sett on the opposite bank of the dale. After an hour's patient wait, the badgers emerged and we saw them set off to forage. Having worked on dairy farms in my youth and married to a dairy farmer's daughter, badgers don't have the

best reputation with us but there is no denying the frisson of excitement that there is in seeing wild animals in their natural setting.

As darkness fell we returned to Robert's home to watch the owl family feeding in his back garden. Food was strapped to the bare branches of a tree stump and the owls had to tear it free. While they did so, the youngsters queued up, waiting their turn to be fed. It was a fascinating sight and a privilege to share Robert' enthusiasm.

We enjoyed a leisurely walk around the newly restored stables and were most impressed by the work that was still being done to bring this building back to its former state.

A gentle walk across the Park brought us to the Main House where me were met by the curator who had organised a guided visit to the site of the medieval village, and the opportunity to wander through the rooms of the house. Unusually for a Country House members of the Trust decided not to improve and renovate, but to conserve the house as it had been when last lived in. As a result we could all feel that we were in someone's home, albeit rather grand, with the tinkling of the piano in the staircase hall adding to the illusion.

I, for one, appreciated the need for fifty indoor servants to keep the place running smoothly it is an extremely large building. Such as for example they had to climb a narrow staircase to the top of the house, take the servants corridor to the other side, and run down an equally unpleasant staircase, rather than walk across the hall space and risk being seen by the family! 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
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



Parish Council Report

The Parish Council did not meet during August; therefore there is no formal business to be reported. Councillors have continued to report problems, complaints and queries to the Clerk and these have been actioned in the normal way. An attempt is being made to get a litter bin positioned towards the Playing Field end of South Townside Road and this has involved several hours of work. completing lengthy application forms contacting various members of the ERYC. One final hurdle remains, a site visit has to be arranged with a Highways Officer, to approve a location for the bin. Once this has been agreed the application can be submitted and a committee in Beverley will make the final decision. Life used to be so much simpler!

We have had a couple of flood scares during August when heavy rain storms had water topping the kerbs in the vicinity of the Blue Post. Both petrol driven pumps are located in the area (at 60 Main Street) and were readied for action, but we were lucky the rain stopped and the surface water cleared. Reports have been passed to the ERYC and they are currently discussing our problem with Yorkshire Water.

In commemoration of the start of WW1, the Parish Council decided to have the War Memorial cleaned and the names re-painted. Gardiner's of Bridlington carried out the work and it is hoped that you have all been impressed by the sparkling appearance of the stonework, the surrounding garden and the clearly defined names of the Frodingham Heroes of the Great War. If you want know more about them, the North Frodingham Local Museum War Great Exhibition has proven to be a very popular event with over 100 visitors to date. You have just a few more Sunday afternoons until September 28th to pop into the Chapel in the Cemetery and look at the work.

Whilst you are in the Cemetery take a look around; one of our Parish Councillors volunteered to continue the work started by a small group of men a few months ago. A period of neglect had left both the Cemetery and the Churchyard in a sorry state. It took a united effort to repair the damage, after which a new grounds man was sought without success. In stepped our valiant councillor; the last feedback I had was that 'the gardens had never looked better,' and that was from a Fostonite!

We have received reports from across the Force area of outbuildings, particularly on farms being targeted and farm equipment being stolen, including quad bikes. Can we make a concerted effort to ensure if we have farming equipment, quad bikes or items of considerable value stored wheresoever it be, they are securely stored. The loss of such items is extremely inconvenient to all persons and very costly and time consuming to process via insurance companies.

Reports have been received of Hanoi burglaries in our Force area - this is where a criminal obtains keys through the letterbox via the use of a long pole with a grab hook at the end. It is quick and easy for them to insert the grab pole through the letterbox, hook the keys onto the pole and extract them through the letterbox in seconds. Please do not leave vehicle keys/house keys near a door with a letterbox fitted or on a table in close proximity to the door with the letterbox in, where they can be seen by the criminal and quickly obtained.

There is an increase in the number of calls being received by us appertaining to lampers on land. These are people who invariably drive 4x4 type vehicles and have dogs with them, who will advise you they have just come out to exercise their dogs (and who are invariably from a long distance away). Their real intention is for the dogs to chase rabbits/deer and similar animals with a view to killing the animals either for their resale value or for sport. Invariably these people trespass on farmland, cause damage to the crops and if their animals are injured or the kill is not clean, often leave the animals to die in agony.

Most of us will have been contacted at some time or other regarding PPI compensation claims. We have received a report from a member of the public from an organisation purporting to be able to obtain and release your compensation cheque upon receipt of the payment from you of GBP150.00. For a further payment (no fee disclosed by the member of public in question), they will arrange delivery of the cheque too! The gentleman who rang our caller was believed to have an Indian accent, claimed his name was Michael J Ward. The telephone number obtained was 0203 129 2095 which defaults to Kent Telephones Ltd. This matter has been referred to Action Fraud.

We are still in the times of austerity and the ingenuity of persons and the scams they attempt to use never ceases to amaze. Do not fall victim to their scams.


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A healthier lifestyle is right up your street with the NHS Healthtrainers:

People living in Holderness can now get support to lead a healthier lifestyle right in their own community thanks to a new mobile NHS Health Trainer team.

We all know eating better and getting more exercise can really boost our health and wellbeing but if you live in a rural area or off the beaten track, it's not always easy to get advice and motivation to put our best intentions into practice.

Now support from the Holderness Locality Development Fund means the NHS Health Trainer Service has recruited two new Health Trainers and is rolling out a mobile service that will see regular clinics springing up throughout the Holderness area and even mean Health Trainers can visit people at home or in other venues in their own community.

The service will work closely with local GP surgeries, neighbourhood community development initiatives and will build on community/voluntary facilities and health promotion initiatives that are there already.

Anthony Bryce, Health Trainer co-ordinator, explained: "This is an exciting new project which means we can offer people living in the more rural parts of Holderness the chance to get lifestyle support that can really make a difference to their health and wellbeing."

The NHS Health Trainer service is available to adults aged 18 or above who live within the East Riding of Yorkshire. East Riding Health Trainers provide support, guidance and motivation to people who want to make positive long term changes to their lifestyle. This includes things like stopping smoking, losing weight, getting more physical activity into their daily life, drinking less alcohol and finding ways to reduce every day stress and anxiety.

The NHS Health Trainers, who will be based at Withernsea Pavilion Centre, will be holding weekly clinics at:

Church View Surgery, Hedon (9am – 12.30pm) Hedon Group Practise (1 – 4.30pm) every Friday



A Letter from Alan Simmons



You may or may not be aware that I have now sold Park House. Couldn't leave without a little message of farewell to Frod:

I don't want to make this a long narrative for fear of boring you all, but I have to start somewhere, so the beginning seems as good a place as any. At the time we moved here in 1985, the day after my 55th birthday when I officially retired from HM Forces where I had been serving as Camp Commandant at ASMT Leconfield (later renamed Defence School of Transport), Frodingham was a smelly village. Our kitchen window looked onto the yard of Charlie Conner's pig farm, thus providing plenty of entertainment. The day we first arrived I left my wife, Bobbie, in the car whilst I went to collect the key. Upon my return she declared to me "I couldn't possibly live here; they're killing pigs!" To which Ken Ake from next door replied "nay lass, they're feeding the buggers."

As would be expected I spent the first few weeks painting the windows of the house, so being a friendly lot, every time one of the villagers passed by I would say hello and introduce myself, to which I would receive the same response: "I know!" I happened to mention this to Christine Taylor, the then Clerk of the Parish Council and the next day a copy of the electoral roll dropped through my door, so that I could then identify who lived where.

Having been given a warm welcome one was slowly sucked into village affairs; went to church three weeks running and thus became 'regulars', not long afterwards, became members of the parochial church council and similarly the parish council - one got sucked in, leading to spells as Secretary of the Church Council and Chairman of the Parish Council. Message to all; never volunteer!!!

Park House was the 27th house of our married life and you will all understand that this was all a very new experience for us to actually put down proper roots for the first time. Having lived for nearly 30 years in the village and always been made very welcome and much looked after in later years, I would just like to take this opportunity to thank the Frodingham folk for all the kindness I have been shown over the years. The village is not the same one we moved into; the rate of progress has carried it along as much as anywhere else, but I would like to think that one thing will never change and that is the friendliness of those who live there.
